PRINGLE RESIGNED

AS OVERSEER OF THE COUNTY ROADS.

A Motion to Dismiss Him Was Decried By 13 to 5—Then Mr. Pringle Resigned—Road Grants Given to Township.

(Continued from page 2.) No action was taken on Councillor Reynolds' resolution to adopt a sixty-six mile road system, Councillor Rankin, a member of the official committee, objected to any further road being added to the system until all tolls on county roads had been wiped out.

It was moved by Councillor Reynolds and seconded by Councillor Franklin, that as there is a certain county road system taking in certain roads in the townships of Loughboro, Kingston and Storrington, the maintenance for which is provided by the whole county of Frontenac, and whereas the other municipalities receive nothing in lieu of said money expended in said townships for maintenance of said roads, that the following townships receive these grants: Barrie, \$12; Beaufort, \$15; Clarendon and Miller, \$30; Garden Island, \$35; Howe Island, \$50; Hinchinbrooke, \$105; Kennebec, \$20; Ontario, \$70; Otonago, \$50; Pottsville, \$500; Portland, \$365; Pottsville, \$360; Palmerston, \$35; Wolfe Island, \$315.

Moved in amendment by Councillors Rankin and Davis, that no action be taken in the matter. The amendment was carried.

On motion of Councillors Drew and Franklin, Reeve David was given power to make necessary repairs on Tanner bridge.

At the Saturday morning session, Councillor Rankin raised objection to the motion passed on Friday evening, making special grants to townships. He declared it to be illegal. It would be better to rescind it, and appoint a committee to go thoroughly into the road question and report at the November session. He moved, seconded by Councillor Davis, that the motion giving grants be rescinded. The motion to rescind was lost on this division.

Yeas—Councillors Davis, Rankin, Shannon—3. Nays—Warden Foley and Councillors Baiden, Brash, Drew, Franklin, Godkin, Hamilton, McAllister, McGregor, Miller, Reynolds, Shannon, York—13.

On motion of Councillors McAllister and Drew, the warden and clerk were instructed to renew the agreement between the county and the Kingston florists of industry for an indefinite period, with the option of cancelling it at any time.

The court house roof came under discussion. Councilor Shannon moved seconded by Councilor Davis that Lemmon & Sons be given the contract for one, three or five years at the option of the council, to keep the court house roof in repair, provided they sign an agreement guaranteeing to keep the roof water tight. Two years ago it cost \$340 to repair the roof, and last year \$250.

Councillor Franklin said that the Marsh bridge in Pittsburg was causing trouble. On his motion, the warden, the chairman of roads and bridges, and Councillor Reynolds were appointed a committee to investigate.

Sheriff Dawson wrote calling attention to quantity conditions in the jail, and stating that the inspector of prisons demanded that the improvements be made.

A petition signed by Byron Gordon and fifty or sixty others was read, asking the council to expropriate the Portland toll road.

William Shannon, former of the Loughboro Lake bridge and Perth road work was questioned as to the stone crushing he did. He replied that he was engaged to do the work by Mr. Pringle and Councillor Stoney. The latter said that Mr. Shannon received his instructions from Mr. Pringle. Mr. Shannon said he had been given no notice to quit crushing stone. Mr. McCrow, who also did stone crushing stated that he was engaged by Mr. Pringle and Councillor Stoney, and got no notice to quit at any time.

Councilor Reynolds moved, seconded by Councilor York, that the services of W. W. Pringle as road overseer, be dispensed with, after thirty days from date, and that the warden appoint a road engineer to act until the council meets in November. The motion was lost on this division.

Yeas—Councillors Baiden, Calvin, Franklin, Reynolds and York—5. Nays—Warden Foley, and Councillors Brash, Davis, Drew, Godkin, Hamilton, McAllister, McGregor, Miller, Rankin, Shannon, Stoney, Thompson—13.

Mr. Pringle then addressed the council, and said he was pleased to see that he had some friends. He intimated that he never expected to be appointed road overseer, as he realized that he lived too far away to look after Perth Road. But he accepted the position tendered him, and had done his work faithfully. Mr. Pringle said his work spoke for itself. He had saved the county much money since he took charge. Mr. Pringle then handed the warden his resignation as overseer, and said he hoped it would be accepted.

On motion of Councillors Rankin and Hamilton, the resignation was accepted.

G. W. Smith, former county engineer was appointed to act as road engineer until the November session of the council, to act under the instructions of the road and bridges committee. After making grants for Perth Road work in Kingston and Loughboro townships, the council adjourned till November.

A DEWAR CELEBRATION.

New Offices of Well-Known Firm Opened in London.
