FOG SIGNAL CASE

A SIDE WORTH SERIOUS CONSIDERATION.

The Diophone the Result of Many Years' Experiment—Thousands of Dollars is Spent Before Any Money is Made.

J. P. Northey, president of the Canadian Fog Signal company, has taken a sensible course in communicating to the press his side of the matter in the alleged overcharges for fog signals supplied to the government. Mr. Northey was a witness in the inquiry being conducted by Judge Cassels, and in the course of his evidence it was elicited that the material cost of the signal, for which he charges the government \$4,000, is \$653. There the matter stood, leaving the impression of an overcharge, which Mr. Northey combats in his letter. The facts favor the inference that the inquiry is perhaps unavoidably one-sided. Both the judge and Mr. Watson, the counsel in the case, are chiefly solicitous about discovering wrongdoing, and there is no counterbalancing weight to adjust matters when there is something to be said on the other side. That there was a good deal to be said on the other side in his particular case is made evident by Mr. Northey's letter.

The bare statement that an article whose cost of manufacture is \$653 should be sold for \$4,000 may appear extravagant without explanation, but Mr. Northey has an explanation which the public is bound to consider. Mr. Northey says his diophone fog signal is the result of years of costly experiment. It was necessary to purchase a boat and boat equipment, and make tests in all kinds of weather. Experts were retained for years. The foghorns of other manufacturers, including the best that could be obtained in England, were purchased for the sake of comparative tests. Testing stations were also established. The result of Mr. Northey's experiments was the invention which he has patented, and which, he says, is admitted by English, Scotch, Irish and Canadian experts to be the most powerful sound-producing instrument in the world.

It is not necessary to lecture on the subject of patents. As commodities they are in a class by themselves. They are absolute monopolies. If you must buy an article covered by a patent you must give the patentee his price. There is no part of the duties of the marine department so supremely important as the protection of the shipping in the Gulf of St. Lawrence and along the great stretches of lake and river that constitute the waterways of Canada. The safe navigation of our national problems. The government is bound to get the best appliances procurable for this purpose. The most searching tests proved that Mr. Northey's diophone was the very best fog signal that could be obtained, and the government has procured and set up some seventy of them. Mr. Northey has no doubt made very well out of his invention. He is not the first inventor who has done so. Men have become rich by inventing a garter-buckle or a collar-button. In that case the inventor makes his money out of the multitude, often charging ten times the cost of the article. In Mr. Northey's case his customers could only be governments, and their purchases could not be numerous. To get an adequate return for his outlay and his inventive talent, his profits on his infrequent transactions would have to be large. If the government refused to pay his price and put in an inferior signal, would the marine interests, or even the general public, praise the economy? It is very doubtful. The protection of human life must be the first consideration. Look at the matter fairly and it will not seem so flagrant a case that the headlines of the opposition press would like the uninquiring public to believe.

MOTHER SERIOUSLY BURNED.

While Rescuing Children From Halifax, N.S., June 29.—Mrs. Andrew Dauphins, residing at 16 Victoria Lane, was seriously burned, yesterday, in saving the lives of her three little children, who had accidentally set their house on fire. The children knocked a lighted lamp over. In an instant the bedding was in flames, and the mother, in a terrified condition, brought her three children to her rescue. She seized the little ones and carried them to safety, but in doing so she was badly injured. Her hair and face were terribly burned, and it is likely that she will lose the sight of one eye.

REFUSED PERMITS.

Scheme to Import Two Thousand Laborers Frustrated. Vancouver, B.C., June 28.—The Tokio Emigration company, of Yokohama, recently received an order from the Canadian Nippon Supply company, Vancouver, for two thousand Japanese laborers to be sent to Canada. The Tokio company applied to the Japanese department of foreign affairs for the necessary permits, but the department replied that under the Lemieux agreement no more laborers would be permitted to sail for Canada, without the express consent of the Canadian government, and permission was therefore refused.

KAISER AFRAID OF WAR.

Prophecies That He Will Be Last Hohenzollern.

Paris, June 29.—The Echo de Paris quotes an anonymous member of the Emperor Francis Joseph's immediate entourage to the effect that it is well known in Austrian court circles that the German emperor, despite his bellicose talk, has a superstitious dread of war on account of two old prophecies, according to which he is destined "to be the last Hohenzollern ruler."
The first prophecy is not completely known, but it was made by an old monk of Teinin. The other, which is well-known in several European courts, originated in an ancient monastery in the neighborhood of Mayence. This also foretells the end of the Hohenzollerns with William II, adding that his death would be caused by a great war.

SENTENCED FOR TREASON.

Six Prisoners Condemned to Death.
Cettigne, June 29.—The trial of thirty-six prisoners charged with revolutionary activity—in connection with the discovery of a score of bombs here last year and at which sensational testimony induced, involving Crown Prince George, of Serbia, in a conspiracy against Montenegro, has resulted in six of the accused being condemned to death, three to life imprisonment, and twenty-seven, including five former cabinet ministers, to terms of imprisonment ranging from six to twenty years.

Montreal, June 29.—About 1,000 head of butchers' cattle, 173 calves, 109 sheep and lambs, and 1,219 fat hogs were offered for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards this forenoon. The hot weather helped to depress the prices in many cases, grass-fed cattle were lower, quality considered, while fat hogs have declined nearly one-quarter of a cent per lb. Prime hogs sold at 51c. to 51c. per lb.; pretty good cattle, 4c. to 5c., and the common stock, 3c. to 4c. per lb. Sheep sold at 4c. to 5c. per lb. Lambs sold at \$1 to \$5 each. Good lots of fat hogs sold at about 6c. per lb.
