**A DARING ROBBERY**

**TRAY OF DIAMOND RINGS STOLEN IN QUEBEC.**

Thief Entered Dobbin's Jewellery Store, and While the Proprietor Was Waiting on Him, Grabbed the Tray and Fleed—Detectives Carried Away By Boat.

Quebec, July 28.—A tray of diamond rings, valued at \$2,000, was stolen from J. F. Dobbin's jewellery store corner of Bunde and De Tresois streets, at ten o'clock last night. The robbery was daring but simple in its execution. A well-dressed man entered the store and asked to see some diamond rings. Mr. Dobbin himself waited on him. The man selected a ring from a tray, and asked that it be polished a little. Mr. Dobbin turned from the counter to comply with the request, and the man bolted, making good his escape among the crowds on the street. Police headquarters, a block away, was promptly notified, and a large number of detectives were started off in the hope of capturing the thief. Three of them, with Mr. Dobbin, went on the Montreal boat, and while they were hunting there the boat started on its journey. The detectives will have to proceed to Three Rivers before they can disembark.

The park, and its surroundings were crowded with people, the French population of St. Saviour and St. Roch's particularly attended in crowds and the prince was the object of enthusiasm.

**RAID QUEER SECT**

**CHARGED WITH PRACTICING WEIRD RITES.**

**Woman "Bishop" at Head of Cult Protest That No Law Was Violated or Wrong Committed.**

New York, July 28.—Thirty-two disbelievers of the Church of the First Assembly of Christ, twenty-five of whom were women, were taken from cells of the Vernon Avenue Police station, where they had spent the day and night, and lined up before Magistrate Higginbotham in the Lee Avenue Police Court, Brooklyn. They were the members of the new sect who were arrested near midnight, on Tuesday, after policemen had broken in upon what they alleged to have been weird and indecent religious rites that were being carried on by the congregation behind locked doors of their church at Willoughby and Thompkins avenues.

The court room was crowded when the thirty-two enthusiasts filed in from the anteroom, headed by their "Bishop," Miss Elizabeth Robinson, carrying a large Bible.

Magistrate Higginbotham singled out Miss Robinson, who gave her address as 179 Pulaski street. There were two charges against her. One was that of "keeping a place for persons to visit for lewd, obscene and indecent purposes," in violation of section 322 of the penal code. The second was that of outraging public decency under section 675 of the same code. The magistrate read the charges and explained their import. Then Magistrate Higginbotham arraigned Isabel G. Clarke, Daniel Wecker, one of the men who wore a visible under-shirt, and H. G. Dunham, on the charge of outraging public decency.

"We have a right to practise our religion as we please," she said. "All of those statements are falsehoods. The cult was established seven years ago by a school teacher, Miss Nettie Earle. Its chief tenet is that Christ is to return to earth about nine years hence and the faithful are exhorted to prepare themselves for the millennium. Miss Sarah Carter is now 'supreme shepherd' of the organization, which has several branches.

**To Visit Montreal.**

Montreal, July 28.—Lord Roberts will arrive in Montreal to-morrow from Quebec, travelling in the official car of D. McNicol, manager of the C. P. R. He will be the guest of Robert Neichen during his stay here. His host has invited a number of prominent people in various walks of life, to meet the distinguished soldier at luncheon to-morrow. All the proceedings during his stay here will be of an informal character.

**Military Transfers.**

Ottawa, July 28.—The transfer of "B" company, 16th Regiment, from Wellington to Northport, Ont., and "G" company from Northport to Wellington, is authorized in a militia order.

**The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World.**

It is understood that the real work on the Hudson Bay railway will be started this summer.

At the first day of the Olympic regatta, Tuesday, the Toronto Argonauts were defeated.

Thomas L. Higen, of Massachusetts, is likely to be nominated for president by the Independence party.

S. R. Price, a farmer who resides in Otonabee township, three miles from Peterboro, is a cousin of Lord Roberts.

Notwithstanding all reports to the contrary, Lord Roberts will arrive in Toronto on the civic holiday, August 3rd.

Rev. A. H. Ranton, the well-known Toronto evangelist, was married last Saturday to Mrs. Jean Harrison, Strathroy.

At Menora, Ont., little Emily Brinkman, aged thirteen, was drowned in the lake while bathing. Her body was recovered.

A fatal accident took place at Trudeau, on the C.P.R., east of Port Arthur, when two men were killed and five injured.

Lieut.-Col. Maynard Rogers and the 43rd Battalion, Ottawa, presented the Prince of Wales with a magnificent musk-ox head.

Lightning struck and burned barns about Montreal during terrific storm. The wind unroofed barns and overthrew light buildings.

St. Catharines city council has practically taken the first step towards securing government power for street lighting purposes.

SS. Siberian has reached Philadelphia; SS. Numidian at Boston; SS. Laurentian, at Glasgow; SS. Pomeranian passed Fame Point inward.

Frank Askwith, an employee of the Ottawa city hall, complained he was brutally assaulted and knocked partly senseless by Police Sergeant Elms. The officer claims that Askwith attempted to trip him.

Over 1,500 devout Catholics from all parts of Essex county joined in the annual pilgrimage to the shrine of Ste. Anne, at Tecumseh, Ont., on Monday. Twenty priests took part in the religious ceremonies.

Plans for another great battle in the courts, with representatives of the Standard Oil company, will be worked out, at Lenox, Mass., within the next few days, under the direction of Attorney-General Bonaparte.

