### USE OF GAS AS FUEL

#### TO BE URGED UPON THE CITIZENS.

The Light, Heat and Power Committee Considers the Question—Use of Ontario Street Poles Given to C.P.E.

The regular meeting of the civic light, heat and power committee was held in the office of the plant on Tuesday afternoon at four o'clock. Present, Aids. Given (chairman), Chown, Couper, McCann and General Manager Folger.

On motion of Aid. Chown the request of the C.P.E. re use of pole lines on railway track from Queen street to Brock street, was granted, subject to opinion of city solicitor.

On motion of Aid. Couper the general manager was given power to purchase enough coal for immediate use from the person now holding the contract, and also to call for tenders for the year's supply.

On motion of Aid. Chown, in accordance with the reports of Mr. Campbell and the city engineer, the committee decided to tender the city \$175 for work on the streets when the permanent main roads will be laid, and in accordance with the recommendation of the manager and city engineer the light plant will put in repairs the other streets on which mains have been laid.

Manager Folger recommended to the committee that in order to save any further trouble after the streets have been overhauled it would be advisable to have a notice put in the newspapers notifying the people on these streets who intend to have gas or water put in their homes that the fire works to be fixed and they should have mains put in at once. The manager was instructed to confer with the city engineer in regard to this.

With reference to advertising the gas as a cheap and handy fuel the manager recommended to the committee that a separate pipe be run from the service to the gas stove in the show-rooms of some of the stores, the idea being to illustrate the working of the valves so that prospective buyers might see and be convinced of the quickness, cleanliness and economy of the gas for fuel. The gas that merchants consume through June, July and August would be very little and should bring consumers. The Y.W.C.A. authorities will also be interviewed in regard to giving free cooking demonstrations with gas, to the public, so they can see how it works. Aid. Chown moved that both recommendations be acted upon by the manager.

### MARINE NEWS.

#### The Items Gathered About the Harbour.

Schooner *Aencia* cleared for Oswego, to take on a cargo of coal for R. Crawford.

Steamer *Wasaga*, from Port William, arrived, with 50,000 bushels of wheat, for the M. T. Co.

Government boats *Speedy* and *Augusta* passed down on the way to Montreal yesterday.

Steamer *Nokomis* came up from Alexandria Bay, and has entered Davis' dock, for repairs.

Dredge *Stuart* was towed here, from Welland canal, yesterday, and tug *Harris* left for Montreal with it in the afternoon.

Steamer *Clemmont* called at the dry dock, last night, on the way from Sydney, Cape Breton, to Port William, with rails.

Swift's: Steamer *Kingston*, down and up, Tuesday; steamer *Belleville*, up, today; steamer *Toronto*, down and up, today; steamer *North King*, down and up, today.

Although the high water has done a great deal of damage at different points among the islands, and put all the docks under water, the owners have built them up. The Cornwall dock, at Alexandria Bay, has been raised two feet and built of concrete. The Frontenac dock is being raised eighteen inches. Mr. Pierce, of Fish View, is raising his dock three feet. The layton docks are all being repaired. The Thousand Island Park dock, although twelve inches out of water, will be raised two feet.

### PERMISSION GRANTED

#### TO ERECT POLES ON ONTARIO STREET

For K. & F. Railway Despatch Line—No Quorum at City Council Meeting—A "Round Robin" Signed Giving Permission.

Again there was no quorum of the city council at the hour, last evening, when that body was to convene especially to pass upon the Board of Works' report, recommending that the Kingston & Pembroke railway's request for permission to erect a line of poles on Ontario street, from Brock street to Place D'Armes, for a despatch wire, be granted. Those present were Mayor Ross and Aldermen Carson, Chown, Craig, Free, Given, Graham, Henderson, McCann, and Robertson. Election matters crossed the attention of the council members. Those present lacked one of a quorum, and that one came not through the hour was 12.

W. Campbell, Toronto, C.P.R. superintendent of construction, was present and stated that the company wished to start the erection of the poles at once. An improved despatch line was being constructed between Kingston and Toronto.

It was decided among the council members that a "round robin" should be prepared giving the necessary permission, and to have as many as possible sign it. The poles will be erected subject to the satisfaction of the city engineer.

It was also decided to make the "round robin" cover the Board of Works' recommendation to cut down the trees on the east side of George street, so that a concrete walk could be laid. The recommendation of the board to cut down three trees near the corner of University avenue and Union street was held over until the council meets on the 9th. Residents at that corner object to the trees being cut down. The city engineer and the Board of Works' chairman hold that the trees interfere with street construction.

#### Funeral On Wednesday.

The funeral of the late Percival D. Johnson, killed in Napanee on Monday, took place, at two o'clock, on Wednesday afternoon, from his late residence, Wade's lane. Funeral services were conducted at the house by Canon Macmorine, of St. James church.

#### Given A Warning.

The two lads who were arrested with the boy charged with theft, and handed over to the Children's Aid Society, were allowed to go with a warning, as it was their first appearance before the court. Their detention at police headquarters gave them quite a severe fright.

#### Another For The Pen.

John Lynch, of South St. Marie, Ont., is the latest addition to the penitentiary. He was brought here this morning by Deputy Sheriff Carney, of that place, to serve a term of two years for theft. The officer arrived on the early morning train. The prisoner spent the night in the police cells, and was removed to the prison this morning.

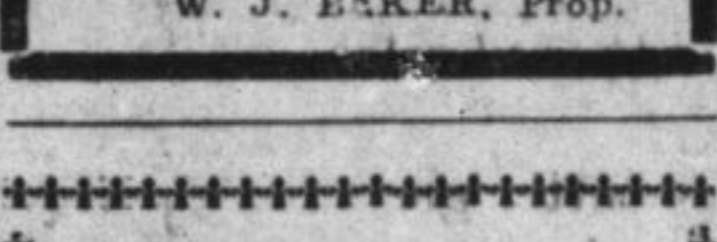
