PRESBYTERIAN UNION

Meeting Opened in Cooke's Church Tuesday Morning.

A meeting of the Kingston Presbyterian union was opened in Cooke's church, Tuesday morning. Among those present were Rev. A. B. Drumpp, president, Belleville; Rev. R. S. Laidlaw, Belleville; Joseph Gander, Newburgh; William Shearer, Pictou; W. Cameron, Melrose; Rev. Dr. MacTavish, Rev. Dr. Macgillivray, Miss Montgomery, Kingston; Miss Jessie Redmond, Pictou; Miss Moore, Newburgh; Miss Ada Anderson, John Reid, Belleville; Mrs. Darling and Mrs. Hay, Lanark; Miss McFarlane and Miss Clazie, Melrose; Miss Chestnut, Pictou, and Mr. Reid, in charge of the Kingston depot church.

Mr. Laidlaw was appointed secretary in the absence of T. Donnelly, of Deseronto.

A report was presented by the president showing that a map of the Presbytery had been printed and distributed, and that two stations, Carleton and Maynooth, had been supported by the union.

The treasurer's report showed the total amount raised to be \$349.70, with a balance now on hand of \$72. The nominating committee recommended the election of the following officers, to be voted in at to-night's session: President, Rev. A. H. Drumpp; secretary, Rev. R. S. Laidlaw; treasurer, John Cook; executive committee, Rev. W. Shearer, Rev. J. E. Smith, H. W. Newman, Rev. J. Binnie, W. Moore, Rev. Dr. MacTavish, D. G. Laidlaw.

The committee also recommended that the next meeting, on June 30th, 1909, be held in John street church, Belleville. The city press was also extended a vote of thanks for the publication of the programme for the present meeting.

Reward Is Offered.

Spokane, Wash., June 30.—One thousand dollars in gold is offered as a reward in Spokane for the recovery of eighteen black diamonds and sixty thin diamonds, valued at \$12,000, stolen from the Diamond Drill company at the Centre Star mine, Roseland, B.C., the morning of June 21st. The diamonds were owned by Fred Stow and E. H. Knight of Spokane, who used them in drilling. While there is no clue, the police believe that some one familiar with the office is responsible for the loss of the gems.

BICYCLE FALL PROVES FATAL.

Isaiah Beaubiah Hurt on Saturday Night. Syracuse, N.Y., Post-Standard. Thrown from his bicycle, Saturday evening, Isaiah Beaubiah was so injured that he died at St. Joseph's hospital, Syracuse, on Sunday morning. He was fifty-two years old. Mr. Beaubiah was night watchman for the Brown-Lipe gear company. He lived in the Bier, and it was while he was riding down the Golden street hill, after a dinner with friends in Bellevue avenue, that the accident occurred.

The front wheel of his bicycle turned suddenly and in trying to right it he was thrown to the pavement, striking on his head. When picked up he was unconscious and did not regain consciousness. He died of concussion of the brain.

Deceased was at one time a policeman on the Kingston force and has quite a number of friends and relatives in Kingston and vicinity.

Toronto health department reports 140 cases of diphtheria, for June. An Independent Telephone company will seek an entrance into Chatham, Ont.

Sir Edward Malet, the well-known British diplomatist, whose last office was that of ambassador to Germany, is dead.

Following threats, from the Black Hand a month ago St. Bonaventure's College, at Allegheny, Pa., was burned, on Tuesday morning.

A man named "Scotty" Morrison, a native of Aberdeen, Scotland, fell off the wharf at Owen Sound, Ont., on Monday night and was drowned. His body was recovered.

J. W. Pearin, at one time postmaster at Weston, was, to-day, committed for trial and charges of fraud alleged to have been connected with cashing cheques.

The provincial secretary's department will receive offers of land, in blocks of 400 acres or over, situated in York county, on which to build new Central prison.

A special from Fabriz says that after seven days' heavy fighting the constitutional party, at that place, has yielded and seeks the pardon of the shah through the intermediation of the Russian consul.

The Stormont account was before Justice Oulex on Tuesday morning, and judgment reserved. W. D. Macpherson, M.P.P., K.C., said there was no desire to secure the seat for Mr. Pringle on technicalities and the action was in reality to have the case clearly defined.

F. W. Rosehen, the Montreal stockbroker, who failed some time ago, and was later expelled from the New York Consolidated Exchange, has been required a second time at the instance of Sicotte & Co., on the plea that he is making away with his property to defraud his creditors.

It is understood, in railway circles, that Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific railway, will shortly open negotiations with the minister of railways, with a view to securing running rights over the intercolonial railway from St. John to Halifax, for the C.P.R.

Magnosella Sherstnova, confined in Kiev political prison, was, Tuesday, shot and killed by one of the prison sentinels, who discovered her signalling with a mirror to some of her co-prisoners. She was standing at a window at the time and the sentinel's first shot put an end to her life.

Tramps attacked and threatened the crew of a C.P.R. train, No. 2, near Belleville. Policemen encountered the tramps running along the tracks towards Ottawa, and called upon them to stop, a chase resulting before a few revolver shots caused the tramps to obey. The men were brought to Ottawa and sentenced to terms ranging from a month to six weeks.

MISSING FROM HOME.

Fifteen-Year-Old Boy Cannot Be Located.

Alexander Watt, aged fifteen, who has been employed on the farm of Charles Moor, at Elginburg, for the past two years, is missing, and up to the present time no trace of him can be found. Mr. Moore notified the police about his disappearance this morning. The lad left the farm on Sunday night, and said nothing to Mr. Moor about going, and the latter cannot account for his leaving, as he was a good worker, and appeared to be satisfied. When he left, the lad was attired in his working clothes, leaving his best clothes at home. He had very little money. The lad was taken from an Orphan's home by Mr. Moor.

MODERN ROMEO SHOT.

Pierced By Bullet Clinging to Rope Ladder.

Huntsville, Mo., June 30.—J. Bagby, twenty years old, was shot and instantly killed near here last night, when, like Romeo of old, he clung to a rope ladder and talked to his sweetheart, Nellie Carter, seventeen years old, the daughter of a well-to-do farmer.

E. J. Carter, Jr., the girl's brother, is being pending the coroner's inquest. Young Carter admits the shooting, but declares he thought Bagby a burglar, and did not know he had killed his sister's suitor until he struck a light and looked at the dead youth's face.

The Carters and the Bagbys are neighbors and live five miles south of Huntsville. Both families are prominent and were friendly until young Bagby began to pay attentions to his neighbor's daughter about six months ago. Her brother, it is said, opposed the match, and Bagby was forbidden to see her or enter the Carter premises.
