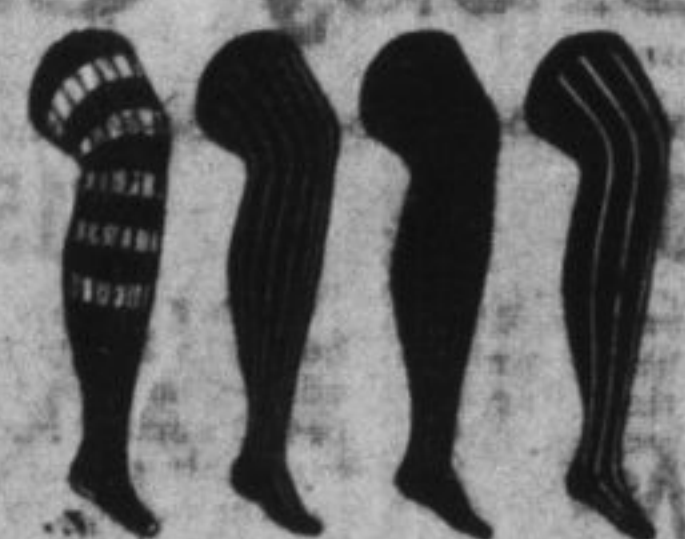

ABOLISHES SLAVERY.
Freedom Will Reign in African Possessions.

Lisbon, June 3.—The government has issued an official note stating that it has been decided to grant freedom to laborers of both sexes in the African possessions of Portugal.

Contracts in the case of natives from Angola, Guinea, Mozambique and Cape Verde, will be limited to five years, and the wages paid to those destined for the sugar plantations of Sao Thome, will not be lower than \$2.00 per month in the case of men, and \$1.75 in the case of women, with maintenance.

CHAIN OF ACCIDENTS

AT LEAK ISLAND NEAR GANANOQUE.

Two Carpenters Injured and a Scow Sunk—A Wife-Beater Arrested—Salvation Army Has No Barracks.

Gananoque, June 3.—At Leak Island yesterday afternoon, Harvey Stewart first street, who has been engaged at carpenter work there for some time past met with a severe accident which will lay him up for some time. While taking his carpenter's axe, it glanced and struck his right foot, inflicting a severe gash. He was brought to town and the wound dressed. Another of the men engaged there had his hand severely crushed by a falling timber and a scow load of lumber for use at Leak Island ran on a shoal and sank. All this in one day.
