





PEARY'S SHIP, THE ROOSEVELT.

The good ship Roosevelt, in which Lieutenant Peary has already started on his first lap toward the North Pole, is interesting both from its destination and also because of the wonderful manner in which the ship was constructed. The Roosevelt is a vessel which was built on original lines laid down by Lieutenant Peary Himself. Her sides are sloped in such a manner that their angles do not offer any opportunity for the tremendous ice floes of the Northern ocean to grip the vessel and crush in her hull, as has often been done to snips constructed in the ordinary manner. The beams which stretch out to support her hull are marvels of strength, and her bow is built so as to crush its way through ice fields where ordinary ships would be immovable.


