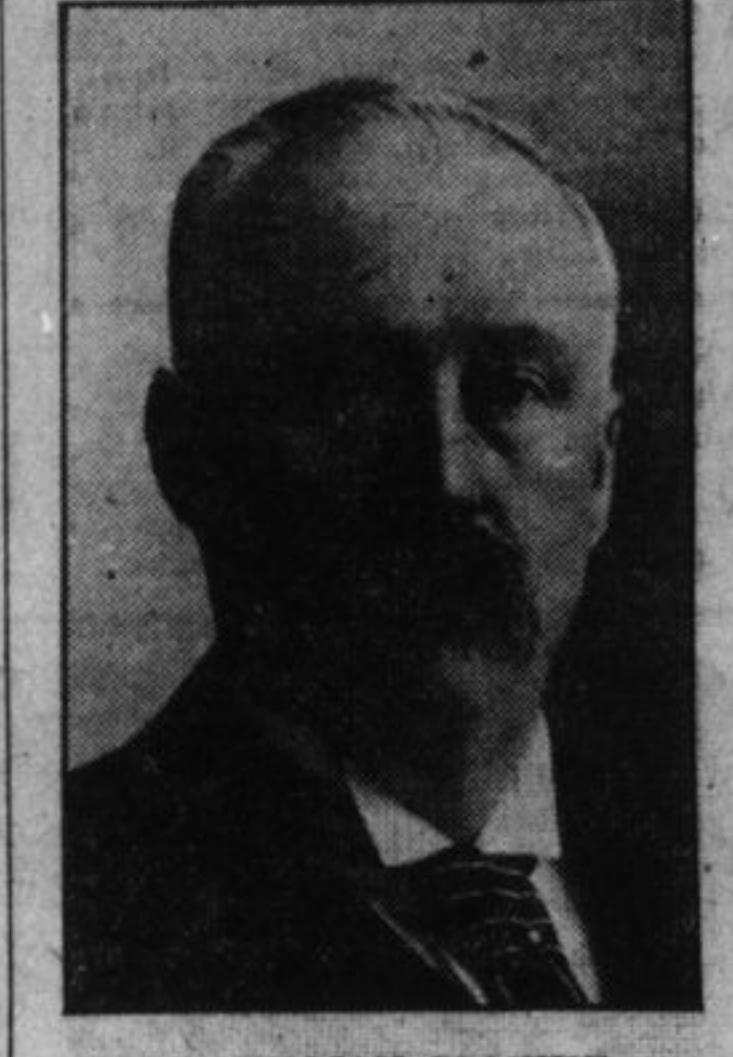

IT IS NOT A COURT

DR. SPANKIE SAYS PRESS IS MISTAKEN.

Ontario Medical Council Has No Jurisdiction in Certain Matters—Adjustment of Electoral Divisions.

Toronto, July 8.—During the year this medical council has been assailed by a portion of the public press on account of a mistaken idea of the powers of the council and its disciplinary committee. The subject matter of the outcry seemed sad and serious enough, but it should be known that this council is not a criminal court and has not even the power of initiation on such matters, said Dr. William Spankie, of Kingston, retiring president of the Ontario Medical Council in his address at the annual meeting of that body yesterday. The whole subject had been left to the council to take such action as might be deemed expedient. A measure for the redistribution of constituencies is suggested for the consideration of the council, which will not, however, likely be accused of perpetrating a gerrymander. In recommending the readjustment of electoral divisions, Dr. Spankie said that it was fourteen years since the present boundaries of the various ridings were established and great inequalities existed, not only in New Ontario, but in the older portions of the province as well. The council was also asked to express its opinion on the establishment of a system of inter-provincial registration.

For the first time the members of the council gathered for their annual meeting in the new building at 170 University avenue, secured for the accommodation of themselves and the executive of the College of Physicians and Surgeons. This fact was commented upon by Dr. W. Spankie, in his address. The new register, Dr. Spankie announced, contained 3,807 members, or 406 more than under the preceding registration. The president welcomed two new convenors, Dr. C. W. Hoare, of Walkerville, and Dr. Griffin, of Hamilton.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

There Was Quite a Brisk Storm on the Lake.

The heavy storm on the lake last evening caused considerable trouble to the big boats coming down the lake. The wind was from the west and blew very strong all day and by night had the waves rolling very high. At one dark the wind increased considerably, and the waves caused much damage during the night. The steamer Kingston left Charlotte at eleven o'clock, and had a very rough passage over. The large steamer was badly tossed around and some damage was done by the waves. A great many windows were smashed and one or two fenders broken by the storm. The steamer was nearly an hour late arriving here. The steamer Caspian did not venture out at all on account of the storm.

A PROFESSOR DEAD

LATE N. R. CARMICHAEL OF QUEEN'S.

He Passed Away at His Father's Residence at King, Ont.—He Was One of Queen's Brilliant Graduates.

Word was received here of the death, Wednesday morning, of Prof. Norman R. Carmichael, associate professor of physics, in Queen's University, at his father's home, at King, Ont. Prof. Carmichael had been in ill-health for a trip to Bermuda, and for a time he had improved. On his return he resumed his university duties, but again he was taken ill. Some time ago, he was taken to the home of his father, Rev. James Carmichael, of King, Ont., and there he passed away, on Wednesday morning.

Prof. Carmichael was one of Queen's distinguished graduates. He entered Queen's in 1886, winning the Mowat matriculation scholarship in mathematics, and he graduated master of arts in Latin, Greek and physics, taking the Prince of Wales medal in classics, thus showing his versatility. After graduation he was appointed to the science research scholarship of the commissioners of the exhibition of 1881, and spent the two years at Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, where he worked on the then newly discovered X-rays. On his return he was appointed assistant in mathematics, and later associate professor in physics. Of late years he specialized chiefly in optics, giving special attention to the development of color photography and three-color half-tone printing.

Throughout his whole career he maintained the closest touch with the undergraduate body, and in recognition of his services in connection with the constitutional development of the Alma Mater and allied societies, he was given the unusual honor of being elected a permanent honorary member of the society.

Prof. Carmichael was a member and a trustee of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church of this city. His father is one of the oldest Presbyterian ministers in Canada. The deceased's only brother, Dr. R. F. Carmichael, B.A., was drowned in Kingston harbor, eight years ago. Prof. Carmichael is survived by his wife and little daughter. The funeral will take place at King on Friday afternoon, at one o'clock.
