Smiths but for that eighty-thousand pound estate in Scotland. Walter Stirling is dead; his son Richard, the infant, claims, or it is claimed for him, that he should inherit it. But his uncle, Walter's brother, disputes the claim on the ground that the Dakota divorce was invalid, that Walter and Mrs. Smith were therefore not married, and that the son was consequently not born in lawful wedlock.

It is what lawyers call a nice point, because the Scottish marriage law has peculiarities, also, and these had to be considered. It was alleged, for instance, that even if the Dakota divorce was not legal, yet Walter and Evangeline believed that it was, and cohabited to live as man and wife under a well-known principle of the Scots law.

But Mr. Justice Swinton Eady would not have it. He went back on that romance of 14 years ago, and pointed to certain letters written by Walter Stirling, showing that he had admitted misconduct with Mrs. Smith, and was, in fact, a party to the legal proceedings whereby her marriage to Walter Stirling was rendered the Dakota divorce collusive, and the English courts regard collusion in divorce with no indulgence whatsoever. His lordship held that this Dakota divorce was invalid, therefore that Walter and Mrs. Smith were never legally married; that his son was not born in wedlock; that he died without lawful issue. So the child Richard will have nothing, and his uncle becomes possessor of the lands and the income of the residuary investments. From which it would appear that a Dakota divorce, cheap and expeditious as it is, cannot always be relied upon to cross the ocean without damage.

Integrity of the North Sea. A treaty has just been signed at Berlin by all the big powers concerned in the North sea which insures their integrity and removes all danger of a war of absorption. It is virtually an all European peace treaty based on the status quo. The fact that Germany is in it, too, brings a sign of relief to Little Holland. The signatory powers are England, Germany, France, Denmark, Sweden and the Netherlands. At the same time a similar declaration as to the Baltic sea was signed by Germany, Russia, Sweden and Denmark.

PERILS OF COD FISHING.

Hundreds of Lives Sacrificed on the Grand Banks.

The perils of codfishing on the Grand Banks are tragically illustrated by the terrible experience of the French fishing fleet in the past season, which has lost 10 ships and 250 men during a single summer. This is the worst record in the history of the French flotilla, which have their headquarters at St. Pierre, Miq., since 1900, when 22 vessels and nearly 400 men were lost in the gale which devastated Galveston, and working up the Atlantic seaboard, spent its final fury on the Grand Banks.

The St. Pierre flotilla itself has dropped in five years from 229 vessels to 70 and the St. Malo fleet has also suffered a considerable decline.

The roster of recent years contains some striking stories of tragic disaster to the French fishing vessels. Ten years ago the Vaillants, with 22 men from St. Malo for St. Pierre, Miq., in April, struck an iceberg off Cape Race at midnight in a dense fog and foundered within ten minutes. Of her whole company only 12 escaped in two small boats. They were adrift for a week without food, water or adequate clothing, had no protection from the elements and were stricken with frost-bite in addition to their other miseries. They perished one by one till but three remained. They were picked up by a passing vessel and landed in St. Pierre, where they had to have their hands and feet amputated, so frightfully were these extremities affected by the frost.

The next year the Alasas were dismantled and was totally crippled by a hurricane on the Grand Banks, and her crew of 38 men all but five were swept seaward, and these survivors remained on the floating hull for nearly a fortnight, starving because they were unable to reach the food supplies below, as she had become water-logged, so that they were reduced almost to skeletons when rescued.

As already stated, twenty-two of the fleet were sunk in the Galveston gale in 1900 and the next year five ships and seventy-eight men were missing at the close of the fishery and never a word was heard from them after. The Hirondelle in 1904, the largest vessel in the French fishing flotilla, carrying forty-five men, was torn from her anchorage on the Banks in a gale with but three people on board.

Of the Hirondelle's crew never a man returned, nor did the ship herself with the three men on board ever reach harbor. She was last seen by a Canadian banker drifting before the elements with three franticly gesticulating wretches on her deck, but it was impossible to afford them relief, and they passed out of sight, not to be seen by human eyes evermore.

The worst individual tragedy among the French vessels in late years was the loss of the Cousin Dennis, of St. Malo, early in 1905. This vessel, a large bark, was crossing to St. Pierre with 150 men to crew a number of fishing vessels lying up there for the winter, but she never reached her destination, becoming one of the world's marine mysteries.

The French are not the only victims of fast liners. On the 4th of July, 1905, the American fishing smack Wagon was struck by the British
