MASONIC MEMORIAL UNVEILED TO A PIONEER FREEMASON.

Address of M. W. Bro. J. Ross Robertson, Past Grand Master and Historian of the Grand Lodge of Canada.

At St. Peter's church, Brockville, Ont., on 21st June M.W. Bro. J. Ross Robertson unveiled the memorial tablet to the memory of E.W. Bro. Ziba M. Phillips, deputy provincial grand master from 1842 to 1845, and president of the Kingston masonic convention, 1817-22.

There was a large attendance of the brethren from Sussex and Salem lodges, of Brockville, and from other lodges in the district. The tablet was erected by Sussex and Salem lodges, of Brockville; St. James, at South Augusta; Mount Zion, at Kemptville; Crystal Fountain, at North Augusta, in the 15th district, and Ancient St. John's, at Kingston, in the 14th masonic district.

The regular morning service was conducted by the Rev. Harold Bedford-Jones, the rector, and just previous to the close of the service M. W. Bro. Robertson stepped to the front of the chancel and said:

It is surely a good and pious purpose that is served by the presence here to-day of the members of the craft of Freemasons who reside in this town and in this district. You, my brethren, are here to-day, in this sacred edifice, dedicated to the worship of the Great Architect of the Universe, and at this hour of prayer and praise, to assist in the unveiling of a memorial plate to a brother Freemason who for nearly forty years of his life was a faithful worker in our ranks, and a pillar of the craft in the old province of Upper Canada.

You predecessors in the congregation, outside of the ranks of the craft, also have an interest in the life that is commemorated by the simple ceremonial of this hour. Ziba Marcus Phillips lived one of those lives that may not have filled many pages in universal history, but it was one of those lives that did fill a big place in the making of Canada. Bro. Phillips was the son of Sergeant Ziba Phillips, of the King's Rangers, a non-commissioned officer who was noted for his work in connection with the military secret service from 1776 to 1781, and he was a grandson of Ziba Phillips, a private in the same regiment which did such gallant work under the command of Major Rogers. The father was also a member of the craft, for his name is frequently mentioned in connection with masonry of old Upper Canada.

Bro. Ziba Phillips, whose memory we honor this morning, was born in the city of Oswego on the 16th July, 1757, just one hundred and twenty-one years ago. About 1791 his father removed from the United States to the then pioneer town of Kingston and afterwards to the township of Augusta, where he drew land as a United Empire Loyalist, and resided on lot 29 in the township near the old French fort, and later he bought lot 28, which was the site of that pioneer fortress.

Ziba, junior, was a bright and active lad, eager for knowledge and fond of reading and as an old record has it, "a most obedient and loving son." His boyhood days were uneventful. The rudiments of his education were received at his mother's knee, for he surely thought that her boy had better be unborn than untaught. An old army pedagogue who dwelt near the Phillips' home, was a valued neighbor, and many an hour he spent in the humble dwelling on lot 28, instructing the lad who in after years was to lead so useful a life. Ziba was an apt pupil and his struggles for the rudiments of an education were crowned with success, for before he was twenty-five years of age he had mastered the science of medicine and surgery and was entitled to practice the healing art in the woods of the old Midland district.

Initiation Into The Craft. In 1807, his father, who was an enthusiastic Mason, initiated his son in a lodge that met in Shipman's tavern in Midland and in 1809 his father opened a lodge in a stone house, with a cottage roof, which stood on the Phillips lot in the Prescott Road. Ziba Marcus was an active brother from the day, as we Masons say, that he was brought from the darkness of the world into the light of the craft.

He proved himself a true man in the growing usefulness of his humane and noble life as a backwoods doctor. He had to ride on paths blazed through the bush to carry the healing of medicine and the blessings of surgery to sufferers in the humble cabins of the pioneers.

The craft requires of its sons that faith in God which shows itself in merciful service towards humanity. Bro. Phillips was a faithful craftsman in time of peace. He was exemplary in the discharge of his civil duties, and he never lost sight of the allegiance due to his sovereign. When this new land was invaded, and the patriot voice of Isaac Brock called the people of Upper Canada to the colors, Bro. Phillips proved his fidelity to that great foundation principle of the craft, which requires loyalty to the nation from all brethren.

As a volunteer for the defence of Canada, he went out to the help of the old flag against the might of the invader. He joined the Canadian Fencibles and became a lieutenant. He fought bravely behind Brock at Queenston Heights in October, 1812. He was present at the attack on Sackett's Harbor in May, 1813, and he was in the thick of the fight at Lundy's Lane in July, 1814, and was captured by six of the enemy, but escaped, and with the aid of some of his company turned round and captured his captors. When the shrill shriek of musketry had ceased, when the boom of cannon was lost in who through the woods and over the hilltops, when the torch had sounded the last call to arms for the troops of Britain and when the

victorious flag of our empire floated over an unconquered province, Bro. Ziba M. Phillips returned to Brockville and in due course became a lieutenant-colonel in the Grenville militia.

Having risked his life to restore peace with honor to the land he loved, he again faced the daily round, the common tasks of life as they had it in those far off years, when the now beautiful town was a village by the riverside.

