THE PEOPLE DIVIDED

ON THE PRONUNCIATION OF "TER-CENTENARY."

We Can't Rely on the Nobility For the Correct Pronunciation—The Proper Accent is on the "Cent."

Kingston, June 25.—(To the Editor): Society in Kingston, I am led to believe, is much divided over the pronunciation of the word which is now on everybody's lips, "ter-centenary."

In certain circles the discussion has reached fever heat and some clubs and societies may be said to have become convulsed over this difficult problem.

Three pronunciations are offered, and each has its supporters, but the one which seems to have most favor is "ter centenary," with a strong accent on the "ter," which is sounded as when referring to five o'clock refreshment; and indeed it is the vortaries of these afternoon gatherings, chiefly, who pronounce it in this way.

On being asked for the authority for such a pronunciation the reply is always, "Lord Grey," and if one asks who may be Lord Grey's authority the invariable answer is "Lord Roseberry."

Now, sir, while yielding to no man in my reverence for our nobility I must point out that these noble lords are not in accord with the lexicographer upon whom we have been taught to rely.

Dear old Noah Webster never heard anybody say "ter-centenary." Our almost equally venerable acquaintance, Worcester, says naught of "ter-centenary." The Bostonian "Century" treats "ter-centenary" with silent contempt. The up-to-date, if somewhat bizarre, Funk and Wagnall, makers of the Standard dictionary, do not consider "ter-centenary" worth mentioning. Only one dictionary acknowledges this pronunciation in the slightest degree. It's an English dictionary.

"Ah, ha," cry the ladies, "of course! Naturally, an English dictionary; I thought so."

True enough an English dictionary does mention "ter-centenary." It is Murray's dictionary recently published at Oxford, but it treats the pronunciation with mainly veiled scorn.

"Some" (sic), it says, "say ter-centenary," and others with even less (sic) reason, say ter-centenary," the accent in the latter case being on the third syllable.

This new English dictionary, following the usual analogy, gives the pronunciation as "ter-cent-en-ary," with the accent on the second syllable.

This last pronunciation is the only one given by Webster, Worcester and the Century, but Funk and Wagnall, loving to be a little different, makes it ter-cent-en-ary, with the accent still on the "cent," but the "e" the least shade lengthened.

Now, sir, we may deduce from all this that while we can safely rely on the nobility, for our table manners, the height of our collars, or the cut of our pantaloons, we are justified in looking occasionally with a little doubt upon their opinions concerning the English language.—*TEMERITY.*

