## The Grand Duchess

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## 'The Woman Who Is Called a "Royal Vixen"



How many wonderful love romances are toppling into the dust these days; how many goddesses of Cupid's dreamland are being discovered to possess clay feet!

When news came from Europe the other day of the impending separation of Grand Duke Cyril of Russia and his wife, a niece of King Edward of England, and one wedded to the Grand Duke of Hesse, it was realized that clouds had fallen upon one of the most sensational of royal romances.

On previous occasions, when Cyril's affairs have been publicly discussed, sympathy is now expressed for him in nearly all the capitals of the Old World. For the lady whom he so dramatically too— to his bosom only three short years ago has come to be designated as "the royal vixen of Europe," and no one seems to blame the czar's petted and spoiled cousin for turning his eyes longingly toward the divorce courts.

In the first place, Cyril and Victoria were first cousins, and the czar opposed their marriage as much or that account as for the reason that Victoria was a divorced woman.

He had had enough experience with Cyril to harbor a belief that persons of such close blood relationship were not likely to live happily together.

And then it seems to the czar that the reason given for Victoria's divorce from her first husband was rather weak.

wanted to express it more tersely than in the voluminous legal documents filed in the case, "invincible mutual antipathy."

At the same time, the czar was well aware of rumors that the divorce was largely due to the rather more than

cousinly regard of the young woman for the handsome and prolific Cyril. The Grand Duchess Cyril is a niece of King Edward of England. She was Princess Victoria Melita, eldest daughter of the Duke of Edinburgh, who became Duke of Saxe-Coburg.

Her first husband was the present Duke of Hesse, her first cousin and brother of the czarina.

Victoria is spoken of as a headstrong, domineering woman, who has tried to rule her present husband—she did, perhaps, her first—with a rod of iron. She seems to have had, ever since their marriage, a habit of becoming furiously jealous of him on the slightest provocation.

She has always maintained great state, has been accustomed to dressing magnificently and of diverting her mind from unpleasant thoughts by driving a four-in-hand coach recklessly about the country—she is a

scandalous person.

Grand Duke Cyril is the eldest son of the Grand Duke Vladimir, uncle of the czar of Russia. He was born in October, 1876, and is about a month older than Victoria.

He won some prominence of his own account by going to the front at the beginning of the war with Japan, and was appointed by Admiral Makarov to an official position on the battleship Petropavlovsk.

Cyril was on this ship when it was blown up at the entrance to Port Arthur April 13th, 1904, but was saved from drowning by two sailors and escaped with slight injuries. The following month he returned to St. Petersburg, and later went on an extended trip through Germany and Italy.

Cyril has always been noted as one of the gayest scions of Russian nobility. He and his brother, the Grand

duke Boris, have been charged with playing prominent roles in more than one highly scented scandal.

Both grand dukes were leading members of the so-called club of Sibarites of Charkoff, where indescribable orgies are said to have taken place.

All the meals were served on gold and silver plates, and the club's home was in a palace of white marble. In 1899 Cyril paid a visit to the United States and did some high rolling while on this side of the ocean.

Before he went to the war, gossip

was busy connecting Cyril's name

with that of a beautiful young woman of the middle classes. He saw her while walking the street, and became infatuated; he followed her to her home and began at once pressing an ardent suit.

It was understood by his friends that he expected to marry her secretly and fly with her to the United States.

Afraid he had progressed so far that the police were ordered to interfere to unmask the girl. Before they could be apprehended, however, the couple disappeared. It is said they fled to Finland.

When Cyril went to the front, the daring young woman followed him as far as Harbin. One day, however, she disappeared mysteriously and, so far as known, has not been heard from since.

When Cyril returned from his brief

war experience he announced his intention of wedding his cousin Victoria, who had been divorced from her first husband in 1901.

The violent opposition of his family

and the stern negative of the czar failed to shake his purpose, and the couple were married in Munich in October, 1905.

While she remained unmarried, Vic-

toria was in receipt of a yearly allowance of \$20,000 from her first husband. While arranging to marry Cyril she began negotiations for a continuation of the allowance, but upon being refused promptly renounced it altogether. This was the first confirmation the family had of reports of her impending second marriage.

It seems to have been unhappy, almost from the first. The grand duchess is not beautiful; she is high-strung and nervous, and few could understand the infatuation of Cyril for her.

Royal romances sometimes end as unhappily as do those of the common herd.

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## Synopsis of Canadian Northwest

**HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.**  
Any even-numbered section of the  
native Lands in Manitoba or the  
Northwest Provinces, excepting 8  
and 24, not reserved, may be homesteaded  
by any person of the age of 18 years  
or more, or male over 18 years of age,  
to the extent of one-quarter section, or  
160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must  
be made in person. The applicant must be  
eligible for homestead entry.

**DUTIES.** (1) At least six months  
residence upon and cultivation of the  
land each year during the term of  
three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires,  
perform the required residence duty  
by living on farming land owned  
solely by him, not less than eighty  
(80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of  
his homestead, or upon a homestead entered  
for him by his father or mother, such homesteader  
may perform his own residence  
duty by living with the father or mother.

(3) The term "vicinity" in the two  
preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning  
not more than nine miles in a direct  
line.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS

**COAL.** Coal mining rights may be  
leased for twenty-one years at an annual  
rental of \$100.00 per acre, not less than  
2,560 acres can be leased to one applicant.

**QUARTZ.** A person eighteen years of  
age and over having made a discovery  
of quartz veins, not less than 1,500 feet or  
1,500 feet. Fee \$5.00. At least \$100.00 must  
be expended on the claim each year, or  
paid to the mining recorder. When  
\$500.00 has been expended or paid, and  
other requirements completed, the  
claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an  
acre.

**PLACER MINING CLAIMS** generally,  
100 feet square. Entry fee, \$6.00.

**DRILLING.** Two leases of five miles  
each of a river may be issued out on  
application for a term of 20 years. Rental  
\$10.00 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2½  
per cent after the output exceeds \$10,  
000.
