

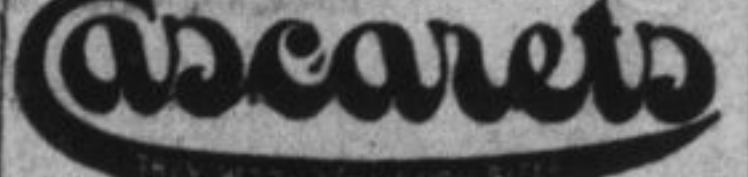

RESCUE OF CHILDREN

THE GRAND WORK THAT IS BEING DONE

By the Children's Aid Society—The Evils Which Threaten the Moral Life of Poor Children.

Do we always remember that what the children of to-day are growing up to be, the people of Canada will be a quarter of a century hence? Nay do we realize that if even an appreciable minority grow up vicious, lawless, reckless of law and the time-honored principles of morality and religion, then, so subtle and rapid is the growth of the seeds of evil, such a minority will certainly spread its contagion among the rest, and prove a burden and a handicap to our country and its growing life.

The large and increasing organization known as the Children's Aid Society, does not forget this most important consideration, but during the fifteen years of its existence, has applied itself with more and more enlightened energy, to meet the case of those children who, through the neglect or ill-treatment of degraded or vicious parents, must, without timely intervention, become a menace to the moral well-being of the community. That during that brief space of time some five thousand neglected children have by its agency been rescued from hopelessly degrading surroundings and influences, is a service that the country may well be grateful for in these days, when the undesirable alien is being summarily deported from the country. We cannot forget our Canadian children, however undesirable they may often seem, in their present stage, but we can step in and save them—and this is what the Children's Aid Society is laboring to do.

Scanlan, \$1.25; reeve about roads and high water, \$1.50; Casper Spangle, roofing hall, building flue and furnishing the material, \$99.26; J. W. Bradshaw, balance of salary as assessor, \$32; Edward Watton, cedar, \$12; J. Wilson, settlement for collecting, 1907, \$9.10; Mrs. Myres, charity, \$2; N. A. Excavation At Memphis.
London Daily Mail.
Memphis, on the Nile, one of the greatest capitals of the ancient world, is buried beneath the ground which is now under cultivation by the villagers of Mitrahineth, who will have to be transferred to other plots and compensated before the contemplated work of excavation can proceed very far. It is estimated that an expenditure of about \$15,000 annually for fifteen years will be required to excavate the temple sites, apart from the city. The unearthing of Memphis, which contained the finest school of Egyptian art, will be by far the greatest archaeological work of recent times and must result in a vast addition to the world's knowledge of ancient Egyptian history and civilization. The work will soon be begun by Prof. Petrie, head of the British School of Archaeology in Egypt.
