FAIR PLAY A JEWEL. The petty attacks of the Toronto News upon Mr. Brodeur, minister of marine, are not creditable to it.

The cost of the complete change in the book-keeping has been magnified beyond all reason. The Whig has had its own ideas of the work. It has thought that the accounting engineers should have been given the contract for making the change, and yet it concedes that there may have been difficulties in the way.

The facts of moment are these: That the reform in the accounts has been complete; that there will be efficiency as well as economy in the change; that the transformation could not be effected without the aid of the experts, the men who have made a study of modern methods; that the marine department is undergoing transformation in other respects; that the government had no desire for a whitewashing of any delinquents or offenders when it appointed the civil service commission; and that the cleansing process will be made complete when Judge Cassells has handed in his report.

SCANDAL MONGERING GOES ON.

An attempt has been made to revive the Hodgins scandal, though Hodgins himself has abandoned his case and will have no more to do with it.

The minority on the committee of enquiry, Messrs. Lennox and Barker, brought this fact out clearly in their report.

The point is the more important because the minority went before parliament and pleaded, as they pleaded in committee, that there was, outside of the Hodgins charges, occasion for further investigation, and that it should be continued.

The minority report is important in another respect—that it kills the insinuations of another alleged engineer, whose service has been dispensed with by the railway commissioner, and who, disgruntled for some cause, is now disposed to slander the government anonymously.

Mr. Haultain, says a contemporary, has a progressive policy, and the election in Saskatchewan is bound to be bitterly contested.

THE FIGHT FOR POWER.

Hon. Mr. Scott, the premier of Saskatchewan, denies that he had any communication with the premier of the dominion, and that the dissolution of the assembly has followed an agreement or understanding between them.

The opposition has a grievance, not a very serious one. It is that there are only twenty-five days between the issue of the writs and the polling of the votes.

It is claimed for Mr. Borden that he championed civil service reform in his Halifax speech. But there is no one that calls himself a leader of the people on the conservative side, who champions civil service reform in Ontario. Why?

The average auditor is not respected. He is censured when he does not "kick" against an irregularity, and is rebuked when he does. When a few more scandals of the Toronto type occur the auditor will become somebody worth noticing.

The Mail is worrying over the land of which the federal government deprived the newer provinces. The provinces there owned the land, and therefore could not be deprived of it.

In the last three years, or since then has been a provincial government, Hon. Mr. Scott says there has been no meddling in Saskatchewan by any one in Ottawa, except Mr. Borden. He has been co-operating or conspiring with Mr. Haultain—very much to the province's disadvantage.
