The Brockville merchants are keeping Wednesday afternoons as a citizens' holiday during the summer and to-day made a trip on the Missisquoi to Gananoque, arriving here about five p.m. and leaving about seven p.m. There was a large crowd on board.

The Citizens' band went down to fill an engagement this evening at the Thousand Island Yacht Club's club house, near Alexandria Bay.

The Maple Grove and Eden Grove Sabbath school held a largely attended picnic at Sun Grove yesterday afternoon. The coal schooner Briton cleared for Oswego last evening.

Police Magistrate Carroll had a general roundup in the police court on Monday and George Kelsey, for being drunk, was fined \$10. Greenberg, for the same offence, got a fine, and was placed on the "Indian list"; J. McDonald and G. Harris were fined. Yesterday A. Pelow, for furnishing liquor to a man on the Indian list, got six months in Brockville jail, and "Jaff" Shiels, on an old criminal, was taken down with him by Constable Thomson, to spend a like term.

New Grand Trunk Equipment. The Grand Trunk railway system is now putting into service thirteen new coaches of twenty-five that have been ordered for assignment to trains on international runs, viz., between Chicago and New York via Niagara Falls, Chicago and Montreal, Montreal and Portland, and Toronto and Buffalo. The cars are known as first-class day coaches, and are of the standard pattern which the Grand Trunk operate on all their through trains. Length of cars over all 73 feet 6 inches, weight of each car 108,620 pounds. They are mounted on six-wheel trucks, are wide vestibule with steel platforms, and are equipped with high-speed, quick-action air brakes. The inside of the cars are beautifully finished in polished mahogany, and are constructed with the Empire style of roof. Seats are Grand Trunk standard with high backs; the car, seating sixty people, is upholstered in green plush, while the smoking room is large and roomy and upholstered in leather. All modern conveniences have been installed for the comfort of passengers. The body of the car is carpeted, and the passage ways and smoking-room covered with linoleum.

A Costly Frank. Judgment has just been given against the village of Morrisburg for \$800 in an action brought by a citizen for injuries sustained by a Hallowell's prank played by some boys. The latter had hung a gate upon a telephone pole and it was allowed to remain there until it fell a couple of weeks later. In falling it struck and injured Mr. Archambault who then instituted an action for damages against the municipality.

## BRITISH NAVY SQUABBLE.

### Whole Press Demands That Scandal Be Stopped.

London, July 8.—It has become clear that the government cannot much longer refrain from action to end the serious friction existing between the chiefs of the navy, of which the squabble between Admiral Lord Charles Beresford and Rear Admiral Sir Percy Scott is merely an incident. The disagreement between the admiral of the fleet, Sir John Fisher, as first sea lord, and Admiral Beresford, as admiral of the channel fleet, and presumably admirabilissimo in the event of war, has become so notorious as to excite general public concern. Hitherto the discussion in the press has been mainly confined to the party advocates and policies represented respectively by Admirals Fisher and Beresford, the former being championed by the liberals and the latter by the conservatives. Now, in consequence of an outspoken letter by Arthur Hamilton Lee, formerly civil lord of the admiralty, the whole press has taken up the matter, and is demanding that the scandal be stopped, agreeing with Mr. Lee that it is not only sapring the foundations of discipline and good feeling in the navy, but is seriously menacing the national security. The fact that Admiral Beresford is not on speaking terms with Admiral Fisher, who is his official superior, and Sir Percy Scott, who is Admiral Beresford's cruiser squadron commander, is sufficient indication of the gravity of the position. Some of the papers, while cordially paying a tribute to Lord Beresford's past services, urge that a reconciliation is impossible. Lord Beresford ought to resign. The Chronicle, a ministerial organ, says it fears that a startling development is impending, involving government action, with the support of Ex-Prime Minister Balfour and other opposition leaders.

The Times gives prominence to a story to the effect that during the manoeuvres of the channel fleet, Admiral Beresford signalled ordering the cruisers Argyll and Good Hope to manoeuvre in such a manner as, if the order were carried out, would have resulted in a collision identical with that which occurred some years ago between the Victoria and Camperdown. Rear Admiral Scott, foreseeing this result, disobeyed the order. The denouement is not stated.

## Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS. ANY even-numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less. Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made by an Agency on certain conditions, viz., father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader. An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry.

DUTIES.—(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years. (2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement. (3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader had permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton. QUARTZ.—A person who has attained age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee \$5.00. At least 100 feet can be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

## PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally.

100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00. DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10.00 a mile per annum. Royalty 2 1/2 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.

## The Chambers-Ferland
