The majority of Queen's University authorities are not satisfied with the action of the general assembly in refusing to separate Queen's from the Presbyterian church, so that she may benefit from the Carnegie pension fund for professors. They would quite satisfied if the assembly would direct that part in the canvass for a large endowment. To merely recommend Queen's to the liberality of the Presbyterians throughout Canada, will not do. They claim that the assembly must either unflinching Queen's or become responsible for its maintenance.

INCIDENTS OF THE DAY. HAD GRAND RESULTS. TREMENDOUS BATTLESHIP. Will Cost Enormous Sum of £2,250,000. London, June 12.—The admiralty, having eclipsed the Dreadnaught class of battleships by the St. Vincent, will, according to the Telegraph, start in September to eclipse the latter, laying down at Portsmouth a new Leviathan, with heavier armament and greater displacement. The St. Vincent, which will be launched in October, 1909, is of 19,250 tons, and cost about £1,500,000. The new battleship will probably be of 21,000 tons and will cost £2,250,000. She is intended to be completed for sea in eighteen months after her keel is laid.

Head Narrow Escape. Young Plumber Was Overcome By Gas To-Day. Norman Comper, Princess street, a young plumber employed by Taylor & Hamilton, had a very narrow escape from being suffocated by gas, this morning. He was engaged in making some connections with the gas pipes at the house of James Freed, Wellington street, and was at work in the basement. It was just after another plumber who was engaged on the job with him, had returned to the store for some piping, that he was overcome by the fumes. Mr. Freed was standing near him at the time, and was startled to see the young man fall over to the floor. Mr. Freed acted with great presence of mind, and did not give a thought to his own danger. Placing one hand over the end of the pipe, out of which the gas was coming, he called to Mrs. Freed, and the latter with another lady, Mrs. Mitchell hurried to the scene, and they carried the young man to the door. The pipe was blocked up and a hurried call was sent to Dr. I. G. Bogart. Comper was unconscious, and it was some time before he got over the danger point. As soon as his condition would allow, he was removed to his home, and there he will be confined for a few days. This afternoon he was reported to be doing nicely. The fact that assistance was close at hand at the time Mr. Comper was overcome, was the means of saving his life.
