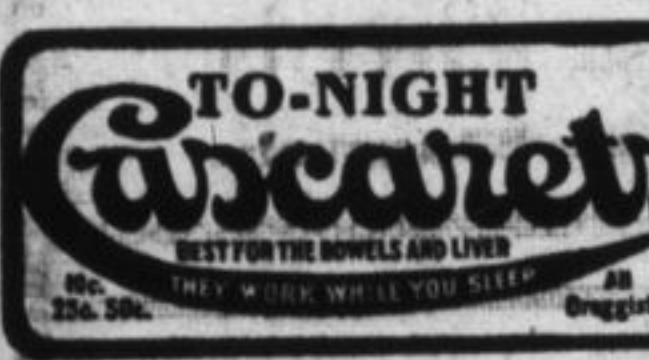

YOUNG MAN HELD UP BY HIGHWAYMAN

On the Road Near Lake Ontario. Park—Earl Maxwell Was the Victim—He Was Held at the Revolver Point.

On Saturday night, shortly after eleven o'clock, Earl Maxwell, while on his way to the summer cottage of his brother-in-law, D. B. Murray, on the Front Road, was held up by a highwayman at the point of a revolver.

CELEBRATION IS ON.

Religious Procession to Champlain's Monument.

Quebec, July 20.—Twenty-five thousand is the estimate made by railway officials of the gathering of visitors now in Quebec for the tercentenary celebration, which opened Sunday.

Parades of soldiers and sailors to church, Sunday morning, and a ceremony at the Champlain monument on the terrace were the principal features.

Soldiers from the camp of the permanent force on De Salaberry street and the city militia also marched to church, the main divisions being the R.C.R., headed by the regimental band, to the Seminary chapel, the R. Rifles, headed by the band, to the cathedral, and the 8th Royal Rifles, with their own band, to St. Andrew's.

Among distinguished parties to attend divine service in the morning were Lord Roberts, who, with Lady Grey, Lady Bruce and Capt. Pickens, went to the cathedral. Lord Grey crossed over to the Albemarle and attended the service on the warship.
