



THE FUTURE OF QUEEN'S

REPORT OF COMMITTEE PRESENTED TO ASSEMBLY.

Leave it to Trustees—Interest of Church in Theological Faculty.

Winnipeg, June 10.—The question of separating Queen's university from the Presbyterian church caused a spirited discussion in the general assembly to-day, and opinions for and against were vigorously expressed.

The committee recommended a deliverance of the assembly on the subject, expressing gratification at the rapid growth and expansion of Queen's, with the hope that its continued and prosperous would be continued in the future, and, further, that while the church was ready to maintain the present relation, it believed that the question of the character of the relation should be determined by the board of trustees, which was ultimately responsible for the welfare and financial position of the university.

The trustees should be authorized to take such action after consultation with the benefactors and graduates as might be deemed in the best interests of the institution. If a change were decided upon provision must be made for carrying on the work of Queen's theological faculty on a basis satisfactory to the church.

They were gratified to know that the movement to raise half a million dollars for the faculty of arts was meeting with success, and hoped the sum desired would soon be obtained. In view of the urgency of the case the assembly should appoint a committee, to be named by the moderator, to give legal effect, if necessary, to whatever action should be determined upon by the board of trustees, and protect the interests of the church with regard to the control of the theological faculty.

Had a Fine Outing. Ottawa, June 11.—The members of the Canadian Medical Association and their friends to the number of about 300 were the guests of the Canadian Pacific Railway company, on Wednesday afternoon, and were taken in a special train to Caledonia Springs, the well-known health resort near Ottawa, where they were entertained at a luncheon in the company's hotel and at a number of other court-essies. Countess Leary and Marguerite and Marchioness Maloney of Philadelphia, are the only others thus honored by the head of the Roman church.

ROMANCE OF LOVE.

Ends in Tragedy—Father Slays His Son.

Berlin, June 11.—A romantic love-story ended in a terrible tragedy at Lichtenau, a suburb of Baden-Baden, yesterday.

Some time ago Major Bauer, a retired army officer, received a letter from his son, who was undergoing his military service at Freiburg, that he had fallen in love with the beautiful daughter of a railway employe, and that he intended to marry her.

The father wrote indignant letters threatening to cut him off without a penny if he should make such a decision, but the young man's aim could not be shaken, and he obtained leave to go home yesterday to see his father.

A stormy scene took place between the two, the young man declaring that he would gladly give up his name and position for his sweetheart. At this the father drew a revolver, and, exclaiming that death for both was better than a dishonored name, he shot his son, and then sent a bullet through his own head.

SLEW THE ARCHBISHOP.

His Assassination in Tiflis on Wednesday.

Tiflis, June 11.—Archbishop Nikon, archbishop of Georgia, was assassinated in Tiflis, on Wednesday, on the steps of the synodal building. His assailants were revolutionists. A mob, in attendance upon the archbishop, was severely wounded. The assassins emptied their revolvers into the body of the archbishop and then fled. They have not been captured.

ANTI-GAMBLING BILL.

It Has Passed the New York Senate.

Albany, N.Y., June 11.—This afternoon, the senate finished voting on the anti-gambling bill, and the result was announced, twenty-six for passage and twenty-five against. The bill will take effect immediately.

Abducted Italian's Children.

Hornell, N.Y., June 11.—The home of Antonio Giarratino, a well-to-do Italian, was entered last night, and his two children, a boy, aged eight years, and a girl, aged sixteen months, together with \$800 in cash, silverware, and other valuables are missing. It is believed the children will be held for ransom. The Italian colony is excited, and the police are scouring the country for the alleged abductors.

The Pageant of London.

London, June 11.—The lord mayor presided at a meeting at the Mansion house, last night, under the auspices of the University Extension Board, in support of a proposal to arrange a series of historical lectures in the various metropolitan and suburban boroughs dealing with the broad features of the historical events which will be included in the London pageants in 1909.

Sir Hillier's Appointment.

London, June 11.—According to the Daily Mail, the appointment of Sir Walter Hillier, as the adviser of the Chinese government, is due to the growing financial relations between China and Great Britain, and to the increasing tension between the Chinese and the Japanese governments.

Found With Throat Cut.

Massena, N.Y., June 11.—The body of an unknown man was found floating in the St. Lawrence river, near Massena, last evening, with his throat cut nearly from ear to ear. He was only partly clothed and the body had been in the water for several days. The man was large and of middle age. An inquest will be held.

Big Job Almost Over.

Winnipeg, June 11.—Excellent progress has been made on the double-tracking operations of the C.P.R. and grading will be finished this week. There are still twenty miles of steel to lay, but the officials of the company expect to be able to open the second track some time early in September.

COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What Is Going On In The Business World.

A bid of \$15,000 was made for a seat on the Toronto Stock Exchange. C.P.R. traffic earnings for the first week of June show a decrease of \$332,000.

The Grand Trunk railway system's traffic earnings from June 1st to June 7th were: 1908, \$663,900; 1907, \$854,839; decrease, \$200,001.

Sir George Drummond, president of the Bank of Montreal, speaks in generally favorable terms as to the outlook of business throughout the country.

The cost of producing bacon in Canada is altogether out of proportion to the basis ruling in other countries, and as a result the export trade in Canadian cured meats is rapidly falling off.

The Montreal street railway earnings for the week ending June 6th were \$70,161.45, an increase of \$212.83 over the same week last year.

The production of gold at the Bond Mine is officially placed at 881,992 fine ounces, valued at \$2,472,143. In April last the output was 865,832 fine ounces, and in May, 1907, 821,477 fine ounces.

SAFE WAS ROBBED.

Thieves Gain Entrance to Brock Street Store.

Some time during Wednesday night thieves gained entrance to the store of J. R. Dobbs & Co., 109 Brook street, by breaking in a door, at the rear, and made off with \$13 which was in the safe. The safe had been left unlocked. The office desk was ransacked, but nothing apart from the money was found missing. Some cheques were in the safe, and this morning when Mr. Dobbs opened up the store, he found these on the floor.

A key to one of the drawers in the safe was found missing. It was evident that the thieves also made a visit upstairs, as well as a bicycle was found to have been removed from its usual place.

A window at the rear of the store was also smashed, and it is thought that the thieves at first attempted to get into the store this way. The bolt on the outside door was broken off, and as the door leading to the store was unlocked, it was an easy matter for them to make their way into the store. The safe stands near the front window of the store.
