METHODISTS MEET

TO LOOK OVER THE WORK OF THE PAST YEAR.

The Gathering in Quebec is Very Large—Missionary Enthusiasm Evident—The Temperance Work—Statistical Report.

Quebec, May 30.—The conference missionary anniversary was held on Thursday evening. This service is generally one of great interest, and this year it was no exception. The large number of laymen taking hold of the missionary program, Mr. Webster, one of the most distinguished laymen of the Methodist church, took the chair. He announced the well known hymn, "Jesus Shall Reign Where'er the Sun," and as the choir led the fast audience in singing the hymn, you could feel that the atmosphere was predominantly missionary. T. Hilliard, Morrisburg, who is an honored Ontario lawyer as well as an enthusiastic Methodist, gave the first address. He approached the subject from the layman's standpoint. He asked such questions: "Where does the missionary money come from? Where does it go? What does it cost to send it there? What does it accomplish? Where is it sent?" In his speech he answered the questions in a most interesting and profitable way. He urged all the people to be able to answer such questions, and in seeking to answer these questions they will grow more zealous over missions.

Mrs. F. G. Williams, president of W. M. S., gave a short address in which she outlined the aims and work of the society. She demonstrated that the W.M.S. is an inspiring force in the local church.

Rev. W. Boshart was called upon to take the place of Dr. Sutherland who could not come.

On Friday, May 29th, members enjoyed another quiet hour. Rev. G. S. Clendinning gave an excellent address on the subject, "The Histories of the Old Testament." At nine o'clock, Dr. Carman took the chair and called the conference to order. To the surprise of all there is a much larger attendance of both ministers and laymen than had been anticipated.

The Friday night reception service is looked upon as the most important service in connection with the Methodist conference. It is at this service, the young men who have completed their studies are received into full connection with the conference. Rev. L. S. Desroses moved in an eloquent speech and Rev. Dr. Young, seconded the resolution, that the following young men be received into full connection with the conference: Milton Kerley, B.A., J. E. Blanchard, Paul Villard, M.A., M.D. Percy Johnson, B.A., George Armstrong, B.A., W. R. Johnston, W. Hollingsworth, J. W. McFarlane, J. G. Fulcher, J. B. Howe, Dr. Robbins, as the representative of the laymen spoke words of welcome to the young men.

Rev. Dr. Flinders, who for the last fifteen years has been principal of Stantead College, and is now reentering the pastorate spoke on behalf of the college. Rev. W. Boshart, who for the last two years has been engaged in an effort to raise \$100,000 for the endowment of the Stantead College, reported that he had received subscriptions amounting to \$42,000. A committee consisting of Revs. Ryckman, Shaw, Carman, Mr. Kay, K.C. and Mr. H. H. Bird, K.C., was appointed to present a resolution and greetings of the conference to the lieutenant-governor of the province of Quebec. A committee was appointed to consider the advisability of holding religious services for the Methodists who may attend the Petawawa military camp.

Dr. Bain presented the report of Victoria University. The last year has been the most successful in the history of the university. Total number of students registered during the year 1907. The graduating class in arts numbered fifty-eight, and in theology thirty-seven. The teaching staff numbers 1,040. Total assets of college \$1,985,000. Students fees for the last year were over \$11,000. Over \$45,000 are now paid out in salaries to the teaching staff.

The temperance and moral reform anniversary was held at 4 p.m., Friday. W. H. Lambley in the chair. The chairman stated that there are over 800 municipalities in Quebec province where there are no licenses issued. Rev. Mr. McGee, assistant to Rev. Dr. Chown, gave an able address on the work of the temperance and moral reform department. He called attention to the fact that in British Columbia there is projected a large scale manufacture of opium and exporting same to China. He urged the church to greater efforts to oppose the influences that seek to contaminate our young men through their gambling agencies. J. H. Carson spoke of conditions in the province of Quebec. A majority vote determines whether there shall be licenses or no. The influence of the great Roman Catholic church is being felt on the side of temperance. The injustice of the three-fifths clause in Ontario was strongly denounced.
