

DEATH OF A FARMER**HE WAS A SUFFERER FROM ERYSPELAS.**Removed to Belleville Hospital
For Treatment—An Arm Was
Badly Crushed While Working
in a Quarry.

Picton, June 30.—Work has begun this week in preparation for a new ward school, for junior public school work. The building will be a single story, three bays wide, and contain two rooms; it will be built at an outlay of about \$2,500. Strawberries are an excellent crop throughout the county.
