EAST INDIAN PRINCE VISITOR TO LONDON.

The Maharajah of Nepal Travels in Regal State With Suite of King.

London, May 29.—A picturesque Indian visitor is now in London. This is His Highness Sir Chandra Shamsher Jang, Raja Bahadur, prime minister of Nepal. He travelled in regal splendor, with a suite numbering twenty-two persons and with twenty servants. The maharajah and his suite brought an extraordinary amount of baggage, consisting of hundreds of packages, including the case containing his highness' famous regalia of jewels.

These jewels are said to be worth nearly \$500,000, one headpiece alone being valued at \$250,000. It is a mag-

The retinue includes a large staff of thirty-two men, who are all specially prepared. The maharajah comes to England as the guest of the British government, and Mortimer House, near Belgrave square, lately the residence of Lord Penrhyn, has been taken for his use. Although the house has been gorgeously redecorated and fitted throughout, it forms a striking contrast to his palace at Khatmandu, a building nearly as large as the whole block of government buildings from the treasury down to the corner by the Houses of Parliament.

The maharajah, who is an exceedingly shrewd and alert man, is forty-three years old. He is an energetic ruler, and is frequently at work from 6.30 in the morning until late at night supervising the various matters connected with the administration of his country and his army. He is a sportsman and a keen big game hunter. His highness will probably remain in London for about eight weeks. He has already been received by the king, and almost royal honors are being paid him.

Moreover, there seemed no possible way by which such a body of men like the prince described could have entered and escaped unseen. Yet the prince persisted in his story.

FIRES ON HERSELF

MIDNIGHT TRAGEDY IN OLD RHINE CASTLE.

Prompted By the Pangs of Jealousy, Young Baroness Shoots Her Husband.

Berlin, May 28.—Castle Budesburg, in Westphalia, one of the most famous estates in the Rhine valley, was early yesterday morning the scene of a very peculiar murder followed by an attempt at suicide. The Baroness Wenda von Rueschelen, a young bride, married only a few months ago, shot and killed her husband and then fired two bullets into her own body.

Jealousy is said to have been the cause of the tragedy. The baroness is lingering between life and death with only a faint chance of recovery. Before she made the announcement she admitted that she murdered the baron deliberately, and begged the forgiveness of his cousin, who is a member of the castle household. Although

FIRST WOMAN MUNICIPAL CANDIDATE IN PARIS

It is now expected, after the complete count of the ballot in the quarter of the Ninth arrondissement, where Miss Laloe was a candidate, that she obtained more than 900 votes, which, of course, were declared null, but it is a curious sign of the times that she was able to poll such a large number, almost one-fourth of the total, her opponent being elected by a little over 2,000.

complete mystery as yet surrounds the actual events which led up to the tragedy, the murdered nobleman seems to have had a strange foreboding of his end, and only a few hours before he died executed a will bequeathing his lands and money to his brother, a lieutenant in the Prussian Guards.

The crime took place about an hour after midnight, following the baron's return from a visit to a neighboring nobleman. He entered his wife's boudoir, where she was awaiting him, and a violent altercation broke out. Finally, the baroness fired with an

automatic pistol at her husband, one bullet entering his jugular vein, another piercing his neck and two others striking him in the leg. All the shots were fired while the baron faced the pistol.

The baron's cousin, Baron von Postek, was the first to be aroused by the shots, and when he rushed into the corridor the baron was reeling in his arms, gasping: "The woman has shot me." There were only words before he died to death.

While Baron von Postek and the servants were attempting to staunch the baron's wounds, more shots rang out from the boudoir. The baroness had turned the pistol against her own breast, lodging two bullets in the region of the heart. A physician who arrived two hours later pronounced her condition hopeless. She remained unconscious for several hours, and it is reported that she decided to kill her husband because of his love for another woman.

The baron, who was universally popular, is quoted as having recently expressed to his friends the fear that his wife would kill him. Other reports allege that their unhappiness was due to financial embarrassments. The couple were married in Berlin last November, the baron being thirty-five years old and his wife twenty-six. The baroness was a daughter of the late Major von Strombeck, while the baron was a member of an old and highly respected family of military noblemen.