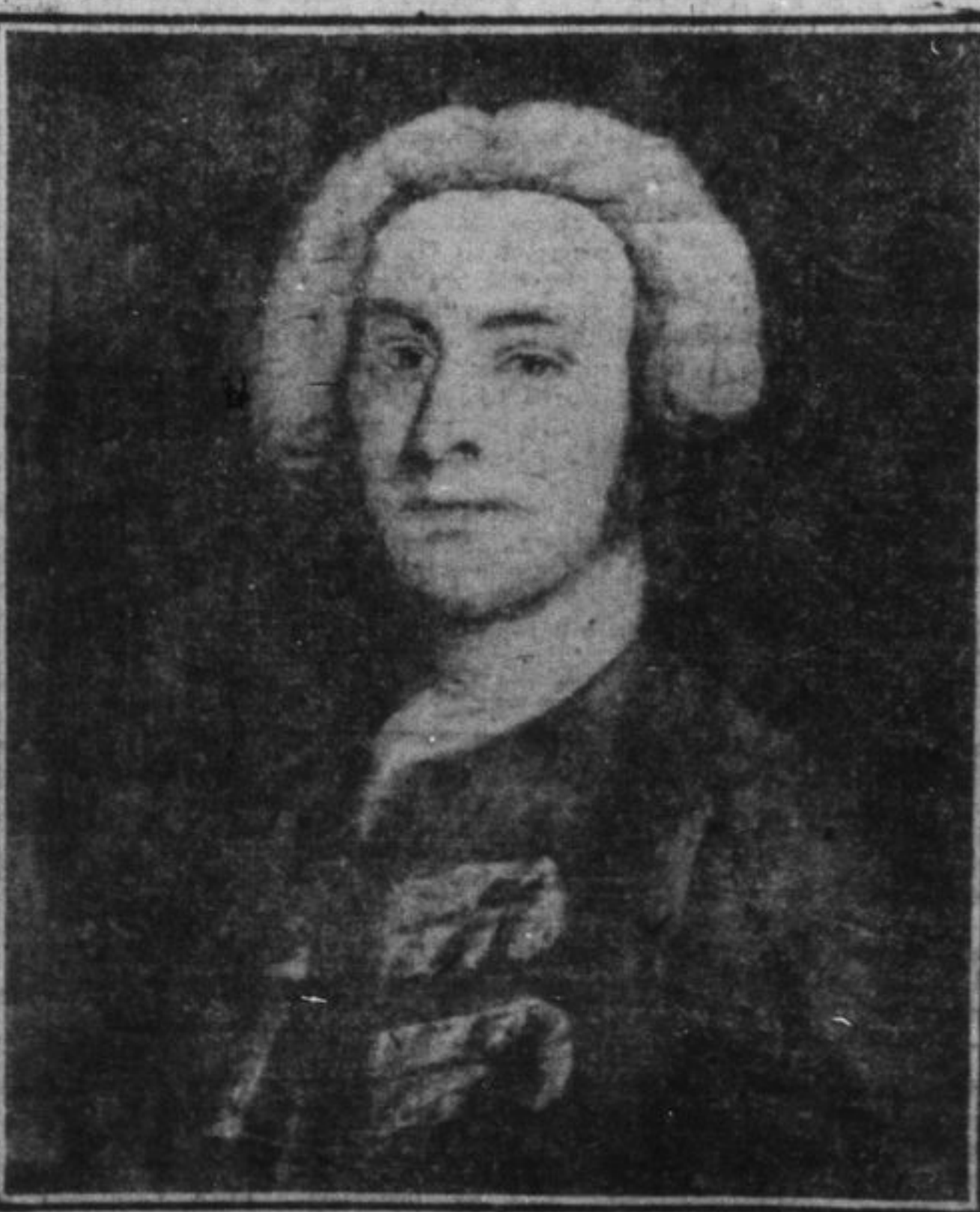

There was a good turnout of the lacrosse players at the cricket field, last night, and the boys put in a couple of hours at good hard practice. They are out to win their game in Belleville on July 1st, and will be in fine shape for that day.

Sporting Notes.

Manager Murray, of the Philadelphia Nationals, has made an offer to Toronto for Jake Gettman, but the latter is not for sale.

Toronto Telegram: Canadian bowlers start for Scotland this week, and if they don't win many games the education they will get in language and liquids will be well worth the money spent.

King Edward has promised to open the Olympic games on July 13th. William Sherring, coach of the Canadian team, declares that the English climate will not affect Canucks, who will all give an excellent account of themselves.

The Amateur Athletic Federation of Canada has sanctioned the Brockville Harriers' road race July 1st, as an independent meet, allowing all amateurs to compete with the exception of those that competed in the King's Birthday road race in Montreal last fall.

Ottawa Free Press: The only noticeable improvement at the Cornwall grounds was a couple of new boards in the fence. The same sun-dried, sway-backed grandstand is there, likewise the comical dressing quarters. That \$10,000 for improvements must have been devoted to players' salaries.

The effects of the new law on racing as a sport bid fair to furnish a surprise if the courts uphold the oral or nod system. Elimination of the old booking element and the mercenary side is believed by many experts to foreshadow the placing of racing on a plane that it has attained in England and France, where enormous dividends paid track owners are unknown.

George Hackenschmidt, the "Russian Lion," fears that his knee was permanently injured in his wrestling match with Frank Gotch for the world's championship in Chicago several months ago. The exact nature of his injury has not been determined, but so far it has failed to respond to the doctors' efforts. They say the knee will be permanently crippled and that Hack will never again be able to go on the mat.

Railway Earnings.

C. P. R. traffic earnings for the third week of June decreased \$332,000 over same week in 1907.

The Grand Trunk railway system traffic earnings from June 15th to 21st, show an appreciable improvement compared with previous weeks. Following are the figures: 1908, \$8,356,75; 1907, \$8,883,825; decrease, \$527,070.
