BROKE OPEN THE CAR AND MADE OFF WITH SOME PROVISIONS.

Tramps Believed to Have Committed Theft at the Outer Junction—Believed to Be Organized Band.

About one o'clock on Saturday morning thieves broke open the seal on a Grand Trunk freight car, at the outer depot, and made off with some provisions, as follows: Half box of raisins, one-third box prunes, one box chewing gum and four cans of corn. The theft is believed to have been committed by tramps. Tramps are at present causing the railways all over Ontario a great deal of trouble, and only a few days ago a big haul was made from cars at North Bay. This is not the first time that cars have been broken into at the junction. From time to time the company has trouble of this kind. There is a very heavy penalty for breaking open a car, and should the offenders be captured they will be given a heavy sentence.

The car entered was filled with provisions, and in their hurry to get away the thieves left everything topsy turvy. Several cans of corn were found scattered round the track, near the car.

Yardmaster John Sullivan noticed tramps around the yards during the night, and ordered them away. They evidently came back again when the coast was clear. As soon as the officials found that the car had been entered a call was sent to the police station, but when the officers arrived upon the scene the thieves had made good their escape.

It is believed there is an organized band of tramp thieves at work, as at different places along the lines, the tramps are suffering severely from their work. Every summer a great deal of trouble is experienced with tramps at the outer station. Quite a large batch were taken in charge.

LACK OF ACCOMMODATION.

Prevents Conventions From Meeting in Kingston.

In August, the annual lodge of Foresters of Eastern Ontario will meet in convention here. There will be over 300 delegates. The accommodation of the delegates is worrying the local foresters, for Kingston has such meagre hotel space. There are twenty-eight places here which only half a dozen can cater to the needs of the travelling public. That is the problem Kingston is up against in regard to big conventions. Many large organizations would like to convene in Kingston, but the scarcity of hotel accommodation prevents them. It has been suggested that if Kingston's honor licenses were reduced by one-half, a few better equipped hotels would be the result. It is understood that a demand will be made upon the city council, next autumn, to restrict other plebiscite to the people for liquor license reduction. A year ago, these were cut off as a result of the people's voice.

ON SUSPENDED SENTENCE.

Richard Marks Before Judge Price on Saturday.

Richard Thomas Marks pleaded guilty to assaulting his wife, Elizabeth Marks, on May 25th, when arraigned before Judge Price Saturday morning, but was allowed to go on suspended sentence, providing he does not touch liquor for three years.

"If it comes to my knowledge that you do take a drink I will at once order your arrest and commit you to the central prison for two years, less one day," remarked Judge Price. Evidence was given by Mrs. Marks, Miss May Marks and the accused, J. L. Whiting, A.C., appeared for the crown, and A. B. Cunningham acted as counsel for the prisoner. Marks said he did not remember using a razor on his wife but admitted using the razor on his son.

Mr. Cunningham put up a strong plea for the accused, stating that he was a good man when sober.

Coins 2,300 Years Old.

London, June 13.—Among some very rare coins, collected by the late Sir James Knowles, which were sold at Christie's yesterday, was a silver stater over 2,300 years old, for which £200 was paid. A tetradrachm struck about the same time was sold for £170.

Choir On A Church Tower.

London, June 13.—Just after 4 a.m. yesterday, the clergy and choir ascended to the top of the church tower at Folking, Essex, and sang a hymn, after which a peal was rung upon the bells. The custom has been observed at Folking from time immemorial.

Nest On A Railway Line.

Vienna, June 13.—A lark has built its nest and is hatching four eggs between the sleepers of the railway line at Villach, Austria. The officials take the keenest interest in its welfare, and have fixed a small plank over the nest to protect it from the sparks from the engines.

Brigands' Haul Of Pianos.

Vienna, June 13.—Sixty peasants from the mountain passes of Bukovina, Austria, have been arrested on charges of brigandage. Motor cars and pianos plundered from railway vans have been discovered in barns and stables.

Relics Of Napoleon's Early Feet.

Paris, June 13.—Two old 149-millimeter cannons were found yesterday at the bottom of Toulon harbor. They are believed to have been there since 1793 when, 115 years ago, Napoleon Bonaparte recaptured Toulon from the English.

Milton Ter-centenary.

London, June 13.—The council of the British Academy has decided to organize a commemoration of the 300th anniversary of the birth of Milton on December 9th next.

Pansy, the two-year-old daughter of Thomas Pollitt, 51 Chatham street, drank a quantity of carbolic acid, but prompt action saved her life. She is still very ill, but will recover. The child found the bottle in a drawer in a cupboard, and her mother heard her cries, when her lips were burnt.

That the opposition at Ottawa is still standing in the way of even a late militia camp, is shown in order No. 122 of the Gazette, issued today. In brief, the order says that for the information of all concerned in the event of provision not being made for the camps referred to it will be necessary to postpone the camps until the necessary funds are available.

Graves Were Decorated.

This afternoon the graves of departed Oddfellows and Rebekkahs in Cataraqui cemetery were decorated by members of the four local lodges, who drove to the cemetery in vans.
