### A STRIKE AT PARIS.

River Boat Employees Want Shorter Hours.

Paris, July 13.—Many rumors of strikes to begin on the national holiday, July 14th, the anniversary of the fall of the Bastille, have been current for the past two weeks, but one strike, which started to-day, came as a complete surprise. Not a single employee of the river passenger boats appeared for duty yesterday morning and thousands of Parisians who generally spend Sunday at Suresse, St. Cloud and Charente, were compelled to find other means of getting there. The steambot lost some \$6,000 in receipts. The employees are demanding a twelve-hour day instead of fifteen.

### INDIAN MOCCASIN PICTURE.

Symbolism in Decorative Schemes of Many Indian Tribes.

There is a symbolism in the decorative schemes shown by many different Indian tribes. We may say that each and every Indian moccasin of pure type is a picture, or is both a picture and a photograph, at any time something, although it is not a photograph.

The meaning must perforce depend largely upon the surroundings of the maker. A thousand reasons might influence this or that pattern. Sometimes a very old—and wise woman who made moccasins, might have a dream, and she would put her "dream" into the moccasin. Perhaps a well-contented and single-minded man would put in merely a reflex of the life about her, the objects with which she was in continual contact. There would present the continual tribute of superstition to the great forces, the unseen unknown heretofore, the air, the sun, the wind, the trees, the earth; the immediate ignorance, the common necessity, the passing event of present importance—all these abstract or concrete things might come into the mind of the worker with pigments, quills and beads. These, the moccasin-maker put down as best she might. She could not write it out, for her product was no letter and no photograph. So in time she came to use the condensed thought of symbolism, just as we do in our astronomy or astrology or mathematics. She struggled toward the shorthand of thought universal.

### Modern Science.

New York Tribune.  
An improved apparatus has been made by Dr. Fritz Lang, of Munich, by which the inside of the stomach can be clearly photographed. The camera is actually swallowed by the patient, and when it reaches his stomach the walls thereof can be illuminated by a small electric lamp attached to the camera in round a bottom of the apparatus. At the bottom of the camera is round a photographic film twenty inches long and a quarter of an inch wide. All the surgeon has to do is to pull a cord and thus run the film past the light. The electric light is then turned on, and after the image of the stomach is impressed with the image the current is turned off and another section of the film is brought into play, until the requisite number of pictures have been obtained.
