Cattle Thief Given Three Years at Woodstock.

Deputy Sheriff Hill, of Woodstock, arrived in the city, on Thursday afternoon, with John McGraw, the prisoner, who is thirty-five years of age, and unmarried, was found guilty of stealing cattle from a number of Durham farmers, and was sentenced by Judge Finkle, at Woodstock, to three years.

McGraw and his brother, Edward, were arrested and lodged in the jail at Simcoe, but managed to break out. John was soon afterwards recaptured, but Edward is still at large. The two were charged with stealing about a dozen cattle, but the stock was all recovered.

WHEN HOUSE WAS STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.

Portion of Kitchen at Home of William Davy, Barrie Street, Was Wrecked—Several People Stunned.

William Davy had a miraculous escape from death, when lightning struck his home, at 435 Barrie street, at 11:40 o'clock on Friday morning. Lightning struck the kitchen of the house, and knocked in all one side of it, smashed a pane of glass in a window at the opposite side of the house, and gave all the inmates of the house, and those residing nearby a bad scare. Mr. Davy was walking out of the dining-room into the kitchen, when the bolt struck the house, and he was so stunned that he did not know what had happened for a moment. The boards fell in around him and he was surrounded with debris. Boards flew in all directions, and the fact that he escaped injury is a miracle. Mrs. Davy was in the dining-room, and she also suffered a severe shock. One side of the kitchen is almost a complete wreck. The ball of fire lit up the whole house. Luckily, there was no fire.

Miss Morris, living in a house near Mr. Davy, was out in her back yard at the time, and received quite a severe shock. The two-year-old son of Constable John Navon, living close by, went into convulsions as a result of the shock, and Dr. Robert Hanley was called. The lad made a speedy recovery.

(Citizens who heard a loud clap of thunder just about 11:40 o'clock, were of the opinion at first that there had been an explosion. The sun was shining brightly at the time, with no warning whatever that there would be lightning.

High Wages On Farms.

Winnipeg Free Press. The anticipated scarcity of farm laborers with the harvest almost ready has resulted in high wages being offered to experienced men. The prevailing rate, according to Bruce Wal-ker, commissioner of immigration, who has been closely in touch with the situation, runs from \$35 to \$40 per month, or \$2.50 per day, with board. Inexperienced men are being paid ac-cording to what they can do, their wages running from \$15 to \$25 per month.
