A GREAT DRAWBACK IS THE DANGER OF ICE IN HUDSON BAY.

Boats Would Have to Be Built Very Stoutly and Would Be Slow—The Crops Could Not Be Moved the Same Year.

Montreal, July 4.—Capt. Gray, of the Hudson Bay Supply company's ship Pelican, now in port, has had thirty-seven years experience in the navigation of Hudson Bay and contiguous waters, and is naturally greatly interested in the recent declarations by Canadian ministers that a railway must be built from the western grain fields to Fort Churchill, to provide an additional outlet to Europe for Canada's growing grain supplies. He does not attach the same value to the Hudson Bay route as appears to be held in government circles. In his first place it is dangerous at all times on account of the immense quantities of ice moving about and vessels would have to be built so stoutly to provide safety that they would be necessarily very slow. Then, again, the route is only navigable for a period each summer of between three and four months and even then the ice danger is still there. Our season's grain crop could not be moved until the following July or August, which would be a great drawback.

THREE WAYS OF SUICIDE.

Decided Upon All For Three Girls He Loved.

Chicago, July 4.—A despatch to the Record-Herald from Hazelhurst, Miss., says: Unable to decide which of the three women he really wanted to marry Eli Hood, seventeen years of age, a border at the farmhouse of Eli Graves, eight miles from Hazelhurst, yesterday decided that the best way out of the difficulty was to commit suicide in such a way that each of the women would know that he had killed himself for her.

For Miss Carrie Nelson, eighteen years of age, he swallowed sixty grains of morphine. For Miss Eva Spillman, aged twenty-five, he drank four ounces of laudanum, and for Miss Henrietta McDonald, aged sixteen, he put the muzzle of a shot gun in his mouth and pulled the trigger with his toe.

Beside his body was found on a table a paper wrapper that contained the morphine. On it was scrawled "for Carrie." The empty laudanum bottle stood by a slip of paper on which was written, "for Eva." An empty envelope on which a picture of a shot gun had been drawn was inscribed "Henrietta."

Except that he had been acting queerly and that he had become pensive, Graves said he saw nothing in Hood's behavior that indicated that he contemplated self-destruction.

CASTLE FOR TOURISTS

To Be Converted Into Hotel and Resort.

Lisbon, July 4.—A group of British capitalists has submitted to the Portuguese government a proposal to transform the magnificent old Moorish castle, St. Jorge, and grounds into an hotel and pleasure resort. The castle is situated on a high hill in the centre of Lisbon, commanding a view of thirty miles around.

The hotel would have 800 rooms, a casino, theatre, concert rooms and extensive gardens. The total cost is estimated at \$1,250,000. The government appears to be favorably inclined toward the proposal, stipulating only that the British company shall be subject to Portuguese law. The proposal will be presented to parliament for sanction.

BIG TRADE DECREASE

Between Sheffield and Bradford and United States.

London, July 4.—A statement of the volume of trade between Sheffield and Bradford and the United States, just issued, shows a great decrease. Bradford's decrease in exports to the United States during the first six months of 1908 amounted to more than \$2,500,000. Sheffield's decrease in the last three months amounted to \$569,000 while in the value of steel imports, Sheffield fell from \$815,895 to \$33,145.

More Officials Than Patients.

London, July 4.—At yesterday's meeting of the Wandsworth Board of Guardians Mr. Lower, a guardian, stated that he had that morning visited one of the institutions of the Metropolitan asylums board and discovered, to his great surprise, that the number of officials was forty in excess of the number of patients.

Collision With A Whale.

Liverpool, July 4.—The Scotch drifter Arcturus, which reached Grimsby yesterday, reported having been in collision with a sleeping whale in the North Sea. The drifter was almost capsized, while the whale was killed, its body being washed up later near Main Head bay.

Goldfish At A Wedding.

London, July 4.—At a Blackburn wedding yesterday the church of the church was arranged as a rustic arbor and decorated with roses. Floral arches stood on either side, and two miniature fountains played over ponds containing live goldfish.

PRINCE DENIES PLOT.

He Was Not in Montenegrin Conspiracy.

Belgrade, July 4.—The Crown Prince George emphatically denied his alleged complicity in the recent plot to remove Prince Nicholas from the Montenegrin throne.

"Surely the heir to a royal crown would not harbor it for a little principality," he said recently to an officer who is one of his intimate friends. "Nor is there any reason why I should be jealous of my Montenegrin cousins. I am as good a rider as Prince Miklo, as good a shot as Prince Danilo, and a better shot than Prince Danilo. Moreover, would I gain by their deaths? They are not in my way."

The crown prince left Belgrade suddenly last night, on his yacht, and is believed to be en route to the Black Sea.

Sporting Baronet's Accidents.

Edinburgh, July 4.—Sir Claude de Crespiigny is arranging a balloon race between the Valkyrie and the Lotus, and, unattended by his many accidents, will probably travel in one of the balloons. He has had two leg bones broken while ballooning, three arm bones smashed while hunting, three ribs fractured while steeplechasing, one rib broken in a cab accident, one finger broken while riding, and two fingers fractured on a \$2,800 and \$1,600 a.m., fare \$2.35.

Municipal Swimming Contests.

London, July 4.—Battersea borough council has arranged to hold a series of swimming contests at the public baths in the borough for the children attending the local elementary schools. Three of them will be 100, 200 and 400 yards' tests, and the winners will be given certificates for proficiency in each case.

Made His Own Coffin.

London, July 4.—Mr. Rollings, of Palmerston-road, Bowes Park, an eccentric old gentleman, whose funeral took place on Sunday afternoon, made his own coffin and had it in his house for many years, and kept his tombstone in his back garden.

World's Gold Output.

London, July 4.—Gold worth \$410,000,000 was produced by the world's mines in 1906, nearly sixty-one per cent. of the output being supplied by the British empire. The total value of the world's output of minerals was about \$4,245,000,000.

80 Per Cent. Of Food Adulterated.

London, July 4.—In his annual report the medical officer of health for Wandsworth states that no fewer than eighty per cent. of the samples taken at private houses for analysis under the sale of food and drugs act were found to be adulterated.
