AFTER THE POLE.

Perry and Bartlett Start With Crew.

St. John's, Nfld., June 8.—Happy in the hope of a successful dash for the North Pole with Commander Robert E. Perry, Captain Bartlett, sailing master of the Arctic explorer, and a crew of eleven sailors, departed on the Allan line steamer Siberian for New York, where they make their start for the north on Perry's ship Roosevelt. The sailors have been selected with regard to their adaptability to Arctic exploration, and are practically the pick of Newfoundland's seamen. Capt. Bartlett asserts that if the Roosevelt is fortunate enough to gain the position under burning the last attempt to reach the Pole, the experience acquired in that voyage, combined with the aid of the specially selected crew, will make this effort to reach the desired goal an easy task.

The schooner yacht Dervis, owned by Commodore Murray More of the Corinthian Yacht Club, Hamilton, Bermuda, has won the ocean race from Marblehead to Hamilton.

An Old Case Revived—More Money For a Road.

Cross Lake, June 6.—Some few years ago, W. Hunt, received a grant from the province for the purpose of building a new road from Cross Lake to Dead Creek, but found and not a sufficient amount to finish the work, and after using the money he received on it, had to give it up. This year another grant has been given, but it was placed in the hands of David Scott, for the purpose of finishing the road. THE SPORT REVIEW

AN ENGLISH OPINION OF LONGBOAT.

How the Indian Won Fame—Canadian Lacrosse Team Will Tour England After the Olympic Games.

In England speculation is rife as to Longboat's chances in the Marathon race. His performances are discussed at length and the following from the current number of the Strand Magazine will serve to show to what extent he bulks in the public mind: "Tom Longboat, of the Irish-Canadian Athletic Club, Toronto, the Onondaga Indian, who is Canada's hope, and probably the most feared man in the athletic Canada. A year ago he was unknown. On Thanksgiving Day, 1906, a long gaunt red skin, clad in a grotesque july-barred bathing suit, dashed home in front of a field of thirty of the best distance runners on the American continent, in the Hamilton Herald's annual around-the-bay road race at Hamilton, Ontario, and as once leaped into the limelight. Longboat, whose Indian name is Coe-wa-ger, covered the nineteen miles, 168 yards course in 1 hour, 49 mins. 25 sec. The very fact that an obscure Indian with practically no training won the Canadian road running classic made the country sit up and take notice. His time was within 32 seconds of the record. Five miles of the course is over a stretch of heavy sandy road. Then the Indian jumped into the road Marathon, a ten-mile road race at Toronto and won it as he pleased over a course ankle deep in mud. In 1907 he was, after much difficulty, got into competition for the Boston Marathon race, a twenty-five mile American road fixture. There he met 162 United States and Canadian runners and after cooking them up with a hot club in the first fifteen miles, waved them a laughing farewell, went on, and won along, going the 25 miles in 2 hours, 24 mins. 24 sec. He won by nearly a mile, breaking the record by 4 mins. 59 2/5 sec. This wonderful race made roskin famous, and all last season his career was one line of unbroken victory. He has won every race with consummate ease. The only time he was ever beaten was the first time he ever ran indoors, and by George V. Bonhag, the United States three-mile champion, who beat the Indian at his (Bonhag's) own favorite distance; the Indian was beaten by a foot and the record was broken by four seconds. Longboat will be twenty-one years of age on June 10th. He started running at 135 pounds, but now weighs 155 lbs. He is 5 feet 11 inches in height, a big deep-chested fellow, with long, lean legs. He runs flat-footed.

Sporting Notes.

The record for the Hamilton Herald road race is 1:48.43, made by Mellor in 1901. The distance is nineteen miles, 168 yards.

The ten-hour roller skate grind at Guelph, between a number of local boys, proved to be a great success. The winner, H. Peck, covered 171 miles and five laps, or over ten miles more than "Dan" Wiggins, of Goderich, covered when he defeated Conery.

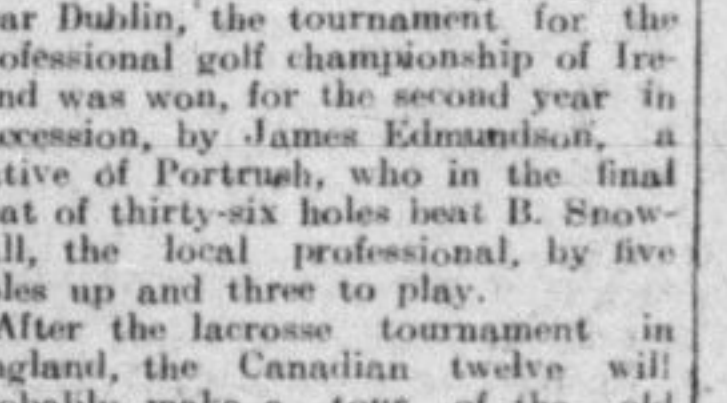

On the Portmahonk golf course near Dublin, the tournament for the professional golf championship of Ireland was won, for the second year in succession, by James Edmondson, a native of Portmahonk, in the final heat of thirty-six holes beat B. Snowball, the local professional, by five holes up and three to play.

After the lacrosse tournament in England, the Canadian twelve will probably make a tour of the old country, covering the ground which the Capitals went over last year. They will play five or six games in England, and it is likely that the Australian or American team will accompany them through England, giving exhibitions in all the important lacrosse centres. The team will be away from Canada five or six weeks. It will travel first-class, and it has been definitely settled that Ald. Fagan will go along as manager.
