## WAS A GREAT SIGHT

### 20,000 PERFORMERS IN MAGNIFICENT PAGEANT.

Diamond Jubilee of the Emperor Francis Joseph of Austria Celebrated in Succession of Superb Historical Scenes.



Vienna, June 15.—The Emperor Francis Joseph, who is on the verge of seventy-eight years of age, stood for three hours, to-day, on the royal stand in the famous Ringstrasse to witness the passage of the most imposing national pageant. For most of the time the sun was broiling hot, but the aged monarch seemed quite unconscious of the trying nature of his ordeal, and from beginning to end of the magnificent five-mile historic procession which passed before him was as intensely interested as any of the half-million persons whose privilege it was to be present.

The pageant, which was in celebration of the emperor's sixty years' reign, had taken four months to prepare, and had cost \$750,000. It was on such an immense scale that the whole inner city of Vienna appeared to have been transformed into a vast theatre, in which hundreds of thousands of spectators could watch the immense company of 20,000 performers, including 4,000 horsemen. Many spectators paid from \$200 to \$800 for seats facing the pavilion, which accompanied the royal court. Austrian aristocrats of the most famous families marched or rode in the procession in the robes of their ancestors, who had distinguished themselves and won their historic titles as statesmen and generals hundreds of years ago. In many cases, too, they wore the very armour and trappings of the time represented which had lain for centuries, undisturbed in their family castles.

First came a group representing the founder of the Hapsburg dynasty, King Rudolph, a remarkable study in the chivalry of his age. Most of the members of this group belonged to families which can trace their titles back to the time of Rudolph's reign at the end of the thirteenth century, and included Prince Auerberg, Prince Furstenberg, Prince Liechtenstein, Count Harrach, Count Kaunitz, and about forty other counts and barons whose families have the proud distinction of being as old as the dynasty, the Austrian equivalent of the English "coming over with the conqueror."

King Rudolph, represented by Count Eltz, carried his helmet in his hand and bowed to Francis Joseph as he passed, the monarch replying with a military salute to the greeting of his ancestor.

This group, like several of the others, afforded a remarkable study in medieval armor. The knights were all on horseback, and armed with lance and sword, and their helmets and shields were gay with the crests and emblems which are nowadays only embellishments on the carriage panels of their descendants.

## VERY IMPORTANT CASE.

### Proxy Cannot Be Registered By Winnipeg Free Press.

An exception to the provision in Dauphin, Judge Ryan made important rulings in Dauphin, as elsewhere, numbers of electors were registered by proxy, who, though in the polling division, declined to attend the registration booth. The liberals protested, and the registration was held illegal. It ruled that no person can be registered by proxy unless temporarily absent from the registration district or prevented by illness or similar disability from making personal application. The result was that the batch of applications filed by the conservatives on the ground that the voters "were detained by business" were refused. Fortunately this did not disfranchise the voters, as both sides had notified the parties to attend the court and with one exception they appeared and were placed on the list by personal application. In two similar cases at Meltonary, however, the men did not appear and their names were refused.

It is to be hoped that this ruling will settle for the whole province this very important batch of applications, but it is fully qualified but it is not necessarily registered, his name cannot stay on the list if protested. This is doubtless sound law, and it is good public policy. The free and easy course, followed by one of the judges, or not considering charges of illegal registration provided there is no question of the qualifications of the electors interested is an encouragement to registration clerks to break the law in the interests of their party. The procedure governing personal registration should be clearly defined, and the regulation should be strictly enforced against all parties.

"His honor made another important ruling," says the Dauphin Press, "to the effect that the revising judge is bound to place on the list all applications received by registration, no matter how illegal or improper, unless objection is filed with the judge in accordance with the provisions of the statute. This ruling confirms the liberal contention that the Roblin act gives to their registration clerks the right to accept or refuse applications, and makes an official so willing to place the political opponents of the government at a tremendous handicap. In many constituencies in the province these officials used this power unscrupulously to the advantage of the government, and wherever the liberals got a majority deal it was due to the fairness of the clerk, not to the protection of the law. It demonstrates conclusively that where the officials are invested with such wide powers they should be appointed by the judges and not by the denigrating political organizations as under the present act."

Mr. Borden and other leading conservatives in the House of Commons, have been declaring during the last two months, that the fair way to make lists is to give complete powers to the judges, and to have the clerk, not the public in general, the journal calls upon the Japanese people to give their opinion, and says that in contradiction to the universal respect and good-will entertained toward Japan during the war the nation has now lost the sympathy of the world through over-anxiety to enlarge the empire and beyond the financial capacity of the nation.

Commenting on the article, the *Japan Times*, published by Japanese in English, says: "Calm reflection shows the way in which the late war resulted has been misapprehended by the public in general. The journal calls upon the Japanese people not to display 'Swoll n heads.'"

## ARE NOT LOVED ABROAD.

### Pointed Reasoning With Our Neighbors Southward.

J.S.C. writes to the Paris-American, a journal for United States in Europe, so frankly in sympathy with Canadian feeling and judgment, and so suggestive to his countrymen, that the letter is of uncommon interest to Whig readers:

"I have returned from a year's trip around the world, the last six months spent in various European countries. I can emphatically, though regretfully, indorse the statement that we have no friends among the nations of Europe, with the exception of Great Britain. I found this to be the case also in the other places visited on my journey, most of them in Europe. As a patriotic American I expected to find on this, my first journey abroad, that being an American citizen would ensure prestige, and I had ready to display, whenever opportunity presented, a little of the Old Glory, I folded away in my pocket. I started, it must be confessed, in a somewhat moulting condition. In Constantinople, a Turk whom I met on the bridge exclaimed: 'Ah, if you had a military power like us to contend with, instead of Spain!'"

"On the Kingstrasse, Vienna, an Austrian officer remarked: 'You are like the boy of twenty; you think you are so much, that you know so much, but—!'"

In Berlin I made friendship with a German whose name is honorably known throughout the world. I asked him to tell me frankly why Americans were not popular in Europe and elsewhere. After some polite hesitation he said: "You go about waving the flag of your country in other lands, forgetting that the natives are just as proud of their own flag. Your doing so does not inspire respect for your country or its flag—it has a contrary effect. You boast so much; you speak of the naval battle of Santiago, where you did not lose a man, as if it were a second Trafalgar. You teach your children that you won the war of 1812, in which you were badly beaten. In the hotels your people talk loudly and dress quaintly. You are so anxious for other people to know that you are Americans as if it would exalt you in their eyes, whereas it does not."

In England, the most finished and the most delightful country visited, I found a warm friendship for us. They thought we "bluffed a bit," but that was all in the game. When I think that the flag of this little island was the flag in my journey around the world, that it was the home of my forefathers, that it is guaranteeing the safety of our eastern coast against all European invasion, that it is carrying the coal for our great fleet on its record-breaking voyage, when those who understand must know that it is England which has hushed the hostile Japanese war cry, will touch between Manila and New York will fly the Union Jack or be under British rule—then, I say, let us cease this constant twisting of the lion's tail of which we are so fond, let us look to our own good, to our best friend, and act accordingly.