His Work For The Craft. His travels through the province brought him in contact with his brethren of the craft.

He saw that the management of the craft was not what it should be, and that if some active hand was not outstretched, the work of a great fraternity would be materially impaired.

The provincial grand lodge, that is the governing body that manages the score of lodges in the province, was dormant, for the provincial grand master had answered his final summons.

In this state of affairs, Bro. Phillips saw his opportunity and quickly he seized it. It was well that he did so, for by his act he saved after three years of strenuous labor, the re-organization of the provincial grand lodge. He called representatives of all the lodges in Upper Canada to meet at Kingston.

He placed the position of the craft before the brethren, roused them to the danger, and inspired them with his own enthusiasm.

The great Masonic conventions in Kingston from 1817 to 1822 were the outcome of his work.

His leadership taught the brethren to keep a system of craft government alive by a series of easy regulations, for there was no authority in Canada to re-organize the dormant provincial lodge.

The mother grand lodge of England, that really controlled Masonic affairs in this province, was appealed to by the convention which met in Kingston, outside of the ranks of the craft, also have an interest in the life that is commemorated by the simple ceremonial of this hour.

The grand lodge of England came to his aid. H. R. H. the Duke of Sussex, grand master of England, saw that the Canadian craft were in a state of disorganization, and that a strong hand would have to deal with the conditions.

Simon Macgillivray, one of the founders of North-West company, was a prominent English Mason, a personal friend of the Duke of Sussex, and by request of the duke visited Canada and re-organized the provincial grand lodge.

Bro. Macgillivray on arrival in Canada, learned of the good work done by Bro. Phillips, and on his way from York to Montreal he stopped over at Brockville, to confer by order of the grand master of England, the honorary rank of deputy provincial grand master on Bro. Phillips.

Bro. Macgillivray, on a pleasant day at Brockville with Bro. Phillips, and expressed great gratification in meeting the brother who had done such active work in the year 1822.

Ten years later the provincial grand lodge again became dormant, and the craft was again ready for the perils by the wisdom and activity of Bro. Phillips.

True, he did not re-organize the provincial body, but he visited the principal lodges and kept the craft well in hand till 1837, when he organized the second Kingston convention, and in 1842 instituted a provincial grand lodge at Smith's Falls, which was composed of the lodge in Brockville and those in the Midland district.

The Craft Re-organized. It was his energetic work in this district that compelled the brethren of the home and western districts to re-organize the dormant provincial grand lodge and form, under Sir Allan McNab, in 1845, the third provincial grand lodge, which afterwards united with the grand lodge of Canada, formed in 1855 and that body is now the present grand lodge of Canada.

In 1842, there were about thirty lodges at work in the province of Upper Canada, with a total membership of less than thousand members. Annual expenditure in benevolence of not more than a few hundred dollars. To-day in this province there are 400 lodges with a membership of about 40,000, and an annual expenditure of \$25,000 to the aged members of the craft and to widows and orphans of members who have passed away.

The grand life work of Bro. Phillips for the craft virtually ended in 1845, two years before he was laid to rest in the little graveyard by the roadside, four miles from this town, known as Read's burying ground. This simple memorial to departed worth is the first tribute of gratitude that the craft of this province has ever dedicated to the services of the heroes and pioneers of Masonry.

I have given you the outlines of a life that was great with a greatness that is weighed on scales that are truer than our poor earthly standards.

Ziba M. Phillips served his day and generation and was one of those who laid the foundations of that great temple of Masonic strength, the Grand Lodge of Canada, in this province, the shelter of 40,000 craftsmen, who can say of Ziba Marcus Phillips what was said of Sir Christopher Wren, "If you wish to see his monument, look around you."

It is appropriate to this ceremony that the few words I have given you should be said about our brother Freemason who did so much for the institution of Freemasonry in the old province of Upper Canada.

not delight to turn over the leaves of our memory, there to find treasured recollections of the long ago. How often are we asked by those who, younger in years, sit around our hearths and homes, to tell them stories of the pioneer days when our forefathers, who now foregather in the better land, fought the battle of life, when this vast province was the home of the kings of the primeval woodland?

Yes, when in the silence of the woods the sweetest sound was the clip of the well-sharpened axe that turned the stately oaks and the stately pines into habitations for the early migrant settlers. Surely, we do what is right when we cherish and commemorate the memories of the men and women who struggled in the olden time to turn the forest into the cleared land, that in the autumn time, became the home of harvest and of golden grain. And with the men and women of the later and better days, the descendants of the pioneers, who as they sit at their firesides with their little ones around them, talk of the grandfathers and grandmothers who, with not much of this world's goods to bless them, braved the perils of the great Atlantic to found a home for themselves and those who would come after them in this good land of Canada.

Our brother, Ziba Marcus Phillips, was one of those men who believed whatever was worth doing at all was worth doing well. As a lad, he was earnest in the search of knowledge. As a husband and father he was one of the most affectionate of men. As a physician he was attentive, humane and gentle. As a soldier, he was all ways in the front rank. As a citizen, he had the respect of all who knew him. As a brother Freemason, he was true to his obligation, and his work in our ranks will never be forgotten, and in token of regard for his work and worth I now unveil this memorial tablet.
