

THE TER-CENTENARY GREAT THRONG WITNESSED THE PAGEANT.

Prince of Wales Conveys From King Edward His Thanks for Presence of American Representative.

Quebec, July 23.—The Prince of Wales was the central figure to-day in the magnificent spectacle reproducing Quebec's historic past and ushering in the three hundredth anniversary of the founding of the city by Champlain.

Aside from the spectacular features of the event it was the occasion for a notable exchange of addresses between Vice-President Fairbanks and the Prince of Wales, in which each spoke at length on existing relations between the United States and Great Britain, and the prince delivered a message of good will to the American government.

An enormous crowd filled the Place d'Armes fronting the Champlain monument, where the exercises were held at four o'clock. Here the prince, surrounded by a brilliant staff, received the addresses of the American and French representatives, mayor of Quebec and finally Champlain himself, reproduced as in the days of old, coming from the mimic reproduction of his original ship, the Don de Dieu, with some 5,000 followers representing every phase of old France in Canada.

It was a splendid spectacle, carried out under the bright skies, with a setting of this picturesque old city and its harbor filled with a fleet of international warships.

The historical procession which followed before the prince was a remarkable assemblage of groups, representing various periods, including Jacques

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A FRIGHTFUL ACCIDENT. Some Twenty-Five Workmen Were Drowned.

Berne, Switzerland, July 24.—A frightful accident early to-day, occurred in the Loetschberg tunnel, in the Bernese Alps, resulting in the death of twenty-five workmen. The men were drilling inside the tunnel and pierced the wall separating them from a subterranean river, or lake, the extent of which was not known. The wall gave way with a crash and a torrent of water and mud rushed in to the tunnel and filled it. All of the workmen, Italians, were drowned. Fortunately owing to the early hour, only comparatively few men had entered the tunnel. It is believed the men tapped the Kander river, which flows through the mountains above the tunnel. The water chokes the tunnel within 1,000 yards of the entrance.

Police Court. Daniel Smith, a sailor, off the steamer Rideau Queen, appeared before the magistrate, on Friday morning, charged with being drunk. He said that he was not feeling very well and got off the boat and through the day he did take too much liquor. Upon a promise of good behavior he was allowed his liberty. Smith was arrested by P. C. Naylon on Thursday afternoon, in a badly intoxicated state. He had just been thrown out of a hotel when arrested and was bleeding badly from the nose and mouth.

Sidney Moleet, aged eighteen years, was killed at Mimico, on Friday morning. Coupling freight cars he lost his footing and fell on rails.

Eight cadets in the United States Military Academy, West Point, were sent to their homes as a result of hazarding members of the fourth class.

The police of Niagara Falls, N.Y., have identified the man who shot and killed Patrolman McCormick as Edward Lee, who recently escaped from Toronto jail.

Maj. James F. Meline, assistant treasurer of the United States, died, Thursday, after a long illness. He was sixty-seven years old and a native of Ohio.

Madamura, a Japanese, went to a house in West 15th street, New York, shot and killed Hazel Kirk, a young colored woman, and then shot himself. He will recover.

In a fire that destroyed the dwelling of James Jarasdy, Cleveland, two of his children were burned to death, while Jarasdy and his two-year-old daughter are in a hospital, injured.

F. A. McCord, law clerk of the House of Commons, Ottawa, died suddenly, on Thursday. He was engaged at the time in some work on his own land and was the only person present.

Charles Gustin, a pioneer of Bosquet, died at his home, Lake Valley Grove summer resort, on Friday morning, aged eighty years. He leaves a wife, six sons and three daughters. Funeral on Sunday.

At Gettysburg, Pa., as the result of a terrific electrical storm which passed over the Pennsylvania National Guard encampment, it is reported that at least six troopers were killed and two more injured, some of them seriously, by being struck by lightning.

Arthur W. Kraft, Louisvillian, aged twenty-two years, and his wife, Mrs. Pearl Laval Kraft, aged twenty years, were probably fatally wounded by Philip Hans, jr., aged twenty-two. In-sane jealousy.

Newport, R.I., Joseph J. Henry, and ordinary seaman and powder passer on board the new battleship Mississippi, was killed. His handkerchief caught in the training cog of one of the guns and he was drawn into the machinery of one of the guns and his neck broken.

FIVE YEARS IN PRISON. The Highest Sentence Put Upon Brockville Thieves.

Brockville, Ont., July 24.—The four young men implicated in the recent express and other robberies, except for trial, this morning, before Judge Reynolds, and, after a review of the evidence, including their own confessions, he sentenced them as follows: Benson Dickson, five years hard labor in the penitentiary.

Detroit, Mich., July 24.—Last Saturday afternoon a party of Detroiters were on their way from Harrow to Colchester, Essex county, in an automobile. Dr. Wetzig, Detroit, one of the party, has received a letter containing a check for the amount from a hotel-keeper at Colchester who, regretted the arrest and conviction as too rigid an application of the law. Accompanying it was a letter from the officials who figured in the case and a half dozen business men expressing the hope that the incident would not be allowed to engender any unkindly feeling against the community. The automobile party claimed that they did not realize that it was a funeral they wished to pass.

Sir George Drummond, Montreal; Byron E. Walker, Toronto; Hon. Alexander Thurston, Quebec; and Joseph Pope, under-secretary of state, are made companions of the Victorian order.

City Clerk Chouinard, Quebec, and Col. P. Sherbrooke, Ottawa, become companions of St. Michael and St. George.

President Roy, agent of the Royal Society, is made a member of the Victorian order.
