SCOTTISH NATIONAL EXHIBITION AND SOME CHARACTERS IN ITS HISTORICAL PAGEANT.



Edinburgh, July 14.—The Scottish national exhibition at Edinburgh was this week the scene of a carefully prepared and well-produced procession: pageant held in aid of the Scottish Children's League of Pity. It took place on Saturday last, two performances being given. There were in all about 1,000 performers, and some hundreds of children assisted in the masque.

The pageant consisted of three sections: Section I—An Allegory of the City of Edinburgh; section II—Mythical, Legendary and Historical; section III—A Masque of the Seasons. As regards section II, the endeavor of the committee was to give a full representation of the history of Scotland from prehistoric times down to shortly after the "45."

The allegorical group consisted of the city of Edinburgh. Divinity, law, learning and medicine were represented as following the city to guide and comfort her agriculture, manufactures, commerce, architecture, sculpture, painting and science, with the arts and crafts, to embellish her, and representatives of the chief burghs of Scotland, bearing each their burgh banner or coat of arms to support her.

The stately procession depicting the history of the Scottish nation from prehistoric times down to the "45" gave a wonderful picture of the nation's growth. It started in the "dim age" of the Celtic gods, such figures as Angla Og, the god of Youth, and Lir (or Oceanus) appearing with Anla and Lugh, of the Long Hand, who were followed by the Sidhe, or Spirits of Life, a period which introduced the fairy knights who carried the gifts of the Immortals to the Celtic race, the Stone of Destiny, the Glaive of Light, and the Goblet of Abundance.

In their train came Findabair, of the Fair Eyebrows, Bran, the Voyager, and Oige, the fairy who gave the love spot to Diarmuid. Then came the Fomorians and Demons, including Balor of the Evil Eye, the Washer of the Shroud, and the witches of Skye. In the epoch of the Martials comes Scotia, the queen from whom the Scots derive their name. The Cuchulain cycle was headed by Scathach, warrior woman of Skye, who instructed Cuchulain in the arts of war. Emer, the Lovely, the wife of Cuchulain, was attended by her women and following her came the sons of Usnach and many others.
