

HON, SYDNEY FISHER. Ottawn, Ont., May 30 .- The bill which Hon. Sydney Fisher is to introduce in the commons is, in many repects a radical departure from the present civit service act. It places the civil service under the more or less control of a permanent commission of two members, who are to have the rank of deputy ministers, it also provides for a complete re-organization or re-classification of the service, as well as for increased remaneration, especially in the higher prades.

instead of the present system of classification by clerkships the service is to be reorganized into divisions and subdivisions. These and the salaries attaching to each are as follows: First division-(A) coputy heads


