THE NEWS OF WORLD OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody. -Notes From All Over-Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

Cheese at Stirling and Madoc, on Tuesday, sold at 11 9-16.

The Union of Canada Municipalities opened their annual convention in Montreal, to-day.

The National Deposit Bank of Philadelphia, was closed, by direction of the comptroller of the currency, and Milton C. Elliott appointed receiver.

The thatham city council gave the Salvation Army band a grant to furnish summer concerts in Levesque Park, during the next three months.

Trainer Sherring of the Canadian Olympic team, has an article in the London Mail, in which he picks Leon Longiano to win the Marathon on the 24th.

Benjamin Burchall, in Toronto, police court, said he could not support his three children, because he is a striking power, and has been out of work for a long time.

Five warships of the international fleet of twenty that will anchor in the stream of Quebec during the coming ter-centenary celebration, have arrived. They are all British.

Premier Whitney will occupy the speaker's chair, at the Quebec parliament buildings, as the guest of Premier Gouin during the ter-centenary celebration.

Canon Baldwin, rector of All Saints' church, Toronto, died Wednesday morning after an hour's illness from heart failure. He was aged sixty-eight years.

The cruiser Venus has remained at Cap Caie to render assistance to the steamer Portsmouth, ashore at that place. The Portsmouth is laden with coal for the fleet.

A gasoline tank attached to a large touring car belonging to W. H. Gates, Toronto, exploded in Detroit, setting fire to the car. The blaze damaged the car about \$300.

Vice-Admiral the Hon. Sir Ashton C. Adzard Horne, K.C.B., C.V.O., commander-in-chief of the British squadron landed at Quebec this morning to present homage to Canadians.

The twenty-fourth annual session of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada will convene in the legislative council chamber, Halifax, Nova Scotia, on September 21st.

A Pittsburg syndicate has purchased Fighting Island from the owners, the Pease estate, of Detroit, for \$125,000. Fighting Island is in Canadian waters in the Detroit river, eight miles below the city.

At Cleveland, Ohio, Mrs. K. R. Otis, driving a sixty horse-power automobile, beat the Cleveland, Buffalo port held by a man. Her time for the distance of 200 miles was six hours and ten minutes.

Sir Charles Rivers Wilson, president of the Grand Trunk railway, will arrive at Quebec on July 24th, with Lady Rivers Wilson, and will remain at the ancient capital for the greater part of the festivities.

Capt. James Reid, Sarnia, Ont., has been engaged to go to the Atlantic coast, where he will attempt to recover two ships which have been wrecked and abandoned by their owners to the underwriters.

A thoroughly modern Y.M.C.A. building is planned for Townshend Park, Chatham, Ont., if the plans of a number of hustling society church women do not go astray. Mrs. Robert Gray, wife of the carriage manufacturer, is at the head of the project.

Most of New Brunswick is as dry as tinder and rain is greatly needed. Forest fires are burning in several places and within five miles of St. John, N.B., there is a big fire which started near Spruce Lake last week, and has covered seven miles of territory.

Julia Lalonde, the young woman who acts as the representative in Montreal, for D. H. Tolman, the notorious Philadelphia loan shark, yesterday, found guilty of violation of the usury law, and while sentence was deferred for a few days the judge intimated that she saw no other alternative than to send her to jail.
