LOVER'S VENGEANCE JEALOUSY LEADS TO TERRIBLE CRIME.

Body of Young Woman Found Hacked to Pieces in Suburb of Town.

Nice, June 11.—A terrible crime has been committed in the neighborhood of Nice.

Two boys, while walking along a wooded slope on the outskirts of the city last evening, came across the body of a young woman. She had been literally hacked to death with a knife, there being no fewer than twenty-five wounds on the body. The doctors found that four of the stabs had penetrated the heart. The victim, it was evident, had fought desperately for her life. Some distance away were found the bloody, rusty knives and a "transformation."

The murdered woman has since been identified as a dressmaker's assistant named Julia Marchi, who resided close to the scene of the crime. On Tuesday evening she went out in order to meet a friend, and she was not seen alive afterward. The motive of the murder is believed to be vengeance. The dead woman some eight months ago, was engaged to be married to a youth named Portinari. A second young man, named Scopi, who had also sought Julia Marchi's hand in marriage, was jealous of Portinari's success in winning her, and he threatened to be revenged. One night in November last all three met on the Promenade des Anglais. A quarrel ensued between the two men, the upshot of which was that Scopi drew a revolver and shot his rival dead.

The woman, who was the only other witness of the deed, gave evidence against Scopi. He was convicted on her uncorroborated testimony, and was sentenced to eight years' imprisonment. Scopi totally denied his guilt, and his friends always maintained that he was innocent of the killing of Portinari. Now that the woman has been struck down by the hand of an unknown assassin, the police think that some of Scopi's friends are responsible for the deed.

ANTI-DANDELION.

Chemical Now Used to Eradicate Yellow Flower.

The North Dakota station has been experimenting in methods of destroying the dandelion in lawns. As a result of these experiments it is stated that this pest may be eradicated in blue grass lawns, in parks, in meadows and on roadsides without injury to the grass resulting from the use of the chemical employed in the work of destruction.

In order to keep the dandelions out it is necessary to spray at intervals of one month or six weeks throughout the growing period of the year. For ordinary lawn purposes the ideal spraying apparatus is the compressed air type of hand spraying machine. It is necessary that sufficient pressure be maintained by the pump to make a forcible spray of a fine form. If the liquid is thrown in large drops the grass will be more or less injured, as the very young grass roots beneath the soil have slight power of resisting the action of the chemical. The capacity of the pump should be approximately three to four gallons and it should be of such neat construction that one can readily carry it about. Necessarily, it is properly airtight, it will be free from leaks and chances to spill liquids.

The machine should be fitted with about three feet of compressed hose and a three-foot extension rod allowing one to readily swing the nozzle over the lawn. The nozzle should be of such a nature as to throw a rather wide flaring funnel-shaped spray. The most satisfactory substance for general work against dandelions and miscellaneous roadside weeds is iron sulphate, used at the rate of approximately two pounds for each gallon of water. On lawns for dandelions alone where a hand machine is used the strength of one and one-third to one and one-half pounds per gallon will be found to give the desired results, though, if the dandelions are large and coarse and the grass hardy, two pounds for each gallon of water will give best results.

On lawns do not spray until two or three days after cutting, and do not mow the lawn until from two to three days after spraying. Spray on bright sunny days. The lawn should be prepared for spraying by thorough watering preceding the spraying so that it will not need to be watered for two or three days after spraying. Select any day when it is not likely to rain within the first day or two, as heavy rain immediately following will destroy the weed-killing power.

BRITISH PUBLIC TIRED

Of Militant Section of the Woman Suffragists.

The British public is growing tired of the militant section of the women suffragists. For a time it was rather amused at the antics of these energetic young ladies, particularly as some of them were distinctly attractive. Much may be ascribed to a pretty woman, and made audacious, expecting to see in a "Woman's Rights" champion only a formidable female with spectacles and a cotton umbrella, were agreeably disappointed at finding themselves decried and assailed by charming young revolutionaries, dressed in the latest fashion. Besides, the "suffragists" were so genuinely in earnest, and they had, as many thought, a genuine grievance. For a time they were quite in the mode, and instead of being recruited, as their predecessors had been, from the ranks of dowdy middle-class spinsterhood, they had succeeded in enlisting many of the ladies who stand inside the most select circle of London society.

The agitators, too, have found themselves partly derailed by the recent statement of the prime minister in answer to a deputation which called upon him in Downing street. Mr. Asquith said that, while the government did not intend to introduce a "Votes for Women" bill during this parliament, it did propose to put franchise reform on the widest democratic basis, upon its programme, and if any member chose to move an amendment giving women the vote on the same terms as men, the government would leave the house free to consider it. But Mrs. Pankhurst and the other ladies of the moderate party, who have acquiesced in rather than approved the tactics of their forcible sisters, are fairly content with a concession which goes a long way beyond anything previously granted them, and are now devoting themselves earnestly to agitation of the constitutional and peaceful kind.

There is to be a monster procession of women on June 13th, and they hope to show that there are at least a hundred thousand members of the sex of all ages and grades, who are sufficiently interested in the vote to march through London on a Saturday afternoon in order to testify their desire for it. Female suffrage will undoubtedly be one of the issues at the next general election. But it will scarcely be made a line of division between the parties, for the supporters and opponents are pretty equally divided on both sides. The labor members are mostly rather against it. The British workman sees in the woman-worker an industrial competitor with himself, and is not only anxious to give her the power of influencing the legislature.

PROBLEM OF THE AGE.

Of the entire population of the United Kingdom of sixty-five years, and upwards thirty per cent. are in almshouses or in receipt of outdoor relief, and in some communities the proportion reaches eighty per cent. In Germany the family of the average workman has to do with only seven a week and then in insufficient quantities. In New York hundreds of thousands are crowded in tenements in which bodies are dwarfed and souls starved, and a population equal to that of a large city is standing in hopeless idleness.

In fact such as these lies the great tragedy and the great problem of human existence. But to this tragedy the eyes of statesmen are blind and voices raised in demand for the solution of the problem fall upon deaf ears. In Washington the clamor is for battleships sufficient to make of the Pacific an American lake. At Berlin all the energies of the government are centred on the maintenance of an army strong enough to hold the Rhine on the west, and at the same time extend German power to the south and on the high seas. A London discussion centres around means by which a world-wide Empire may be held together.

Flags and artificial boundary lines are more than the wall of starving children. The maintenance of the balance of power is of greater account than the distress of old age. Nineteen centuries of preaching of the gospel of peace and human brotherhood and still untold treasures are being wasted in the creation of implements for human slaughter, while hosts of those who are taxed to provide the treasure are born in rags and die in abject poverty.
