**HOPE OF SETTLEMENT**

**BETWEEN DOMINION STEEL AND COAL CO'S.**

Minister of Labor to Confer With C.P.R. Authorities Respecting the Deadlock in the Arbitration Proceedings

Montreal, May 29.—When E. S. Clouston, general manager of the Bank of Montreal, returns from abroad in a few days, steps are expected to be taken which will, in all probability, lead to important developments in connection with the efforts which have been under way looking to a settlement of the trouble between the Dominion Steel and Coal companies. When Mr. Clouston went abroad he left memoranda of his views with respect to a basis of settlement for the conference which was then approaching. The figures contained therein were not satisfactory to B. E. Walker, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, the other banking authority connected with the peace movement. Upon Mr. Clouston's return it is expected these two gentlemen will get together and adjust their differences and agree upon a basis for presentation to Messrs. Ross and Sumner. While free to refuse the bankers' proposal, it is believed they will decline to abide thereby.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, minister of labor, is expected in the city, to-day, to confer with Messrs. D. McNicoll, general manager, and A. R. Creelman, solicitor of the Canadian Pacific railway with reference to the deadlock in the arbitration proceedings between the management and the company's mechanics. It is hoped to arrive at some basis on which the proceedings at Winnipeg can be opened after having been interrupted for several days through the withdrawal of the arbitrator chosen by the railway owing to the determination of the board to take up eastern along with western matters at issue.

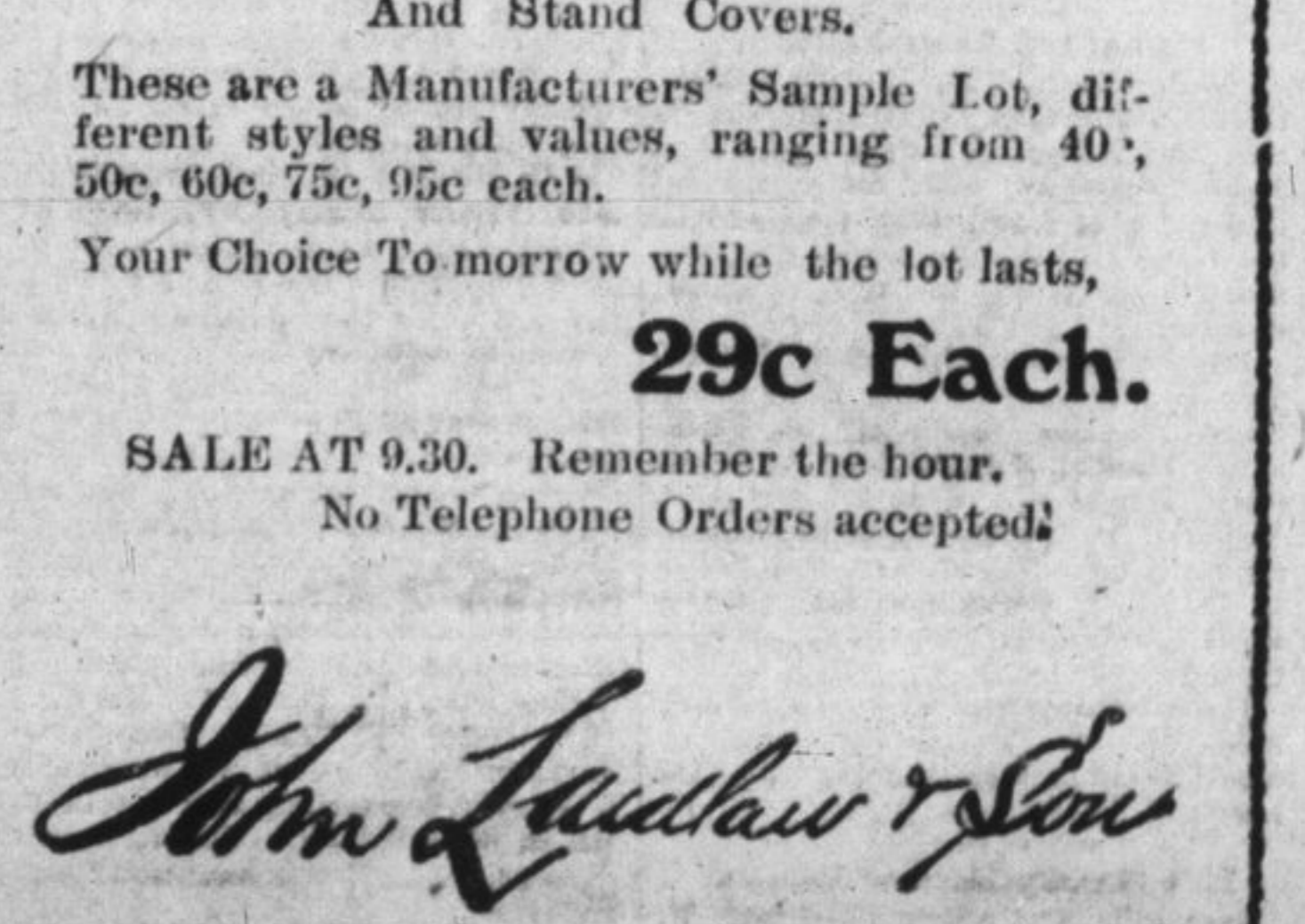
