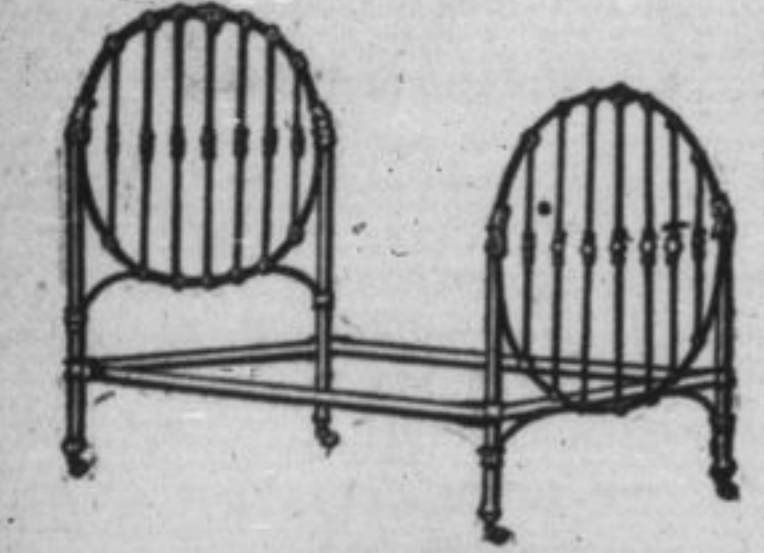


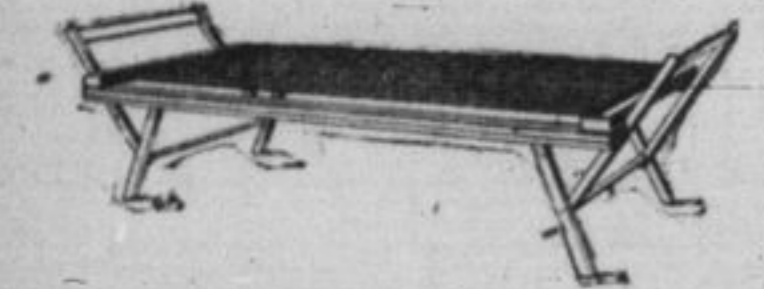

AT BOARD OF HEALTH SOME MINOR MATTERS ARE DEALT WITH.

Several Cases Brought Before the Board Will Be Investigated—Proper Drainage is Needed.

At a meeting of the board of health, held on Monday afternoon, the chairman, S. S. Corbett, presided, and also present were Mr. Richardson, Dr. Evans and John Lemmon. In regard to a drain on the property of Miss Lenca, at 280 Bagot street, the engineer reported that the city should not have to bear the expense for its construction. The medical health officer thought that Miss Lenca should be given time to pay for the cost, and the chairman was of the opinion that it should come under local improvement. Dr. Evans said that if there was no proper drain, it was not right that Miss Lenca should be asked to pay. He was well aware that the present drain was in a bad condition. Mr. Lemmon asked whether or not the city could pay for the drain. On motion of Dr. Evans and Mr. Lemmon, the matter was referred to a committee composed of the chairman, health officer, and city engineer, with power to act.

The petition of James McCulla, for that immediate attention was referred to the medical health officer and engineer, to report back to committee.

William Leslie complained of certain drainage on George street, stating that immediate attention was required. This matter was given over to the health officer and the engineer.

W. G. Craig complained about the water flooding his property at 32 Ontario street. Referred to the engineer and health officer. The following letter was received from the office of the inspector of penitentiaries, which was addressed to the Hon. William Hartley: "Referring to your letter to Inspector Dawson, of the 3rd, with enclosures, we have submitted the matter to the minister, who is of the opinion that in as much as convicts are wards of the government, they are entitled to every possible protection, and that, therefore, the erection of a contagious disease hospital on the reserve would be a menace to health that could not be justified. Under these circumstances, he is unable to grant the application of the Kingston board."

On motion, the letter was received and filed. A large number of accounts were passed before adjournment.

MAKING GOOD TIME 500,000 BUSHEL AMID THE 1000 ISLANDS

TWO ENGLISHMEN ON THE WALK TO TORONTO.

