

A POLICE RAID

Mrs. Nuttall Attempted Suicide.

TOOK CARBOLIC ACID

BUT HER ATTEMPT WAS A FAILURE.

Five Inmates of the House Were Arrested--All Were Carousing--The Trouble Arose From Jealousy on the Part of Mrs. Nuttall.

In a fit of despondency, about 7.30 o'clock, on Tuesday evening, Mrs. Katherine Nuttall, living at 68 Cherry street, attempted suicide, by taking a dose of carbolic acid.

As an outcome of the affair, Mrs. Nuttall is faced with a double charge, that of attempting suicide, and with keeping a disorderly house.

Five others are also under arrest, as follows: Fannie Campbell, charged with being an inmate of a disorderly house, and Richard Cunningham, Francis Daryean, Ray Smith and John Shanahan are held on a charge of being frequenters of the house.

The police were notified about the affair about 7.40 o'clock. One of Mrs. Nuttall's neighbors telephoned to the police station, stating that a call had been sent from the Nuttall home for a doctor, the information being that a child was ill. It was believed that there was a row in the house, and that the police should investigate.

Sergeant Nesbitt and Constable Craig immediately secured a cab, and drove to the Nuttall home. Upon their arrival, Mrs. Nuttall was the only one found in the house. She was lying on a bed, suffering from the effects of a dose of carbolic acid.

The constables then commenced a search for the others who had been in the house. They went through all the rooms, but could locate no one. Before locking up the house, they paid a visit to the cellar, and there they found Shanahan secreted behind some boxes and barrels.

Later on in the evening, Cunningham, Daryean, Smith, Shanahan, and Nuttall were taken to the police station. Cunningham was charged with being an inmate of a disorderly house, and the others with being frequenters of the house.

Well Advanced in British Commons.

THE GOULD WEDDING

LAMBETH CONFERENCE IN SESSION.

There Are 247 Prelates Gathered in London--Great Reduction in the Number of Six-Penny Postal Orders Used in Britain.

London, July 8.--The House of Commons, yesterday, concluded the committee stage of the old age pension bill, which has been modified by the adoption of the sliding scale, the pensions varying with the amount of the recipients' personal income.

The second reading of the bill, eight-hour day bill was passed. This measure provides for an average daily employment of eight hours, with both windings included, in all the mines of the United Kingdom for five years.

MGR. FARRELLY DEAD. Monsignor Farrelly, Belleville, vicar-general of the Roman Catholic diocese of Kingston, died Wednesday morning, after a long illness. He was born in the city of Cavan, Cavan county, Ireland, in 1827 when he was partially educated. He left the Emerald Isle on the 17th of May, then in his nineteenth year, and located in Kingston, where he entered Regiopolis college, and was admirably fitted for his position. He was ordained to the priesthood in the year 1851 by the late Bishop Phelan, and served in that capacity in the Kingston cathedral for about two years. He then went to Hastings county, where he was stationed about four years, thence he went to Lindsay and remained there for nearly eleven years, after which he returned to Kingston again, stopping about three years. He next went to Belleville in 1871, where he has been since. In 1880 he was appointed domestic prelate to his holiness, an honor which bestowed on him the title of Monsignor. He was also elected administrator of the diocese of Kingston for several successive years and for one year held the apostolic administration, which appointment was tendered by the Holy See.

Longer Term To Serve. Ottawa Free Press. George Bouchard, a ticket-of-leave man, who figured in the police court recently on a charge of forgery, and was sent down for four years, left the cell this morning, in charge of Sheriff Richardson, for Kingston penitentiary. With his unexpired term added, Bouchard's incarceration will be lengthened to about five and a half years.

AT PISTOL POINT

Naples, July 8.--Passengers on the New Austrian line steamer Columbia which arrived here to-day from New York, state that Gibraltar a section of the firemen mutinied. Captain Bartelich was driven away by threats of death, but only half a dozen mutineers were reported by a few accomplices to have overcome the insubordinate firemen.

OLD AGE PENSIONS.

A Measure of Great Value to the Thrifty.

Ottawa, July 8.--The old age pension measure passed by the House of Commons means a great deal to the thrifty Canadian who wishes to make a provision for old age. The act provides machinery by which the savings of the people may be directed to the purchase of annuities. The funds to be accumulated will be held and guaranteed by the Dominion government, which will add interest at the rate of three per cent.

The idea is Sir Richard Cartwright's. He does not think the time has come in Canada for old-age pensions taken out of the public treasury. He believes that the mass of the Canadian people are still able to provide for old age if assured of the safety of their savings and the reduction under state control of the cost of management to the lowest possible figure.