The immigration officials say that the incoming numbers this year fall far short of the demands of the farmers and railroad companies. There is a quantity of labor of all kinds which will not be filled this season.

While the steamer Huron, from Cleveland, was taking on passengers, at Erie, Harry Lamson, of Bedford, Ohio, fell overboard. A seaman dived in after him and the man was pulled aboard the departing steamer bidding a dripping good bye to his wife on shore.

By the seizure, at Liverpool, of the headquarters of another band of reputable plotters, evidence was found of the collusion of the army in the revolutionary plans of the republicans. The police seized a number of bombs, guns and a large quantity of ammunition. No arrests have been made as yet.

The province of Nova Scotia presented the Prince of Wales with a fine mink coat to be borne home to the Princess of Wales, with 24-karat gold buttons, inlaid with Nova Scotia pearls and amethysts. The presentation was made by Hon. D. C. Fraser, lieutenant-governor.

As the result of the typhoon, the steamers Schuykill, Persia, Powhatan, Laisang, Charles Harriot, and the British torpedo boat Whiting went ashore. An unknown steamer and several lighters foundered. Fifteen houses in Hong Kong collapsed. The public gardens, the chief attraction of the city, were wrecked.

Earl Fox and Mrs. William Day, of Sidney township, have been committed for trial, on a charge of assault, with intent, on William Day, husband of the woman in custody. The case will be tried at the assizes in October. The offence was the result of a row in which William Day was shot at and afterwards beaten on the head with a poker. He was nearly killed.

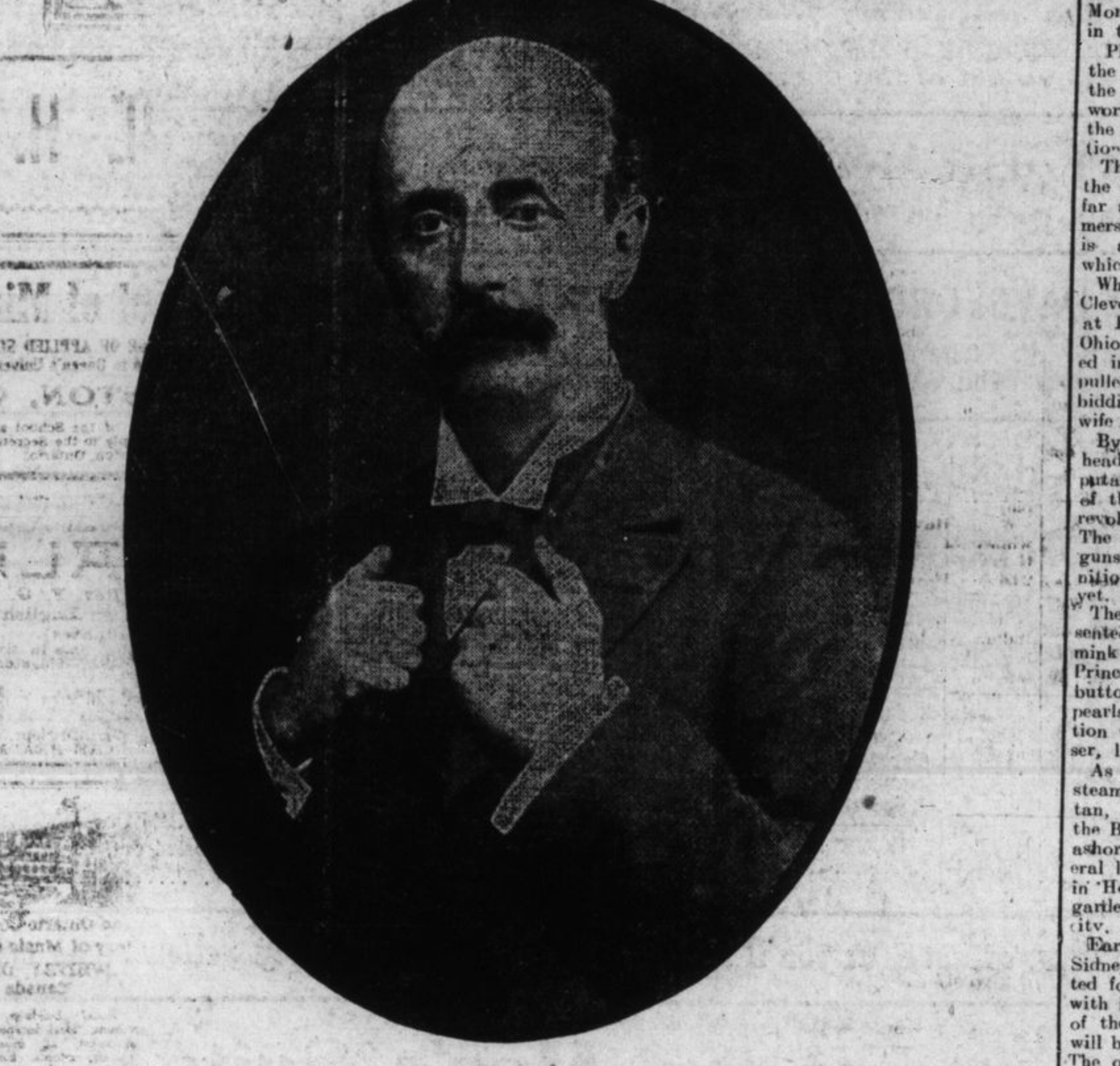
**New Hospital Superintendent.**