They Covered 112 Miles Up to Sunday Morning Were Feeling Well and Fit to Finish the Course. On Friday morning Victor Good and Mr. Peasley left here to walk to Toronto. Up to 1.15 o'clock on Sunday they had covered 112 miles. This is extra fast time for walking, and if it can be held, their record to Toronto will be hard to beat. The two walkers left here on Friday at 3.45 a.m., and were in Belleville, sixty miles, at 10.45 o'clock that night. On Saturday morning at 7.30 o'clock, they started out again and were at Colborne, a distance of thirty miles at 6.45 that evening. They had a good rest at Colborne, and at 5.45 o'clock, Sunday morning, started out for Port Hope, making the twenty-two miles by 1.15 o'clock. This made the 112 miles, and they were to reach Bowmanville that night. Post-cards were received in the city from Port Hope and the progress of the two young men will be watched with interest.

Will Meet On Saturday.

On Saturday afternoon the Victoria and Napane will play a game of baseball at the fair grounds, and it should be one of the best of the season. Napane is at the head of the St. Lawrence League, and has good prospects of staying there. It has not been defeated every year this season. The Victorias have been playing better ball this last week or so, and should be in condition to win out from the Napane bunch. Quite a number are expected down with the team. A matinee will also be held on Saturday afternoon.

To Have A Game.

The policemen and the posties are still at it and are found to have another game, provided the chief is present to see that "Sam" Arnel does not run away with the ball when his lids happened to get ahead. Both teams have a few new men out, and will have their teams changed around to quite an extent.

The prize list of the twentieth-annual bench show of dogs at the Canadian National Exhibition calls for 213 classes and the distribution of \$5,000 in premiums and prizes. Sporting Notes.

There is absolutely no truth in the report from Boston that Longboat will turn professional to race Alfred Shrubbs.

A lake yacht racing association race under the auspices of the Royal Canadian Yacht club, will be sailed from Toronto to Hamilton on Saturday, August 8th. Mike Schreck, of Chicago, and Jack Johnson, the colored heavyweight pugilist, have been matched to box twenty rounds at the National Sporting club in London on October 10th. The English press treats Walker's victory in the 100 metres final as much more significant than Bobbie Kerr's fine achievement in the 200 metres. Columns are printed of the South African's win, while Kerr gets but a paragraph. Jimmy Britt, the California fighter, who was put permanently out of the fighting business by Joe Gans, after making a fortune in the sport through the peculiar methods of handling fighters, now in vogue on the Pacific Coast, is now in England.

In the all-day cricket match between McGill and Ottawa, played on the McGill campus, before a large crowd of spectators, for the benefit of Hingham, McGill led by 49 runs on the first innings, Johnston's bowling for Ottawa being mainly responsible for McGill's low score. Grand Trunk defeated St. Lambert by inches at the Longueuil regatta in one of the best contested war canoe races of the season. Longueuil finished third. Grand Trunk oarsmen and paddlers carried off the bulk of the honors, winning the senior singles, tandem and fours. Kid Dufrene, of Montreal, and Alf Lynch, of Quebec, fought a fifteen-round draw on the Q.A.A.A. grounds before a crowd of about 700. Honors were fairly even on the fifteen rounds. There was some hard slugging in the early rounds and for a time it looked as if the battle would end in a knockout. What proved to be the most brilliant and most successful grand circuit meeting ever held in Detroit is ended. The 2:07 pace stake was the feature and it threatened the record in the first four heats. Darky Hall, the Canadian mare, went by the others in the stretch in the first heat and won handily in fast time. The Hamilton, Ont., committee, arranging the details for the reception to Bobby Kerr, has decided on the route of the procession and other details in connection with his homecoming. He will arrive on Monday night, August 10th, by boat, and will be met at the wharf with carriages. The procession will pass up James street to King, then to Victoria Park, where a public reception will take place.

OF WHEAT WILL BE HERE FROM FORT WILLIAM.

The Montreal Transportation Company Will Be Very Busy Handling the Cargoes—General Movements About the Harbor.

The steamer Missisquoi was shipped from river points to-day. The steamship John Randall cleared for Rideau canal points. The schooner Clara arrived from Charlotte with coal for the Grove Inn. The sloop Mary Louise is loading general cargo, for Rideau canal points. The steamship Najavo cleared for Oswego, to load coal for Amherst Island. The schooner Maxwell cleared for Conneaut, to load coal for the penitentiary. The dredge Sir Richard is at work on the locomotive works slip, at the foot of William street. The schooner Mary Ann Lydon will arrive, to-day, from Charlotte, with coal for R. Crawford. The steamer Canadian arrived from Fort William, with 75,000 bushels of wheat, for Richardson's. The steamer Hinchley arrived from Oswego, with two blue barges, and then cleared for Alexandria Bay. Swift's Steamer Caspian, down and up, to-day; steamer Aletha, for Oudenburg; steamer Dundurn, down, Tuesday morning.