The chief provisions of the bill follow: No annuity shall be larger than \$600 to one person, and not more than \$800 to husband and wife jointly. The minimum age at which an annuity may begin is fifty-five years. A man may arrange to have his annuity begin at a later age, if he wishes to, but no man shall receive an annuity until he has reached the age of fifty-five years. This is subject to a proviso that if disability falls upon a man and he needs the annuity at an earlier age he can receive it, but the amount will in that case be smaller than what he will receive if he carries the transactions to the full fifty-five years. The annuities will not be transferable and will not be subject to seizure. In case of death before the age at which the annuity is payable, all the moneys paid in will be returned to the representatives of the annuitant, with interest at three per cent, compounded yearly. The annuitant may make periodical payments at stated times, or he may make independent payments to suit his own convenience. Assuming that the contributor begins at the age of twenty, and continues payment until the age of fifty-five, he can take his annuity at once, or if he chooses he can allow the money to stay a little longer and he will receive a larger annuity. There is a provision for independent payments by which a contributor may make a payment of \$10 or more at any time, by payment at the age of fifty-five immediate annuities may be purchased. The postoffice bank depositors may transfer their money to purchase annuities. Friendly societies and religious organizations can purchase annuities for their members, and employers of labor can make such arrangements as may be necessary with their workmen in order that the latter may benefit under the provisions of the act. The two great advantages of the scheme are the security provided by government and the cheapness of administration.

BY OLD MILITARY ROUTES. American Engineers to Follow Path of Continental Army. New York, July 8.--A large party of American civil and mechanical engineers, who are interested in historical subjects, are going to the tercentenary of the routes of the Washington-Benedict Arnold and Col. Aaron Burr through Maine and Canada to Quebec. The party from New York will be led by Emmons Clark, M.E., whose great-grandfather was Major-General Montgomery's engineer. The party going through Maine will be led by George Wilfrid Pearce, a great-grandson of Washington's engineer-officer, John Pearce. Messrs. Clark and Pearce purpose to illustrate and describe the journey in a booklet, with which will be bound a reprint of the long-out-of-print memoirs of the Canadian expedition of 1775, by Mr. Clark's great-grandfather, who fell wounded in the forlorn hope, at the head of which Gen. Montgomery was killed at Quebec.

GIFT TO A DOCTOR. Who Will Make Research Upon Nutrition. Berlin, July 8.--The Philippine administration has placed \$2,000 at the disposal of Hans Aron, a young Berlin doctor, who has been appointed professor of physiology in the Philippine medical school, for the purchase of laboratory apparatus to make to Manila. Dr. Aron intends to devote himself to special research upon nutrition in the tropics, with a view to utilizing the results for the benefit of the German colonies in Africa.

MURDER IN MID-DAY

IN A HOUSE IN MONTREAL CHINATOWN.

Battle Between Two Men Results in the Death of One--The Murdered Man Has Not Been Identified.

Montreal, July 8.--A man so far unknown to the police, was shot, yesterday afternoon, at one o'clock, at No. 111 LaGauchetiere street west. The victim appears to be about thirty years of age, and the only thing found on his person was a little package of opium.

The information of the shooting was conveyed to No. 5 police station by Tong Kee, proprietor of the place, who informed the officer in charge that a man had been doing some shooting at his place.

Sergeant Gorman and Constables Shaughnessy and Ravanel, when they entered the place, found in the rear room, on the first floor, the dead body of a man, lying on a low wooden bench or cot. The whole appearance of the place indicated that it was an opium lair, as there was no furniture but tables and low benches or cots. The victim had been shot under the right arm and the bullet had evidently penetrated to the heart.

The Chinaman declared that he knew both men by sight, and that the men were acquaintances. The man who died after the shooting, he said, came in shortly after noon and went upstairs. There was the noise of a quarrel, and then two shots rang out. Tong Kee declares that he ran upstairs, but the man who died, he says, was shot down in a hurry. His left arm and wrist were swathed in bandages, as if he had been wounded recently. He left the house in a hurry, and Kee did not see in what direction he went.

Arthur Hooper declared to Constable Tierney that Monday night, about eleven o'clock, he had heard a quarrel in the room where the murder occurred. Hooper lives at 113 LaGauchetiere street, and his room is separated from the scene of the murder by a thin wall.

Two men were apparently quarrelling, and one said to the other: "For God's sake, Jack, don't hit me again, I am bleeding to death." "Bleed away, I don't care," replied the other man with an oath.

"If you hit me again I will come back to-morrow and shoot you," declared the other man.

Finally, both men went down to the street and Hooper watched the first man come out. He was bleeding profusely from the left hand and wrist, and as he came out was trying to wrap the arm in a handkerchief or some other white cloth. The quarrel was continued on the sidewalk, and the injured man once more implored the other not to hurt him any more, and to let him alone while he bled.

He evidently returned, yesterday, and made good his threat, but beyond the fact that both men spoke English, and that one called the other "Jack," Hooper knows nothing of their identity.

Detectives Leclair and Pigeon are at work on the case and have, it is said, a clue to the identity of the murderer.
