MISSIONARY FOLKS

ATTEND AT SYDENHAM ST. CHURCH, TUESDAY.

A Large Number of Delegates Are in Attendance—Statement Presented By Treasurer.

With a very large attendance, the twenty-fifth annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Montreal Methodist Conference, opened in the school room of Sydenham Street church at three o'clock, on Tuesday afternoon. The president, Mrs. T. G. Williams, Montreal, occupied the chair at the opening session, and after devotional exercises, a Bible reading was given by Mrs. (Rev.) William Craig, of Kingston.

Reports were submitted from district organizers, and all of them showed increased interest in the work, and the reports were looked upon as being most encouraging.

A press committee was appointed, composed of Mrs. H. A. Lavell, Smith's Falls, (convenor); Mrs. F. A. Reid, Montreux; Mrs. M. Taylor, Montreal, and Mrs. D. D. Elliott, Lamark.

A good deal of time was given over to the discussion of some of the society's by-laws. A resolution was passed, appointing the treasurer of the rest fund, a member of the general board.

The treasurer's statement was received and adopted.

In connection with this report it must be stated that there is a decrease in the receipts from last year, but in giving the statement it must be noted that this year, the meeting was held in June, instead of October, as in former years, thus making it a shorter year for the work.

The total amount received from all the districts was \$9,406.90, made up as follows: Montreal district, \$2,029.37; Kingston, \$572.94; Brockville, \$1,363.29; Matilda, \$1,485.86; Perth, \$748.95; Pembroke, \$878.34; Ottawa, \$478.57; Huntingdon, \$327.67; Waterloo, \$305.73; Quebec, \$155.43; Stanstead, \$216.50.

Adjournment was made shortly before six o'clock, when the Kingston ladies provided tea for the delegates and their hostesses in the lecture room. The tables were very prettily arranged.
