GAY IN GANANOQUE

A GREAT DOMINION DAY CELEBRATION.

W. H. Carson's "May Wax" Won the 221 Class—Victorias Debeated at Baseball—Summary of the Day's Events.

Gananoque, July 2.—Gananoque's Dominion day celebration was one of the best exhibitions of field sport ever held here. The committee in charge deserves unstinted praise. J. A. McCannan, mayor, as chairman; Clarke Allen, as general secretary; George K. Taylor, as treasurer; and W. C. McCannan, as race secretary, have been indefatigable in their labors, and to them and the hearty support rendered by the citizens is due the great success of the event.

At 10.15 o'clock, the big event of the morning was called, the Marathon road race, over a course variously estimated at from eight to ten miles, starting at the Bank of Toronto, out Stone street to cross road, to fourth concession, Leeds, down the concession to Gray's blacksmith shop, and thence west to Bank of Toronto. There were fifteen starters. Howard Linklater acted as judge of the course, and Michael McDonald as starter. The fifteen contestants got away pretty well together, but soon arranged in bunches, in order of ability. The finish was made by Robert O'Brien, Gananoque, time, 53 min. 48 sec. Walter Cole, Deseronto, second, in 54 min. 18 sec. Five others finished well within the hour. The following started: Russell, Brockville, third; Wood, Barriefield; Murray, Barriefield; Edward Root, Gananoque, sixth; Rex Cosh, Gananoque, eighth; Charles Tinney, Gananoque, seventh; Roy Mullins, Gananoque, fifth; Charles Brant, Gananoque; Robert O'Brien, Gananoque, first; William Wright, Gananoque; Clarence Pennock, Gananoque; Osborne McDonald, Gananoque; Francis Stone, Deseronto, sixth; Walter Cole, Deseronto, second; Charles Lalrose, Gananoque, fourth. Judges at finish, Thomas Field and Gordon Case; Dr. F. J. O'Connor, accompanier.

At 1.30 p.m., the usual parade to the Driving Park was headed by the 11th Regimental band escorting the firemen and followed by the Citizens' band escorting the Victoria baseball team of Kingston and Ganarocks of Gananoque; Brockville lacrosse team and Gananoque lacrosse team. At 2 p.m., the Victorias of Kingston and a picked team from Gananoque, tried conclusions at baseball, with William Knight acting as umpire, Gananoque winning in a good game, by a score of 9 to 3. The return game will be played in Kingston on Labor day.

At 3.30 the Brockville and Gananoque lacrosse teams crossed sticks, in a good fast game, the home team winning by 7 goals to 2. A return game will be played in Brockville to-day.

The only accident noted during the course of events was a collision between two racing sulkeys at the Driving Park. In a pretty well damaged, and the driver thrown out, but fortunately not injured to any extent.

At 7.30 p.m., a hard time parade was held under the management of the I.O.O.F. Orientals, starting from the I.O.O.F. hall, down to market square. This was followed by a band concert at the market square, and the whole proceedings were concluded with a display of fireworks, in charge of William Hazel.

The attendance at the park was a record one during the afternoon, excursions arriving here by water and throughout the morning. Kingston lent a goodly number, Clayton, Alexandria Bay and surrounding islands a large number, and the surrounding townships, a large crowd. Upwards of \$2,000 in prizes was distributed.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS. A 20-acre section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 16-acre reserves, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less. Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made in accordance with certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader. An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry. DUTIES.—(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years. (2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement. (3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother). (4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line. SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS. COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 per acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton. QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee \$5.00. At least 100.00 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the mining recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended, and all other requirements complied with, the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre. PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00. BREEDING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10.00 a mile per annum. Royalty, 25 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000. W.
