Owners of narrow city lots often find it rather difficult to secure the plan of a house which shall be both attractive and convenient, as well as adaptable to the rectangular piece of ground they possess. The one illustrated is peculiarly suited to the ordinary city lot, even one so narrow as 30 feet front, as exclusive of piazza, it measures 22x32 feet. The estimated cost, exclusive of heating and plumbing, is \$2,600.


There is a pretty piazza across the front, with Ionic columns supporting its roof. The gambrel roof gives an appearance of height and symmetry which is most pleasing, and also gives the much-desired closet space for the second-story rooms.

There is no waste space, for although the rooms are not large, they are conveniently arranged and easy of access. The entrance, through a vestibule, opens into a small reception hall, from which the main stair leads up, with a small bay window lighting the landing. A great convenience is the basement door opening under this stairs.

In the large pantry there is a refrigerator space by which this necessary piece of furniture is accessible from the rear porch. The pantry is also accessible from both the kitchen and dining-room. On the second story

there are two large chambers, as well as one small one, all provided with closets. The bathroom opens upon the hall, the plumbing pipes being brought directly up from the kitchen. Such an arrangement is more economical than where the kitchen and bath are on opposite sides of the house.

The house is finished in hardwood in the first story and with painted pine in the second. Outside the narrow siding is painted a light green in the first story, with the trimmings white. The gable sides of the second story are light green, contrasting nicely with the dark green stain of the shingles of the roof.
