

In his recent expedition through the African possessions of France M. Millies-Lacroix, minister of the colonies, witnessed some unique sights, snapshots of which were taken by a member of the suite. This picture represents a m ceting of Adjiki-Toffa, the young king of Porto-Novo and his cabinet. The king, who succeeded his father in February last, is of an enlightened type of potentate and opposed to the cruelties in vogue in adjoining states. The cabinet meetings are held out of doors, the king, dressed in somewhat of the garb of a circus rider, being seated in an ordinary chair. On the walls of the palace are affixed large mats in which there are square holes to resemble windows. While in council all the members of the cabinet, except the two highest, prostrate themselves before


