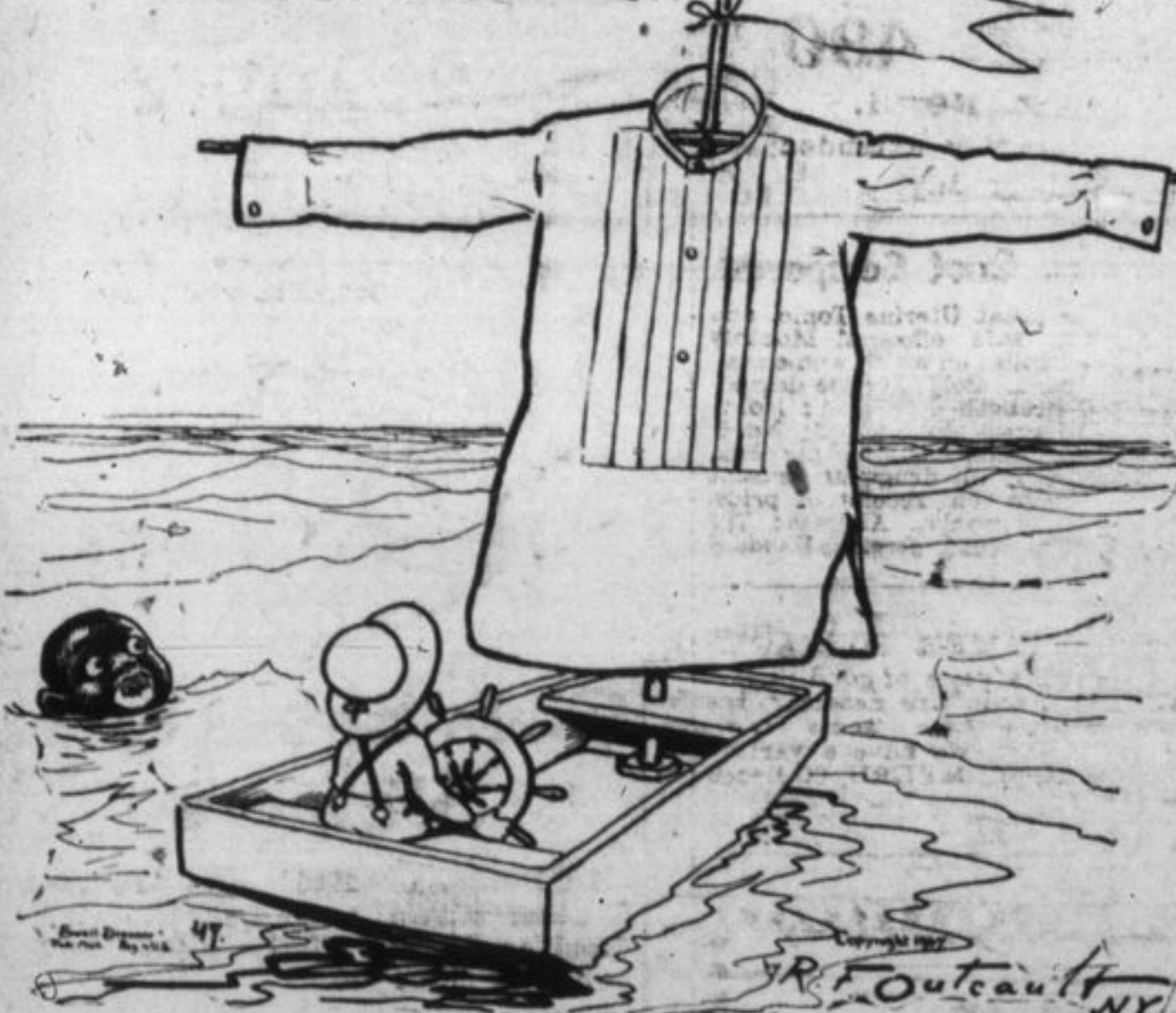

STILL ON THE HUNT

SEARCH FOR WOMAN IN WILSON MURDER.

Philadelphia Police Admit They Are Baffled, But Refuse to Give Up.

Philadelphia, July 16.—Following the inquest at which the widow testified and which failed to throw any light on the identity of the person who sent a bottle of poisoned ale to Dr. William H. Wilson, the police are searching clues through a careful examination of fifteen hundred letters found in the physician's home, No. 819 North Seventh street. One difficulty in the way is that most of the letters are signed in a secret ciphered code and the police say that it is difficult in identifying the writers.

Detectives have learned that Dr. Wilson lived in constant fear of his life. On one occasion he was badly frightened when some Italian walked past his house and peered in through the window. The police say that the Italians had no designs on Wilson's life, but that for the last years of his life he was constantly haunted with fears of violence.