By to-night there will arrive in the city about 500,000 bushels of wheat from Fort William, for the Montreal Transportation company. The vessels to unload are the steamer Rosemount, and consorts, the steamer Westmont and consorts, and the steamer Turret Crown. The tug Bartlett, with two blue barges, and Erie, with two coal barges, and the tug Emerson arrived from Montreal with three barges. The steamer Westmont will clear for Sydney, Cape Breton, and lead rails for Fort William.

Some morning this week eighteen or more hotel men will make their bow to the magistrate for selling liquor during prohibited hours. Nearly every hotel in the city has been exploited during the past month by special detectives of the provincial government. Some of the sum-moneses were served on Monday and those cases will be tried on Thursday morning. The detectives have been working quietly, and few knew of their presence. The matter is causing much comment around the city.

THE TRAVEL IS NOT HEAVY THIS SEASON.

The Thousand Island Park is the Only Crowded Place—A Vision of It Some Day Becoming a Second Coney Island.

The reports that the tourist traffic to the Thousand Islands is heavy this season are highly colored. There has not been the influx to those summer island resorts that was expected. The season is now at its height, for after August 20th the rush is over. Neither Alexandria Bay nor Clayton have had the number of tourists they had last year. At the Bay it has been decidedly a lean season for the hotels. At the Thousand Island Park, however, there has been a larger number of guests at the two hotels, particularly the Columbian, than there was last year. The Columbian is the most popular hotel among the Thousand Islands. It has been full all July and the heavy month is just opening. The Thousand Island Park still maintains its own Sunday laws. No boat lands there on the Sabbath, and all within its confines are expected to be good and go to church. There is still no liquor to be had over the counter. One must buy his own in bulk. The Park is a fine place to test the moral metal of a man—on a Sunday especially. As regards steamboats, not even the regular traffic boats are allowed to land on the Sabbath, a fact which Methodist-controlled Park. The impression prevails that if the Park ever gets into secular hands it would not be long before a regular Coney was made of it. Its situation is the finest on the river for such a purpose but its Methodist directors are horror-stricken at the mention of such a thing. During August there is a population of from 8,000 to 10,000 at the Park. There is still a small Kingston colony of cottagers there.

The rivalry between the Folger and Visser boats still exists, but the Folgers have the better of the argument. The Visser's are no longer allowed to land at the New York General Railway wharf at Clayton or the Fine View wharf. Why there should be friction no one can tell. It was not started by the Folgers. There was business enough for both lines.

Last Saturday the steamer Varuna began her trips from Belleville and Bay ports to the Thousand Island Park and will continue until Labor day. The Varuna takes down quite a crowd of Belleville and "other" ruralists. On Saturday the steamer America had a lively race with the big steam-yacht Castanet, of the Visser line, from Kingston to Clayton. The America left the city ahead of the Castanet but near the foot of the island the Yankee boat overhauled her. Then occurred some very clever jockeying on the part of the Kingston captain, R. Carnegie, who kept close to port and land and secured the right of way at the turn. The Castanet pulled into Clayton a little ahead, but at the Thousand Island Park both boats were close together again. Among the islands the various steamers are constantly having brushes, and the passengers enjoy the sport immensely. When one vessel leaves the other behind its crew and passengers shout defiance and the "Ha! Ha!" at those aboard the defeated craft. To really appreciate the Thousand Islands one has to live among them for a week or two. Sailing among them in the early morning, in the heated afternoon, in twilight, moonlight and in company with the starlight on the dark nights creates a fascination for the famed isles of the upper St. Lawrence that brings one back to them year by year. The islands on the United States' side nearly all contain fine hotel residences and cottages, and have been made it the ideal in appearance. But nearly all the Canadian isles are such as they were when Frontenac sailed up the St. Lawrence and founded what is now the city of Kingston; they are still what they were when the early settlers paddled the river, and Indians lurked upon them and the main shaft of these pictures are now in the minds of those who have their country's history, as they sail between the dense pines and cedars.

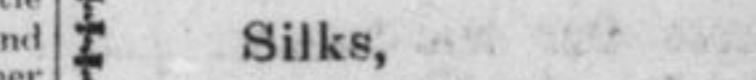
