

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Homestead Regulations.

ANY even-numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 2 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person...

DUTIES.—(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre...

PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be leased to one applicant for a term of 20 years.

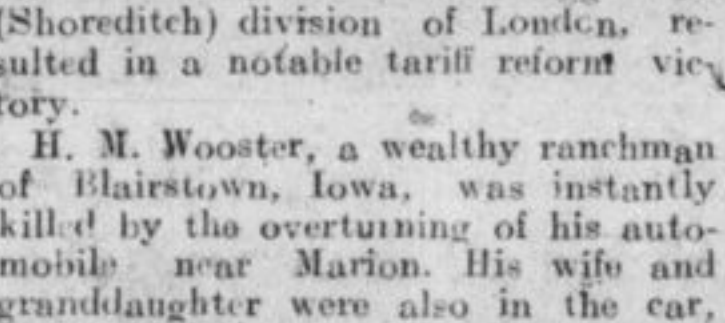
