GIRLS CAME TO BLOWS

FIGHT IN A GANANOQUE FACTORY.

One of the Girls Severely Injured—Gananoque's Dominion Day Celebration—Two District Weddings.

Gananoque, June 12.—An exciting incident occurred yesterday, in the works of the Dominion Steel and Wire company, when two of the female operators got into a mix-up, and came to blows. Quite a scuffle ensued before they could be parted. One of them is reported as being severely injured. The affair will probably be aired in the police court in the near future.

A pretty wedding took place at the Roman Catholic church at Brewer's Mills, on Monday, when Michael McDonald of McCombe was united to Miss Mary Murray of Brewer's Mills. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Father J. B. Traynor. After the ceremony the bridal party repaired to the home of the bride's parents, where a repast was served. The bride was the recipient of many costly and beautiful presents. Mr. and McDonald left to spend their honeymoon at the base of Gananoque.

His worship replied that he had much pleasure in complying with the request.
