PRESBYTERIAL UNION
SOME FINE ADDRESSES WERE DELIVERED.

Rev. Dr. Pidgeon, in stirring address, Declared Present Laws Against Gambling to Be Absurd.
The attendance at the Tuesday afternoon session of the Kingston Presbyterial Union, in Cooke's church, was larger than in the morning, but at no time was it as large as the merits of the programme deserved.
After Rev. Dr. Macgillivray had conducted the devotional exercises, and the report of the nominating committee had been adopted, Rev. J. Binnie, of Tweed, gave an instructive address on home missionary work of the Kingston Presbyterial Union. With the aid of a map of presbytery, which was prepared last year, he showed where the mission fields were located, and indicated especially, the aid that had been rendered to the mission fields of the Presbyterial Union.
Rev. W. Shearer, of Pictou, opened a conference on "How Can This Union Become More Effective?" The consensus of opinion seemed to be that more delegation work would have to be done. At present, only about one quarter of the Sunday schools and young peoples' societies are contributing to the work of the union.
A. S. Nelles followed with an inspiring address on "How to Interest Young Men in the Young Peoples' Society." He emphasized the need of manliness on the part of ministers, and leaders in young peoples' societies. A place must be found for the young man, the meetings must be bright, and some definite work must be aimed at, and soul-saving must be always kept in view.
"The United Kingdom," was the subject of a very able address by Rev. Prof. W. G. Jordan, of Queen's College. Very clearly did he outline the condition of society in the Kingdom of Israel, under the reigns of David and Solomon. In the opinion of Prof. Jordan, David was a real hero, who could scarcely be praised too highly, but Solomon was often overrated, and given credit for talent he did not possess.
At the close of the afternoon session high tea was served by the ladies in the Sunday school room. Between fifty and sixty guests were present.
The devotional portion of the evening service was conducted by Rev. Mr. Laidlaw, of Belleville, after which a very instructive and somewhat amusing address was given by Princeps A. A. Jordan of Victoria school, on "How to Secure and Retain the Attention of a Class." The speaker emphasized the importance of having the lesson well prepared, of questioning, and of making the lesson real to the class.
Rev. Dr. MacFavish, of Cooke's church followed, with an address on "What Can a Young Peoples' Society do for the Local Church and its Minister, and What Type of Organization is Best Fitted to meet Purposes?" In his opinion, the Christian Endeavor will outlive most of the other organizations. Partly because it brings the members into world wide union, or fellowship, because its committee work is so admirably planned, and each member of the society something to do, and because its publications are so interesting and stimulating.
The address of the evening was given by Rev. Dr. Pidgeon, convenor of the general assembly's committee on social and moral reform. Dr. Pidgeon outlined the work before the committee. It deals with temperance, obscenity, literature, gambling, cigarette evil, and social vice.
Dr. Pidgeon declared that our present laws against gambling were absurd, inasmuch as they forbade a man to make bets in a building or tent, or even under an umbrella, but if he kept moving, near a race track, he could make as many bets as he had time to handle. He is of the opinion that one of the most hopeful signs of the times is that the labor unions are beginning to line up with the church, to secure better conditions for working people and to destroy many of the evils that are so rampant now. The aim of the committee is not simply to punish vice, or to enforce the law, but to prevent it, so that the temptation might be done away with, and that the people might be saved from all the evils that follow. The one great aim was to destroy the evils.
The members of the union very cordially thanked those who had taken part in the programme, the management of Cooke's church for the use of the church for the meetings, and the special vote of thanks was also tendered to the ladies for the edible repast provided in the afternoon.

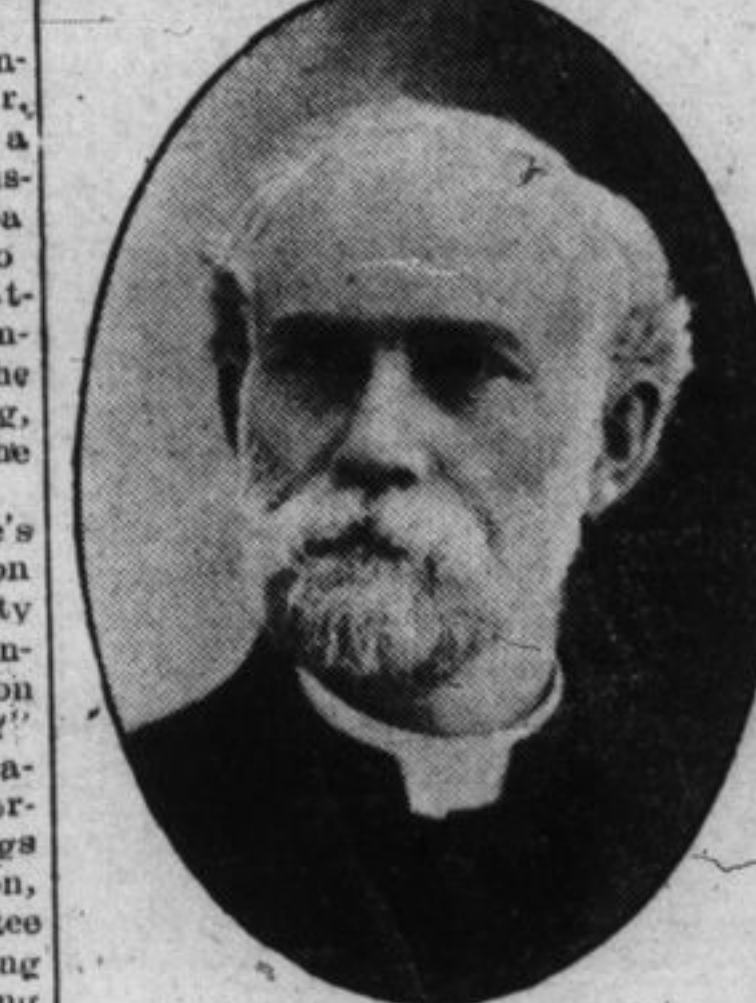

REV. DR. KINGSLEY.
The Young Parish Priest of Kingston Mills.
One of the most successful young priests of the diocese of Kingston is Rev. Wilfrid T. Kingsley, D.D., of the Church of the Holy Name, Cusheonville. Dr. Kingsley is a native of Wolfe Island, and received his primary education in the island public school and also in Wellington street public school, Kingston. Then he entered the Kingston Collegiate Institute, where he spent a couple of years. Following that he spent three years in St. Michael's College, Toronto. For the next five years he studied at the Sulphur Springs Theological Seminary, Montreal. In September, 1901, he was ordained to the priesthood, at Wolfe Island, by Archbishop Gauthier. Then he went to Rome and studied two years in the Gregorian University, where he won the degree of Doctor of Divinity, taking high honors. On his return he was appointed secretary and chancellor of the Diocese of Kingston, by Archbishop Gauthier, in 1903-1907. A year ago he succeeded Rev. Fr. J. J. Collins as parish priest at Cusheonville, more commonly known as the Kingston Mills district. Dr. Kingsley is popular with his people, and doing good work in his parish.
