Result Does Not Satisfy. The majority of Queen's University authorities are not satisfied with the action of the general assembly in refusing to separate Queen's from the Presbyterian church, so that she may benefit from the Carnegie pension fund for professors. They would be quite satisfied if the assembly would direct that part in the canvass for a large endowment. To merely recommend Queen's to the liberality of the Presbyterians throughout Canada will not do. They claim that the assembly must either unflinchingly accept or become responsible for its maintenance.

Afraid Of "May Wax." At St. Hyacinthe, Que., yesterday afternoon, the 220 class race, in which W. H. Carson's "May Wax" was again to have contested, was not filled. The owners of the other horses would not enter against the Kingston mare, which proved too speedy for them the previous day. "May Wax" is certainly a wonder. Her owner was offered \$4,000 cash for her, but refused to look at the amount. "May Wax," after trotting at Montreal next week, will be entered at Alexandria, Ottawa and Brockville. She will then likely appear on New York state tracks.

HAD GRAND RESULTS.

Local Option Does Splendid Work in Orillia. Orillia Packet, Conservative. Local option has been in force in Orillia for a month and a half now. The results have been all that could be desired. The streets have been freed from drunken men. Whereas under license it was scarcely possible to walk the length of Mississauga street without encountering one or more "drunks," the writer has met only two men under the influence of liquor since the 3rd of May, and one of these was a stranger who had come into town on Empire day. The most marked difference is at night. After midnight now, the streets are quiet, where formerly disorder used to start up till nearly morning. There have been only two arrests for drunkenness, and the fine of \$10 and costs imposed in each case will doubtless make future offences rare. The predictions that business would suffer have been entirely falsified. Whatever effect local option has had on business has been for the better. The one weakness which has developed is due to the presence of a licensed hotel at Athlery. There have been some complaints of rowdiness on the part of parties coming home from there late at night.

TREMENDOUS BATTLESHIP.

Will Cost Enormous Sum of £2,250,000. London, June 12.—The admiralty, having eclipsed the Dreadnaught class of battleships by the St. Vincent, will, according to the Telegraph, start in September to eclipse the latter, laying down at Portsmouth a new Leviathan, with heavier armament and greater displacement. The St. Vincent, which will be launched in October, 1909, is of 19,250 tons, and cost about £1,500,000. The new battleship will probably be of 21,000 tons and will cost £2,250,000. She is intended to be completed for sea in eighteen months after her keel is laid.
