END OF "BLACK PETER."

A Pet Cat Was Killed By a Street Car.

"Black Peter," a valuable cat owned by James Craig, Princess street, and a pet with the whole neighborhood, is no more. Concerning his sad death, which occurred yesterday afternoon, there is a sad story. Mr. Craig, who is numbered among many followers of Isaac Walton, in this city, had been out fishing with a friend, and made a fine catch. There was one bass, a regular "beauty," weighing close upon three pounds, that attracted the attention of "Black Peter," when he noticed it in a pail of water, all nicely cleaned and ready for eating. So when the coast was clear, Mr. Peter stole the fish, and made off. With the fish in its mouth, the cat hurried across the road, but failed to notice a passing street car, and was run down and cut to pieces. A trail of water from the pail to the door, told the story of the theft, and later the remains of the cat were found on the track. Thus ends the story of the sad end of a pet cat.

A PEACEFUL GATHERING.

May Be 10,000 Women Will Surround Parliament.

London, June 27.—Convinced that the recent tactics have failed to persuade Premier Asquith to accelerate the legislative machinery in their favor the suffragettes project another novel demonstration next Tuesday, with a view to exerting further pressure.

While a delegation will seek an interview with the prime minister, it is the intention to surround the House of Commons with a cordon of suffragettes, which the leaders predict will number at least 10,000. It will be a peaceful gathering, however, and no attempt will be made to force an entry into the house.

A Black Bear Shot.

Smith's Falls, Ont., June 27.—A large black bear was killed on the farm of William Lawson, at Bass Lake, an inland body of water about seven miles from Smith's Falls, a few days ago. The animal was seen coming out of the swamp and was immediately attacked by the farm dog.

After a sharp rough-and-tumble fight between the two, the bear broke away and sprang into a large maple tree. In about half an hour's time it began to descend, and then it was quickly dispatched by a couple of well-directed shots. It was a fine specimen, set black in color, and weighed over 300 pounds.

Case Set For Monday.

A chicken stealing case will come up before Magistrate Farrell on Monday. Some time ago, a charge was made against a man, who until recently was chief liberal whip and member of parliament for the Lindsey division of West Yorkshire, W. Russell, liberal member of parliament for South Tyrone, is made a privy councillor.

Among the baronets are Sir Thomas Lauderdale, Bt., a well-known physician, and Robert William Parks, liberal member of parliament for the south division of Lincolnshire, who was closely associated with the late Charles T. Verney in his projects for the improvement of the traction system of London.

She was standing in the doorway when a bolt shot past, tearing off the door check and burning her arm. A curious fact is that, although at the time the place seemed vivid with light, no fire ever started. This is an experience long to be remembered.
