

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Homestead Regulations.

ANY even-numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting...

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency...

DUTIES.—(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming and owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent...

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent...

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee \$5.00.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square, \$25.00. DRIFTING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years.
