EXACT HIGHER RATE

IN THE MATTER OF SUCCESSION DUTIES.

The Hypocrisy of the Whitney Government—Whitney Always Opposed This Tax When in Opposition.

In the City Hall, at the nomination, W. F. Nicksie created the impression that the Ontario opposition had consented to the succession duty or estate tax, as a fair one. Yet the present provincial treasurer moved to reduce the duties one-third. They moved:

"That the bill (Number 151 to make further provision for the payment of succession duties in certain cases); be not now read the third time, but be forthwith referred back to a committee of the whole house, with instructions to amend sub-sections 2 and 3 of section 4, by striking out the figures \$2.50 and \$5, and inserting in lieu thereof, \$1, and to amend sub-section 4, of said section, by striking out the figure \$5 and inserting \$2 in lieu thereof, and to amend sub-section 5 of said section, by striking out the word ten and substituting therefor the word six."

The Whitney government is now exacting a higher rate than the tax it did its best to reduce.

Look Into Affairs.

It is of the utmost importance that every Britisher who is now on the Ontario voters' list should thoroughly acquaint himself with the policy and administration of both parties and measure each according to their ideals of responsible government.

The man who comes from the motherland comes unprejudiced. The term liberal or conservative for the most part cannot find analogies in his native land, for issues here are entirely different from issues there.

There is, of course, one notable exception. The liberal party in Canada has always been on the side of the people, as it has in the old country.

Old country liberalism gave the British people reform, step by step, and to-day it stands for radical policies of perfecting responsible government.

Likewise Canadian liberalism scored for the people more and more power, fighting the arbitrary element of Toryism that in Great Britain, as in Canada, stood for government by certain favored classes.

In Canada to-day it is liberalism that is to be thanked for manhood suffrage and the ballot.

In this respect there is a similarity between the political parties of Canada and the United States.

DESERTER SENTENCED.

Cecil Rogers, Artilleryman Given Ninety Days.

Cecil Rogers, a member of the R.C. H.A., arrested two weeks ago by Constable Thomas Mullinger, on a charge of desertion, was sentenced to ninety days, at hard labor. This was his second offence.

Rogers had plans laid to get out of town, but his proposed trip was stopped in the bud by Constable Mullinger. The soldier, with bag and baggage, hired on one of the boats in port here, on the night of his arrest, but stories were set afloat about his behavior. Constable Mullinger got "sight" of the rascal from when the constable was on board the vessel, he found Rogers in hiding, in the hold of the boat. He immediately took him in charge, and handed him over to the military authorities.

This is the third man to be sentenced for deserting from the ranks, within a very short space of time. The first offender was given a year, and the second was sent down for six months.
