HE IS WELL SATISFIED

WHAT PREMIER GOULD THINKS OF ELECTION.

A Few Friends Have Gone Down—Liberal Party As Strong As Ever—Late Messages About Ontario Elections.

Montreal, June 9.—Premier Gould had the following, to-day, to say with regard to the provincial elections yesterday: "There is little for me to say except that I am very well satisfied with the result of the election. A few of my friends have been defeated and I am sorry; I am also sorry that I was not elected in St. James, but these are the misfortunes of war and cannot be helped. There is lots of evidence, however, that the Liberal party is as strong as ever in the province of Quebec and I am satisfied."

A Conservative Elected.

Joliette, Que., June 9.—Complete returns from Montargis county show Joseph Sylvester, conservative, elected by a majority of fifteen.

Liberals 55; Conservatives 16.

The Montreal Gazette gives the following composition of the Quebec legislature:

Straight government supporters 53
Opposition supporters 16
Independent liberals 2

There are three constituencies in which polling is yet to be held.

Premier Whitney's Statement.

Toronto, June 9.—Premier Whitney, this morning, issued the following statement: "On the occasion of the great upheaval of the people, in 1905, I realized, and so declared, that the result was more than a party victory. So, to-day, my colleagues and I feel that the verdict of yesterday was an expression of approval coming from the people of this province as a whole. We are indeed, thankful, at the unmistakable and generous endorsement. During our term of office we have endeavored to do our duty. Doubtless we made mistakes, but the experience we have gained will enable us to avoid them in the future. Appreciating highly the confidence of the people, whose servants we are, we look forward, without fear, to the duties and responsibilities of the future."

Death Of W. Lewis.

Montreal Witness.

A prominent Welshman, of this city, passed away, on Saturday morning, in the person of William Lewis. His health had been rather poor of late, but he was not obliged to take to his bed. He died of heart failure. Mr. Lewis was the son of William Lewis, sheriff of Glamorganshire, Wales, and was born eighty years ago. He decided on a sailor's career, and at eighteen years of age took command of a vessel of 1,000 tons, which in those days was of the largest class. In 1852, Mr. Lewis settled in Canada, and for thirty-five years he was connected with merchant shipping on the great lakes, living at Kingston, Ont. Twenty years ago he retired and took up his residence with his family in Montreal, where they have remained ever since. Mr. Lewis is survived by five sons and four daughters: F. Orr Lewis, James G. Lewis, W. P. Lewis, C. Howard Lewis, and Miss G. Lewis, Montreal; T. G. Lewis, Belleville, Ont.; and Miss Adelaide Lewis, superintendent of the Ravenswood hospital Chicago, and Mrs. J. J. Enland, of Houston, Mich.

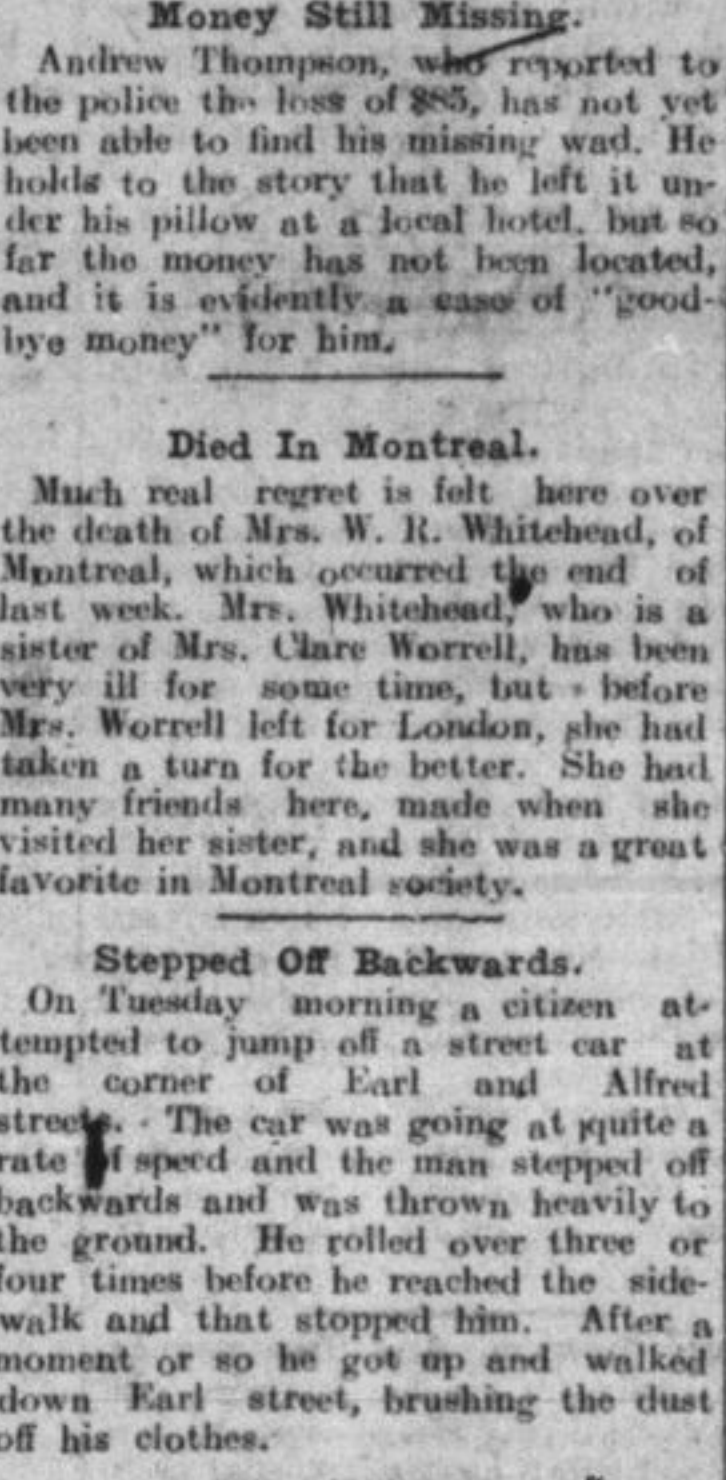
Died At Chicago.
