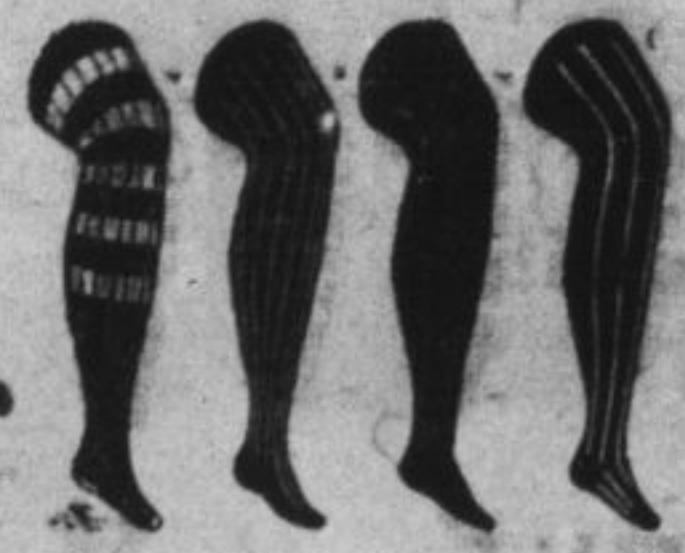

## MAE O'REILLY ALIVE

ONE OF MRS. GUINNESS' ALLEGED VICTIMS.

Admits Having Married Treulson, Who Says He Killed Her With Aid of Mrs. Guinness—Frank Reidinger, Whom Treulson Said He Buried, Also Alive.

Saratoga, N. Y., June 5.—Mae O'Reilly, who Julius G. Treulson, Jr., in a "confession" in Texas declared was murdered on the Guinness farm at Laporte, Ind., arrived on Friday last from New York city and is the guest of friends.

Miss O'Reilly at first denied her identity, but later admitted it. According to the story told by Daniel F. Welsh, a member of the family with whom she is stopping, she has been employed in New York city during the past winter. Miss O'Reilly was married to Treulson, in Albany, in August, 1905. Three months later Treulson was sentenced to Elmer reformatory and since that time Miss O'Reilly says she has had no correspondence with him and knows nothing of his actions. She declares she was never in Laporte, Ind., and at the time when Treulson alleged that he and Mrs. Guinness killed her she was in Rochester. The police here believe that Treulson is mentally unbalanced.

Kingston Township Council Transacts Much Business. Council met June 1st at court of revision. J. B. Walkem complained of over assessment of \$750 on 100 acres. Assessment confirmed. George Halper, 50 acres, assessment \$900, reduced to \$700. Matthew Rogers, 175 acres, assessment \$2,500, reduced to \$2,000. George Hoff, 3 acres, assessment \$1,100, reduced to \$1,000. D. W. McDonald, 2 of an acre, assessed for \$700, reduced to \$500. Charles Spooner, 236 acres, assessment \$5,000. Confirmed. Mrs. Van Straubenzee, assessment \$200 on 41 acres, reduced to \$125. Court of revision closed and regular business proceeded with.

Minutes of April meeting adopted. Moved, Spooner-Cramer, that A. Rankin act in connection with reeve of Farmington on the town line, with power to act. Carried. Moved by Rankin-Spooner, that J. E. Whiting have power to act as he thinks best in the matter of delay in the proceedings of the York Road, now in the courts. Carried. Reeve and Councilor Cramer to inspect the road complained of by Messrs. Taylor and Vroman, with power to act: \$20 grant of road section No. 7 from Five Mile House to Grand Ridge, to be expended by William Moore, reeve; Mr. R. Spooner paid \$4 for a sheep killed by dogs; Kenneth Spooner paid \$4.95 for a sheep and three lambs killed by dogs. A grant of \$15 made to John Clark to break and place six coils of stone on road division 25 A. R. Gibson paid \$4 for a sheep killed by dogs. Mr. Evans paid \$5 for two coils of gravel to be placed on road division 24. Mr. Spooner appointed to look after a ditch and culvert complained of by Mr. Keenan, with power to act.

John David, paid \$4 for a sheep killed by dogs. Isaac Fairbank granted \$10 for road division No. 20 A. R. B. Gibson paid, \$3 for postage in connection with his duty as assessor. George Babcock paid \$5.30 for two lambs killed by dogs. Moved, Rankin-Cramer, that this council regrets very much the loss this council will sustain in the resignation of Mr. Simpson as he has been a most faithful servant in discharging his duties the long years he has acted as clerk. Carried.

## THE MONEY WE SPEND.

Constructive Policy of Ontario Liberal Party.  
Mr. MacKay, in Legislature.  
But, sir, there is no field where the liberals of the province of Ontario stand so strong as when discussing the great questions of finance. I have shown, sir, that in 1907, as compared with 1904, the receipts under two heads alone run upwards of \$2,000,000 in the latter year as compared with the former just as a natural result of conditions, and not attributable in any way to the present government. But, sir, let me consider briefly three questions of constructive finance. Under the succession duties act, last year, the receipts were \$821,092.99; under the supplementary revenue act the receipts last year were \$672,241.76; under the act dealing with brewers and distillers, in the neighborhood of \$75,000. The passing of the latter two acts, it will be recalled, were absolutely and vigorously opposed by the conservatives, while in opposition, and the first mentioned act received a qualified opposition. The total receipts under the said three mentioned acts since they were placed upon the statutes by the former liberal government are as follows: Under succession duties act, \$5,213,727; under the supplementary revenue bill, \$3,368,709; under the special tax on brewers and distillers, \$59,877, making a grand total of \$8,642,313. Of this, sir, not one dollar of the latter two items amounting in all to \$5,213,727, would ever have found its way into the provincial treasury if the votes of the conservatives when in opposition had prevailed. (Applause.) In addition to that, I repeat that the receipts under the succession duties act would have been cut in half had they succeeded in their amendment which they moved in 1909. (Applause.) So that I repeat that when the police of the liberal party is compared with that of the conservative party with reference to finances the contrast is overwhelming in favour of the history of the record of the great liberal party. (Applause.)