According to the police, Dr. Wilson dined to be discovered by the husband of the woman, but he was not in all parts of the country with whom he had corresponded about treatment.

The police consider important the discovery that the "S" seal on the neck of the ale bottle was not made with the letter "S" purchased especially by the murderer. The "S" on the sealing was on both sides of the bottle, and is much smaller and of an entirely different design from the initial bought from the Keystone Type Foundry and used by the murderer in his decoy letter to Dr. Wilson. When this was established plaster casts were at once made of the "S" seal on the ale bottle, and an attempt will be made through all diemakers to learn from whom the seal was purchased.

Every man on the police force will from now on be used to assist in solving the mystery of Dr. Wilson's murder or murderer, as it is believed a man and a woman conspired together to kill the malpractitioner. In line with this theory, the coroner's jury rendered a verdict that Dr. Wilson came to his death through cyanide of potassium at the hands of a person or persons unknown.

The police are not sanguine that they will be able to find the person who sent the poisoned beverage through their own efforts, but hope to be able to draw the person wanted from under cover by some mysterious move that they will not divulge.

OXYGEN SAVED A WOMAN.

A New Cure For Peritonitis Has Been Discovered.

New York, July 16.—Remarkable results attained in treating peritonitis with pure oxygen at Beth Israel hospital, have raised hopes that a way has been found at last to combat this dread disease, the same that carried off President McKinley, and which places the stamp of death upon ninety-five per cent of its victims.

A striking illustration of the efficiency of the oxygen was given yesterday when Mrs. Anna Abias, a sufferer from peritonitis, whose case upon her admission was at first given up as hopeless.

Mrs. Abias was the first to receive the oxygen treatment. On the day when she was taken to the hospital, two and a half weeks ago, Dr. William Seaman Bainbridge, the noted scientist, had been discussing with Prof. Henry Mansfield Silver, the hospital's chief surgeon, a theory that oxygen, if tried, would prove a cure for peritonitis.

It was but an hour afterwards that Dr. Silver received the summons to make a heroic effort to save the woman's life. When he reached her side he found she was suffering with general peritonitis and that her temperature was 103 degrees.

Seeing that the old method of draining off the bacterial substance in the region of the peritoneum would be without avail in her case he resolved to follow the suggestion given by Dr. Bainbridge.

After the usual treatment had been given the wound was so sutured that it left room for a small tube. This tube was connected with a tank of oxygen, which was run through water to thoroughly purify it, and after the flow had continued for three minutes the tube was withdrawn.

Mrs. Abias received such remarkable improvement from the very start that other peritonitis sufferers were similarly treated. There are now in the hospital four other persons who were given the cure. All have shown improvement equaling that of Mrs. Abias, and it is expected that when they, too, have been in the hospital for two weeks and a half they will be able to go home as well as they ever were.

TO TOUR ONTARIO.

Start on Round of Province on August 20th.

Ottawa, July 16.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier will make a tour of Ontario before he goes west. That is the announcement given out in liberal circles. The premier, who it was announced, would spend a few weeks at Arthabaskville after the Quebec fetes, will, it now turns out, return at once to Ottawa, wind up a number of outstanding matters, including the appointments to the railway committee, and the reorganization of the cabinet, and will start out on a tour of Ontario about August 20th. Then he will probably go west, and should return, to Ottawa about the end of September, when the decision will be reached as to whether it is to be an election or another session.

PARLIAMENT TO HAVE SAY.

Graham Promises No Charter Will Be Granted.

Ottawa, July 16.—According to a statement made in the house by Hon. G. P. Graham, there is no immediate likelihood of the government granting a charter to the St. Lawrence Power company to dam the St. Lawrence river, near Cornwall. Mr. Graham, while admitting there were two sides to the question, definitely assured the house that the government had no idea of taking any step to commit the country to the scheme until parliament had full opportunity of discussing it, and expressing approval or disapproval of it.

An "All-Day" Strike.

It is told of Holman Day, the author of King Spruce, that he was once the cause of a high school rebellion in Maine. Major Day has written a good deal of ballad verse, verse with a tempting lilt, a swing that beats like a march or a song, and the high school boys and girls, especially the boys, began to find it convenient to memorize them for their recitations. This went on to the conspicuous exclusion of Langfellow and Lowell and others who had more or less claim to public hearing, until finally the edict went forth: "No more selections from Holman Day." Thereupon all the boys of the school, to the number of twenty, struck, and the matter had to be adjusted by arbitration. King Spruce uses as chapter prelude some lines from these spiteful selections.
