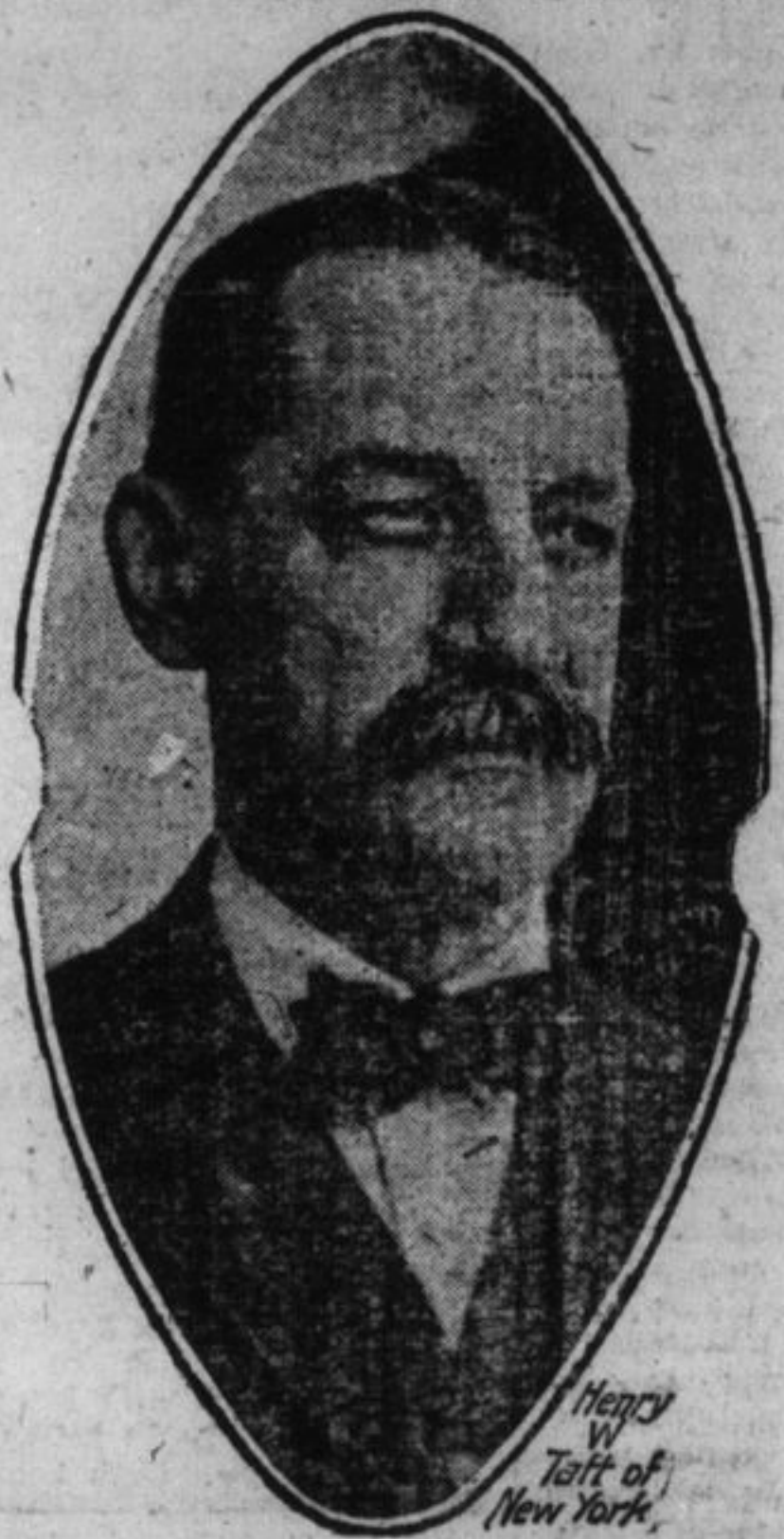

FIVE DAYS WITHOUT FOOD.

Starving Italian Picked Up in a Small Boat.

Montreal, July 15.—A remarkable story has been brought to Montreal by the grain boat Alfred G. Marshall which has just arrived in port.

While the Marshall was crossing Lake Ontario, a small boat was sighted. On drawing closer it was found to be occupied by a man in the last stages of exhaustion. He was taken on board the steamer, and nursed back to life, and on the arrival of the steamer at Odessa Bay, he was handed over to the immigration authorities.

Here the trouble, however, was that the authorities would not take charge of the man unless they knew where he had come from. No information could be got from the man except that he was an Italian. He appeared to have been adrift for about five days without food and there the information ended as the poor fellow could not answer any questions, as he appeared to be insane.

The captain of the Alfred G. Marshall had therefore no course but to take the unfortunate man over to Prescott, where the same trouble was experienced.

At last the authorities decided to send the unhappy Italian to Montreal, and yesterday an interpreter tried to get him to answer some questions, but all in vain, as the man is clearly out of his mind. At present he is in custody in Montreal.

DETROIT'S GREAT WORK IN THE AMERICAN.

Toronto Baseball Team Will Give Fred Hickey a Trial—Toronto Fans Are Dissatisfied With Manager Kelly.

Toronto baseball fans are now howling for the resignation of Manager "Mike" Kelly.

Detroit and St. Louis have been neck and neck in the American baseball league for over a week.

Detroit's wonderful work in the past week in the American baseball league is attributed to the great hitting of the Tigers.

He will be in uniform this week, and will, if he shows form, be either held here or let out with a string to him. Hickey is playing in the North Shore league, and has seen service in the Empire.

Beattie, of Canada, won the association handicap clay bird shooting, scoring twenty-nine kills out of a possible thirty, in London, Eng. In the contest for the Dewar shield the Kaling Club scored forty-five kills and the Parkdale club, Toronto, forty-four kills, out of a possible sixty. Klings scored nine out of a possible ten.

It is stated in Berlin that it is doubtful if Hackenschmidt, the Russian lion, will be able to resume wrestling. One consequence of his recent illness was an operation which left a temporary paralysis of the left hand. An affection of the knee, which is now eighteen months old, is still very painful and shows little signs of improving.

The winning performance of Nugent Bros.' Ismailian, at Windsor, a this week, establishes a Canadian record of 3:01 1.5 for a mile and three-quarters. She was only a nose in front of Dunvegan at the end, the finish being wonderfully close for a race over so great a distance of ground, this being the longest journey on the flat at any Canadian race meeting this year. Ismailian is a six-year-old bay mare.

Rev. Mr. Mann looked on with approval while his wife and the superintendent were going through the movements of the cakewalk, but some members of the congregation gasped.

William Ralston, secretary of the congregation, took his wife and family and went home, and next day gave notice of his withdrawal from the congregation. Others were equally shocked, but many younger and more liberal members believe that no harm was done.

There was a row after Sunday's services, in which Rev. Mr. Mann and his wife were asked to leave.

Mr. Mann refused to resign and has been informed by some of the members that unless he does he will be ousted.
